Usually in the March issue the president calls your attention to the fact that soon the nominating committee will be asking your sections and chapters for your selections for the 1948-1949 officers and committees. This year, Elsie Peters, chairman of the nominating committee, is outlining it for you in this issue, so if any of the sections have an early spring meeting, they will have the information in plenty of time. Many members have suggested that it would help both the nominating committee and perhaps even in marking the national ballot if a short peragraph accompany each name sent in, describing the candidate's qualifications, offices held, and stating whether or not her personal consent was obtained. You will want to start early; to do it right takes plenty of time.

Remember new members accepted March 1st until July 1st pay only \$3.50 - \$1.00 initiation fee plus half year dues \$2.50. Be sure the new member understands that the half year membership expires September 1st when memberships are due for renewal.

It was hard to turn down Miami's wonderful invitation to hold the Annual Meeting there at the time of the races, but we had no right to cut the fiscal year short three months. Perhaps at the Annual Meeting this summer the club may wish to change the beginning of our year to July 1st so that we can join the girls at the Women's races. We also had a grand invitation from the girls in Washington, D.C., but one section and many, many girls wrote asking if the convention might not be held in a centrally located spot so that it would be within reach of more of the membership.

The Florida girls are doing a grand job of it with the races and I hope that all of you who can will be there to take part and back them up.

TO ALL SECTION GOVERNORS AND CHAPTER CHAIRMEN:

Belle Hetzel, our President, has given the Nominating Committee some space in her column of the News Letter in order that we can start work on the nominations for the election of National Officers for the coming fiscal year of 1948-1949.
