THE 1948 AMELIA EARHART MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP WINNER

As announced at the Annual Meeting in Kansas City, Jean Hixson of Akron, Ohio was chosen by the judges to receive the 1948 Amelia Earhart Scholarship Award of \$200.00.

The men who selected Jean from among the various applicants were:

Colonel Cass S. Hough, Chairman of the Michigan Aeronautics Commission, President of the Daisy Manufacturing Company of Plymouth, Michigan, pilot and airplane owner for many years, Colonel Hough was commanding officer of the Combat Research Section of the 8th Air Force in England during World War II.

Colonel C. V. Burnett, Manager of Detroit City Airport, second busiest airport in the country, Marine Corps pilot in both World Wars, Operations officer at Henderson Field, Guadalcanal, Manager of the Curtiss-Wright School of Aviation at Grosse Ile, Michigan until it closed in 1932.

Mr. Mac J. Brian, Managing Director of the Windsor Flying Club, which is a member organization of the Royal Flying Clubs of Canada. Mr. Brian is a man with years of experience in training both military and civilian pilots for the Canadian Government.

Jean is the first of the Award winners who will not be using the Scholarship money for further flight training. She has all the ratings, single, multiengine, instructors's, control tower operator, etcalready. With all this wealth of experience, Jean has come to the conclusion that she can do more for the advancement of aviation by fitting herself to participate in the Air Age Education Program. So she is giving up her commercial instructing, and has enrolled as a student at Akron University in order to complete her requirements for a degree in Education preparatory to teaching aeronautics in a high school or college.

# WASHINGTON CHAPTER

The National Youth Day Air Show sponsored by the Naval Air Reserve Unit, Ninety-Nines Organization and Women Flyers of America attracted several thousand persons. The show was held at the Anacostia Naval Air Base.

Featured in the "Salute to Youth" were the Blue Angels, the Navy's sensational air acrobatic team led by Lieutenant Commander R. E. "Dusty" Rhodes and the spectacular jet team under Lieutenant Colonel Marion Carl. Fighting tactics and acrobatic maneuvers were performed at high speeds. The orowd also witnessed a realistic simulated attack on the air field by thirty six planes.

The program was opened by the arrival of the Girl Scout Cub Plane ferried by Pearle Robinson, Washington Ninety-Niner. Mr. W. T. Piper of Piper Aircraft presented the plane to the local Scout Troops. The plane is to be based at the Anacostia Field and local Ninety-Nine instructors will fly the plane to adjoining civilian fields for the scouts to gain air age education, radio indoctrination, familiarization rides and instruction with the consent of the scouts parents. A radio was denated by the Bendix Radio Incorporation and Sanders Aviation Corporation installed this aid for better coordination with the local traffic congestion.

Mrs. Blanche Noyes, National President of the Ninety-Nines Organization introduced speakers including Rear Admiral John H. Cassidy, Assistant Chief to the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Air; Captain Roy Simpler, Assistant Director of Public Relations for Air: Mrs. Adolphus Staton, President of the Washington Federation of Girl Scout Councils; Mrs. Beatrice Ecks, Director of the Wing Scouts; Captain Fredericke Funke, Jr., Commanding Officer Mayal Air Reserve Training Unit; Paul Garber, curator of National Museum; Mr. and Mrs. William Piper of Piper Aircraft, Loch Haven, Pennsylvania; J. Walton Colvin of Bendix Radio Corporation; Robert Sanders, President of Sander Aviation Corporation; Lieutenant Frances Biadaiz, President of Women Flyers of America: Jean Howard, Covernor Middle Eastern Section of Ninety-Nines Organization; and Mary Jane Livingston, Chairman of Washington Chapter Ninety-Nines.

Rear Admiral John H. Cassidy told the gathering civil aviation will play an ever increasing part in the aviation picture of the future and stated he expected to see the Wing Scouts of today flying airplanes such as used by the Navy and Marine exhibition teams.

Mr. Paul Garber requested the Wing Scouts make a model of their plane and stated it would be placed on display in the Smithsonian Institute.

Presentation of wings earned by the Wing Scouts was made by W. T. Piper with Lieutenant Commander "Dusty" Rhodes and Lieutenant Colonel Marion Carl pinning the awards.

The program closed with the first Wing Scout, Brenda Barradell, receiving a ride in the Scout Plane piloted by Ninety-Niner Miss. Claire Callaghan.

Several types of fighters, transports and aircraft engines were on display.

Miss Katherine Stinson, CAA aeronautical engineer, entertained the Washington Chapter in her home in Chevy Chase.

A business meeting was held and plans for the Wing Scout Plane were arranged. A memorial was discussed in honor of Helen McGilvery who was involved in an airplane accident. Plans were presented for a scholarship for a private license to be given each year to a Wing Scout. Ninety-Nine instructors will donate the instruction.
