IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

1948 AMELIA BARBART MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS

Included in this issue of the News Letter you will each find an application form for the 1948 Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Award. We have received so many inquiries from the membership for the facts regarding the establishment and history of the Memorial that this seems like an appropriate time to publish a brief resume in the News Letter.

For several years following Amelia Earhart's last flight from Lae, New Guinea, July 3, 1937, the Ninety-Nines were considering just what could be the most suitable form their memorial could take to best perpetuate the ideals of their first national president. Because of Amelia's unselfish enthusiasm and devotion to the advancement of opportunities for accomplishment for all women in the field of aviation, the Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Fund was created by the Ninety-Nines in 1940, and established by Resolution passed by the delegates at the National Meeting in July, 1941.

The entire administration of the Fund is carried out according to the terms of this Resolution by Five Trustees as follows: Alma Harwood of New York and Margaret Cooper Manser of New York are permanent trustees. The other three trustees serve for three years at a time, one new one being elected by the members of the Ninety-Nines each year on their regular national officer ballot, to succeed the one trustee going off. At present these trustees are Nancy Love, whose term empires this year, Ethel Sheehy till 1949, and Alice H. Hammond until 1950.

Money for the Fund is raised by the Chapters, Sections and members of the Ninety-Nines in various ways too numerous to mention here. The Scholarship is paid each year from the income only. Originally \$150.00 was set up as the annual Award, but at the National Meeting in September 1947 the delegates voted to increase the Award to \$200.00. This isn't a fortune, to be sure, but it is hoped that it can give a real lift to some member each year up the ladder of aeronautical accomplishment. Each Chapter, Section or individual member devises its own method of raising its contribution to the Fund each year, so the Memorial is a constantly living, growing tribute to Amelia Earhart. As the principal continues to grow, the income therefrom will increase so that the Award may be increased as time goes on.

These are the qualifications each applicant must meet:

- 1. She must have been a Ninety-Nine in good standing for at least two years.
- 2. She must have a minimum of 200 hours and hold a Private rating or better.
- 3. She must be earning not less that \$500 nor more than \$2,500 per year.

- 4. She must agree to keep up the rating or certification acquired through the Award for at least two years.
- 5. She must intend to work in the field of aviation.
- 6. She must mail her application so it will be post marked in accordance with the deadline on the application form.

Every application meeting the above requirements is read and carefully considered by each of the Trustees independently. She then sends in a sealed envelope to the Chairman of the Trustees a list of her selections of the eight she considers best qualified. When these selections are all received by the Chairman, she compiles the results, and sends the applications receiving the most votes to three judges chosen by the Trustees, men of outstanding experience in aviation, and they pick the winner. The Award is made at the Annual National Meeting.

Any member who meets the qualifications may apply as many years as she wishes, provided she has never received the Award. The money is applied toward tuition for any course of study or training in the school or institution of the winner's choice, which will advance her training for some career in aeronautics. It may be for an advanced airman rating, aeronautical angineering, aviation journalism, aerial photography, research, meteorologist, aviation medicine, aircraft or engine mechanic, etc., etc.

There is an application form for each of you in this issue of the News Letter, be sure to give us as much background and information about yourself as possible, and to have it in the mail before the deadline!!!!
