

Since our Constitution provides that "no officer shall serve more than two consecutive years in the same office", this year new people must be chosen for three out of the four offices as well as the two committees. Each year one member must be chosen for the Scholarship Fund Committee. This Committee is composed of two Permanent Trustees, Alma Harwood and Margaret Manser, and three elected members on three year terms. Melba Beard and Marian Bertram continue in office but Alice Hammond's term expires in August of this year.

Former nominating committees have found it helpful when consent was obtained from the candidate before submitting her name to the committee. This will be doubly appreciated this year when the time is so short. TRANSCONTINENTAL AIR RACE

At the National Meeting in NYC in September, the delegates created an official Transcontinental Air Race Chairman, empowered to select four other Ninety-Nine members as a committee to plan and conduct this event each year. Elected was Mardo Crane, Chairman. Committee members appointed are: Bea Medes, Newport Beach, Calif.; Betty Loufek, Compton, Calif.; Barbara London, Long Beach, Calif.; and Evelyn Briggs, San Diego, Calif.

Data on this year's Transcontinental Air Race is: Prizes and trophies - to be announced later. Start - Lindberg Field, San Diego, Calif. (Mary Ring,

Chairman of San Diego Chapter, in charge.)

Date - Sunday, June 11, 1950

Eastern Terminus - Greenville, South Carolina. (Amalie Stone, Chairman Carolinas Chapter, in charge.)

Route - San Diego, Tucson, El Paso, Dallas, Shreveport, Meridian, Montgomery, Atlanta, Charleston, Greenville. (Because the x-c was shorter this year than last, the committee felt that in order to make the race truly transcontinental it could run to the coast and still end in Greenville, which offered so many inducements to entrants to come there.) RETURN via National Convention in Texas!

Rules - Women only; 0-300 HP lightplanes; handicapped according to manufacturer's advertized cruising speed; entry must be filed by midnight, June 6; plane must be impounded at Lindberg Field by 12 o'clock noon the day before the race starts (June 10). (For complete rules, write Transcontinental Air Race Committee Headquarters, 8617 Finder Avenue, Plays Del Rev. Celif.)

IMPORTANT NOTICE REGARDING NEXT YEAR'S RACE:

The Air Race Committee has established these policies regarding conduct of future air races:

1. All bids from cities desiring the start or finish of the air race must be submitted through a Ninety-Nine's chapter (since this is now a national 99's event), and the chapter submitting the bid must be willing to be responsible to the air race committee for the conduct of the race in said city or cities. First bid must be presented to the Air Race Committee at the time of the National Convention (this year, in Texas, June 21-25). Final details of bids, complete in writing, must be presented to the committee by September 1.

No chapter will be allowed to have the air race start or finish more than two years in succession,

unless no other bid is received.
