The Redlands District Chamber of Commerce, sponsor of the race, will send crates of oranges, grapefruit, avocados, etc., to the home of each 99'er to participate, and each entrant will have five chances to win a cup. Requirement for entry will be your 99 paid up membership card, and for the other women's races a private license, certified logged solo hours equivalent to a commercial and a rating in the ship you wish to fly.

Make your plans to come early because on January 8, right after the pilots meeting, there will be a party for 99'ers and 49½'ers at the Fromhagens.

9 of us met in Denver, Sept. 28 for breakfast and formed our new Chapter.

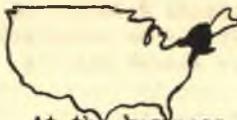

Betty Schmidt is starting a ground school at Roosevelt Field and will be glad to furnish full details to anyone interested.

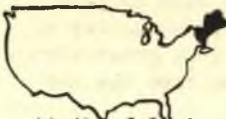
Ruth Franckling is keeping very busy at the present time - studying for her Instructor's Rating.
