

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PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

Dear Members:

Many of the 99's who haven't met Mrs. Amy Otis Earhart are wondering what she is like. Mrs. Earhart is a tall reed-slim lady, with a very active mind. Those of us who were fortunate enough to know Amelia and her mother often comment on their similarity in appearance, thought, and spirit. It seems that Amelia's love for the 99 Club and for women fliers is perpetuated in her mother, Mrs. Earhart, whose every thought and action is motivated by love and kindness. And she thinks of the 99 Club as "her children."

Her courage and beauty of thought are a symbol for all who know her. How that frail slender body can carry a heart so full of love and affection is beyond me. But, each and everyone of the 99 Club members, whether they know this lovely lady or not, I am sure are wishing her a very happy Christmas and New Year.

Thought all the members would be interested to know that two more aids for airmen--listing of airports where weather information is available, and a list of the frequencies guarded by CAA communications stations and tower--have been added to the bi-weekly "Airman's Guide;" this has just been announced by D. W. Rentzel Administrator of Civil Aeronautics.

In addition, the Flight Information Manual, which complements the Guide, hereafter will include a tabulation of Danger Areas. The changes and additions have been made on the basis of a recent survey in which subscribers to the Guide discussed its content and value.

Information on Danger Areas will include their location, the times when they are activated, which ones may be flown over above certain minimum altitudes, and to whom requests for permission to fly over or land should be directed.

The Airman's Guide, besides being an in-flight and pre-flight reference publication, enables the cross-country flier to bring his aeronautical charts, issued every six months, up-to-date. This is true, Mr. Rentzel stated, because the Airman's Guide lists in every two-weekly issue an average of 20 airport abandonments, 23 new airports, and 450 changes in airport servicing, lighting end other facilities.

To increase the factor of safety in cross-country flight, all fliers are requested to study the Guide before take-off. It is posted on all airport bulletin boards. Individual fliers desiring personal copies may obtain them from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C. The subscription price, covering 26 issues of the Guide and two issues of the Flight Information Manual, is \$6.00 a year.

TO CHAPTER AND SECTION OFFICERS AND MEMBERS:

As you enter the new year, the Trustees of the Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship are interested in what you are planning as a contribution to the Fund. Your support in the past has brought the Fund almost to the point where it can be self-sustaining. But the goal has not yet been reached where the interest from the Fund will provide the full annual scholarship of \$200, for the yield on savings and bonds today is far short of that of 10 years ago.

We must continue until the added capital needed to make the fund self-sustaining can be raised. You will remember that after two years of deliberation by the 99's, the scholarship to assist some girl, who had already proven her interest and integrity in aviation, was decided upon as the most fitting way in which to honor our first president, and year after year it has continued to serve as a truly living memorial.

The Fund has been built over the past ten years by members, sometimes penny by penny, frequently by chapter activity, and by direct donation. Some of the more active chapters have sent checks running into three, and in one case, four figures! If these fine contributions by a few large chapters could be supplemented, even if only in a small way, by the other chapters, so that all will have participated in creating this memorial fund, the remaining burden will not rest solely on the few who have helped so well and faithfully in the past. Ways of raising money range from air shows, dances, raffles, and sale of special items like match folders and 99 insignia tumblers, to direct contribution by chapter and individual.

Each year the Scholarship Award helps one of our members, chosen after careful study of her application (a copy of which goes to every member in the spring), by our 5 Trustees and 3 outside judges. On reading over the applications, we often wish we could make several awards, so worthwhile do many requests seem. The at present we can only make one, the \$200 not only helps the recipient in some field of aviation but brings to her an honor not measured in material things. We can all be proud of our Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship.
