

Are you aware of PROPOSED ACTION on the part of CAB? SUBJECT: RESCISSION OF PART 51 - GROUND INSTRUCTOR RAT-ING. LOIS HAILEY in El Paso has sent me a copy of her individual reply which treats in full the three aspects of the proposal. 1. The biggest single cause of aircraft accidents is poor and insufficient instruction.

2. Are there QUALIFIED personnel for the job as a result of military and other increase in flying? (as CAB claims) 3. How many personnel would be released? (CAA men from certification to inspection). All communications received by Jan. 2, 1951 will be considered by CAB before taking further action on the proposed rules-Individually, you have an opportunity to express your feelings on the rescission of the Ground Instructor Rating. AMELIA EARHART MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

It is always a pleasure to transmit good news. On behalf of the Trustees of our Memorial Scholarship Fund, I want to thank the chapters, sections, and individuals whose efforts and contributions have brought the Fund closer to its goal of earning \$200 for the annual Scholarship Award. (Income on cash and bonds amounted to \$156.94 this year.) Those contributing additions to the principal were:

1949 All-Woman Air Show, Inc., \$66.31; "Practice Problems for Pilot Certificates" by Betty Lambert, a project of the San Diego Chapter, \$50.00; New England Section, \$36.25.

Those contributing approximately \$25 each: San Diego; Iowa; Colorado; Greater Kansas City; Michigan; and Indiana Chapters; New York-New Jersey Section; and South Central Section. Those contributing \$5 to \$13 were: Minnesota; Upper Iowa; Texas; Los Angeles; Bay Cities; N.Y.-N.J. Section, in memory of Charles Harwood; and "Hangar Flying, Inc." by Helen Grienke, (Ill.)

It would be both interesting and helpful to other chapters to know how some of these groups raised their money. Next year we will include this with our list.

At the annual meeting it was the opinion of the Trustees that a concentrated money raising program was no longer necessary, but that more chapters should be encouraged to send small sums, thus broadening the support for our Memorial Scholarship, and reducing the burden now resting on a faithful few. This year 18 contributions were received, as commared to 12 last year!

DUTIES OF CHAPTER MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMEN (To be read by all members).

- Appoint several committee members to assist the chairman.
- Immediately notify National Headquarters of CHANGE OF ADDRESS of members; change of NAME (when a member is married), etc.

- 3. Maintain an UP-TO-DATE ROSTER of members in the chapter, which, if it is possible, should be circulated to each member in the chapter, headquarters, and national officers.
- 4. Stimulate activity within the chapter to obtain NEW MEMBERS.
- 5. CONTACT MEMBERS WHO DO NOT OFTEN ATTEND MEETINGS.
 Remember "Gain a member, retain a member."
- Read the CONSTITUTION, especially those portions governing membership status.
- 7. See that any new members coming to meetings are introduced to all and generally act as a HOSTESS (unless the particular chapter has a hospitality chairman).
- 8. Screen all application blanks and sign after necessary requirements have been complied with. (Some chapters require that a prospective member attend at least two meetings before she is voted upon.) Each PROSPECTIVE MEMBER must be SPONSORED by an active member who knows her or will accept the responsibility.
- 9. Prospective members may be ADMITTED only THROUGH the CHAPTERS in their OWN AREA where they reside. (If another chapter is geographically nearer, a transfer may be arranged later by mutual agreement by both chapters.)

THE CHICAGO CHAPTER

The picture below is one of a portion of the Chicago Chapter of the 99s, that was taken at one of the "fly-in" meetings this summer.

Some of the jobs that our members engage in are: air-show performer, crop duster, air line link operator, air line dispatcher, flight instructor, instrument flight instructor, research in aviation psychology, control tower operator, CAA air-marking controller. There are some of the gals who were members of the old Chicago Girls Flying Club, plus a number of ex-Wasps.

Since the war, we have been trying to increase the scope of our flying activities. Along this line we have originated an annual Air Meet. The purpose: to increase flying skill, to work together and to have fun together. We have recently held the second of these air meets in which local operators sponsored the events. With the complete cooperation of the airfields in the Chicago area, the air meets have not only been successful but fun for all concerned.

All in all, we feel the Chicago Chapter is the best chapter in the Chicago area. Not only that, we feel we are the best Chicago Chapter in the whole country.

Letter from Margaret Hughes:

Mas you know, I'm teaching just now at the Forfar Academy, which is about 15 miles out of Dundee. Everyone here has been swell to me and the students are sorta awe-stricken with having an American teacher. Aside from speaking with a thick brogue and wearing kilts and short trousers to School, they're just like the kids at home. I have to laugh everytime I meet one of them in town - they salute - makes you feel like a second lieutenant. You should see me parading around in my black robe and being very dignified. My only problem so far has been becoming well acquainted with the money system - after all, I'm supposed to teach business math along with algebra and geometry. But I've got it down now so I can even figure people's income tax for them.

"There is very little private flying here but one of the few civil aerodromes is only about 15 miles from here so I have been out there to join their organization and am now a bona fide member. Had to pass an exam on British CAR before I could get my British license - but am all set now. There are only 4 types of aircraft used for private flying at present - the Tiger-Moth which is the RAF primary trainer, like a Stearman; the Auster, a plush Taylor-craft; the Chipmunk, a new RAF primary trainer, which looks like a small BT with a retractable gear; and the four place job that looks like a Bellanca. Flying weather is very tricky and most commercial pilots have instrument ratings. It is bright sunshine one minute and half an hour later the mountains are completely fogged in.

"Recently went to the RAF base to see the "Battle of Britain" air show. Apparently there were no minimum altitude restrictions because the fellows came right down on the deck with the acrobatics. It was the first time I saw a Spitfire or similar plane do inverted flight at 50 feet. They used their new jet, the Meteor (like our Sabre) and the Vampires for acrobatics.

"Women seem to have much greater opportunity here than at home - at least they are more readily accepted in all professions. The country is full of women doctors, dentists, lawyers, architects and chemists, etc.

"So far I've managed to keep from gaining much weight, but believe me it is a problem. This business of eating four (continued on page 8)
