WOMEN LICENSED PILOTS: Bureau of Air Commerce list of May 4, 1936 gives a total of 416 women licensed pilots classified as follows: Transport, 70; Limited Commercial, 27; Private, 271; Amateur, 46; Glider, 2.

RECORDS: Helen Richey won the Endless Caverns cash prize for the first women's international record in the light plane class by making an altitude flight from Washington May 9th coming down at Endless Caverns Airport, New Market, Virginia. The barograph calibration was not completed at this writing but any such flight sets a record as no previous one had been established. Endless Caverns gave a party for Helen and were very pleased to award her the prize.

COMING EVENTS: 1936 Missouri State Air Tour, sponsored by Lambert-St. Louis Airport Association starts from St. Louis, June 12-14.

Second National Intercollegiate Air Meet will be held at Wayne County Airport, Detroit, Michigan, June 19 and 20.

Eighth Annual Indiana Air Tour, under auspices of the Indiana Aircraft Trades Association will start from and end at Indianapolis, June 22-28.

Seventh Annual Glider Meet and Soaring Contest, under auspices Soaring Society of America will be held at Elmira, New York, June 20-July 5.

National Balloon Race and Mile High Races, Denver, Colorado, are scheduled for July 3, 4, 5. Mrs. Carlos Reavis, President of W. N. A. A., is Chairman of Women's Activities and cordially invites all Ninety-Nines to join in the events.

National Air Races will be held September 5-6-7 at Los Angeles; moved from Cleveland because improvements on the airport there will not be done in time. Events the same; the Bendix will probably be run from New York.

Michigan Air Races, tentative date, September 19-20; N. A. A. sanctioned meet; a Race for Women is scheduled.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF WOMEN'S COMMITTEE, NAA CONTEST BOARD held in Washington, May 7, 1936 - EXCERPTS:

The following action was taken:

Published Rules to Hold: It was decided it would be the policy of the Women's Committee to insist in all cases on adherence to published rules for women's contests and thorough enforcement of these rules; the only exception -- if it developed the rules themselves were wrong, in which case changes would be made only by unanimous

agreement of contestants and Contest Committee.

On-To-Derbies Favored: The Committee believed that encouragement should be given to the organization of on-to-derbies to major race meets and that these derbies should be run, if possible, with each control-point-to-control-point lap a separate contest.

Limited Speed Range Agreed For Handicap Entries: It was believed desirable, if it could be accomplished practically, to keep the speed range of all planes entered in a handicap race within a

50 m.p.h. bracket.

Applicants Tentatively Accepted for National Race Event will be asked to confirm arrival and compliance with rules by telegraph. Woman Pilot Recommended for Bendix Race Committee: It was recommended to the Racing Committee that a qualified woman pilot be named to the Bendix Contest Committee to give women pilots repre-

sentation on this committee.

Urge Aerol Trophy be Placed as Annual Award: The Committee recommended that the Cleveland Pneumatic Tool Co. place the Aerol Trophy with the NAA to be awarded annually to the woman who makes the greatest contribution to aviation during the preceding year. Tulsa and Kansas City to be Contacted re On-To-Denver Derbies: Mrs. Britton agreed to contact representatives of the 99's at Tulsa and Kansas City to enlist their aid in investigating the possibility of organizing interest in an on-to-cruising contest to the Denver Mile High Races July 3-4-5.

Annual Honor Role Favored: The Committee was heartily in favor of establishing an annual Honor Role of women outstanding in sporting and air record activity, the Contest Board to act as a Committee of Award to determine the individuals who should be

named on this Honor Role.

Technical Committee Handicapping System to Apply: On the system of handicapping to be used for the women's race on the National Air Race program, it was decided to ask the Technical Committee of the Contest Board to make recommendations regarding the handicapping procedure and to follow such procedure as covered in such recommendations.

Suggestions Solicited: It was decided to invite all known organized groups of women pilots and women interested in aviation to make such suggestions and recommendations as they might wish to make regarding women's contests and record activity and that such suggestions and recommendations be given consideration by the Committee.
