## IMPORTANT ANDOUNCEMISNT

## 1948 AMELIA BARHART LBPDRIAL SCHOLARSHIP APFLICATIONS

Inoluded in this issue of the News Lettor you will each find an appliaation form for the 1948 Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Award. He have roceived so many inquiries from the membership for the facts regarding the ostablishmont and history of the Memorial that this seems like an appropriate time to publish a brief resume in the News Letter.

For several years following Amelia Earhart's last flight from Lae, New Guines, July 3, 1937, the Ninety-Nines were oonsidering just what could be the most auitable foril their memorial oould take to best perpetuate the ideals of thoir first national president. Because of Amolia's unselfish onthusiasm and devotion to the adrancement of opportunities for acoomplishment for all women in the field of aviation, the Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Fund was croated by the Ninety-Nines in 1940, and ostablished by Resolution passed by the delegates at the National Meoting in July, 1941.

The entire administration of the Fund is oarried out aocording to the terms of this Resolution by Five Trustees as follows: Alma Harwood of Now York and Nargaret Cooper Manser of New York are permanent trustees. The other three trustees serre for three yoars at a tims, one new one being oleoted by the members of the Ninety-Nines each year on their regular national officer ballot, to suoceed the one trustee going off. At present these trustees are Nanoy Love, whose torm oxpires this year, Ethel Shoehy till 1949, and Alice H . Hammond until 1950.

Money for the Fund is raised by the Chapters, Sections and members of the Ninoty-Nines in various ways too numerous to mention here. The Saholarship is paid each year from the income only. Originally $\$ 150.00$ was set up as the annual Award, but at the National Moeting in Septomber 1947 the dolegates voted to increase the Award to $\$ 200.00$. This isn't a fortune, to be sure, but it is hoped that it can give a real lift to some momber each year up the ladder of acronautiaal accomplishment. Each Chapter, Section or individual member devises its own method of raising its contribution to the Fund each year, $s 0$ the Momorial is a constantly living, growing tribute to Amolia Earhart. As the prinoipal continues to grow, the inoome therefrom will increase so that the Award may be increased as time goes one

These are the qualifications oach applicant must meetz

1. She mast have been a Ninety-Nine in good standing for at least two yoars.
2. She mat have a minimm of 200 hours and hold a Private rating or better.
3. She must be earning not less that $\$ 500$ nor mure than $\$ 2,500$ per year.
4. She mast agree to keep up the rating or cortification acquired through the Award for at least two years.
5. She must intend to work in the field of eviation.
6. She mast mail her application so it will be ppst marked in accordance with the deadiline on the application forme.

Every application meeting the above requirements is read and carefully considered by each of the Trustees independently. She then sends in a sealed onvelope to the Chairman of the Trustees a list of her soloctions of the eight she considers best qualified. When these selections are all received by the Chairman, she comiles the results, and sends the applications receiving the most votes to three judges chosen by the Trustees, men of outstending experience in ariation, and they pick the winner. The Award is made at the Annual National Meeting.

Any member who meets the qualifications may apply as many years as she wishos, provided she has never received the Award. The money is applied toward taition for any course of study or training in the school or institution of the winner's ahoice, which rill advance her training for some oareer in aeronautics. It may be for an advanced airman rating, aeronautical angineering, aviation journalism. aerial photography, research, meteorologist, aviation medicine, airoraft or engine mechanic, etc., eto.

Thore is an application form for each of you in this issue of the News Letter, be sure to give us as much background and information about yourself as possible, and to have it in the mail before the deadinelitl
