

MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

There have been various and sundry inquiries about what has happened to the Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship, which, of course, is natural as so little has been done about it in the past year or more, due primarily to war activities and the scattered membership of the 99's.

It does seem, though, that it should be selfevident, with the many openings for women in the field of aviation and the marvelous training those qualified are being given at the expense of the Government, with pay while they are training, there is no need for giving a scholarship this year.

We should conserve our fund and allow it to accumulate until the need for help returns. The interest as well as the principal are not sufficient to warrant any unnecessary expenditure and the fact that two awards were made, notwithstanding this, was due to the generosity of our former president and myself, our purpose being to stimulate and keep alive the interest of our members. We do not want this interest to lag or the scholarship to be forgotten, or have our members feel that we have been neglectful in the discharge of our obligations. It is for this reason that I am writing this for the NEWS LETTER.

There have been suggestions that an award for some outstanding deed or performance in flying should be made, and other suggestions have come forward but, in the final analysis, it seems advisable to wait and see what the future holds. If, however, you have ideas, do send them in. All suggestions and recommendations are helpful.

When the scholarship originally was organized, there was a definite need for it but, with changed conditions, this need has passed for the present. What the future holds, we cannot say. We think it wise to mark time for the present and see how best we can serve those who are serving so well now and making a real place for women of the future in Aviation.


terest. Willette will be located at Smith College for her "Boot" training. Our last meeting, then, was a fare-well to her.


