



GREETINGS FROM VIEWNA

Dear Ninety-Nines:

May 18, 1946

I owe you a letter and finally here it is. Time moves so rapidly in this part of the world, it scarcely is possible to keep up with it. "Never a dull moment" is a remark I could make about my entire stay in Vienna.

There won't be much about aviation in this letter. One hardly ever sees a plane overhead and if one does it is with a bit of apprehension for we are in a little cage of a country with demarcation zones and "restricted" territory encircling Vienna. Last week I drove to Linz for the opening of an Industrial Exhibit and in order to obtain permission and a coveted "grey pass" printed in four languages, the Chief of Staff had to sign it, and one made preparations for a 4-hour auto drive as if one were to be gone a month - extra gas, extra food, cigarettes as tips and all the identification one had. One officer flew down in a Cub and this was considered a phenomenal achievement.

But if there is no aviation there are other compensations and being in Vienna at this particular time is without a doubt a fascinating experience. My work is that of a Commercial Attache which means everything that pertains to business between Austria and the United States, and there is plenty to do for it looks as if every manufacturer or business man in Austria looks toward America for future business. I interview, answer letters, talk with Government officials and attend meetings, among other things. Although not in uniform we are under the aegis of the arry and that means a certain discipline.

There is very interesting social life. Last week General and Mrs. and Miss Clark gave a big reception. The street was blocked off in front of the Bristol Hotel and MP's guarded the entrance. After we shook hands with the General and his family, cockteils were served while a fine Hungarian orchestra played.

The Minister of Commerce gave & big party recently and I had the good fortune to sit with two Russians. They are not easy to meet and it is always interesting to get to know them. Most of them speak nothing but Russian and that is a rather difficult language. I am taking lessons but as I don't have time to study, probably won't ever learn it.

"Keeping house" here is very interesting and very different from at home. I have a cherming little three room wooden house and a cook and a chauffeur. One has to have a

chauffeur even for a little old Ford like mine because you can't leave your car for 5 minutes alone. It would be stolen immediately. Mine already has had the top split with a razor while the chauffeur was sitting in it. And it isn't safe to drive or walk alone after dark. There are few street lights and one sees nobody on the streets. "Conditions" are very terrible for the Austrians. Their food rations are so small and they are all so poor. There is nothing to buy in the stores and business is done by "exchanges" - usually for food or cigarettes. But in spite of the poverty and hunger, art flourishes and the theater and opera and ballet and concerts are in full swing and one could go out every night for a month and not see the same entertainment twice. There are American movies for Americans, too, and now that many officers' wives have come there will probably be more home life.

When I first came the rubble and dirt and bricks were piled high on the streets. Many streets were completely blocked. During wind storms it was actually dangerous to walk near buildings because of the toppling ruins. Now the city is being cleaned up and looks better and somehow this seems to help the morale a bit and gives people, discouraged and gloomy, a bit of civil pride and makes them feel that perhaps some day they will be more normal again. It is a long process and much of the city

can never be restored.

I had a wonderful week skiing in Switzerland and it was thrilling to get into a country where there are no ruins and where everybody has enough to eat and where people don't follow you on the streets picking up cigerette

butts or begging you for a cigarette.

It would be fun to hear from you. I hope you are all flying and have grand jobs and having fun. I think often of you all and of our meetings and look forward to joining you in a year or so. Meanwhile if any of you can get here the welcome mat is out at "Vienna Vista" as I call the little cottage.




