

EXEC. BOARD DISCUSSES NEW HEADQUARTERS SITE

DIRECT FROM THE EXECUTIVE MEETING, MINCO, OKLAHOMA

Your Executive Board has just concluded its pre-convention meeting in this colorful Mid-Western setting, where the entire board has been the guests of your International treasurer, Broneta Davis. This added a most enjoyable and devious note to the occasion. Executive representation was exceedly gratifying. However, due to pressing business matters, Kaddy Landry was unable to attend. Much of the Executive Board's time was spent discussing the possibilities of new headquarters sites, since the resignation of Alice Klutas has been accepted. Miss Klutas has handled our headquarters work since 1951.

It was the unanimous opinion of the board that the Ninety-Nines

should have their own permanent headquarters - one preferably, that would be centrally located geographically. Such a site would make our headquarters more accessible to members and make easier the handling of business matters. The proposed headquarters should also afford ample space to display the many historical trophies and mementos accumulated by members during the last 25 years. Many times we were forced to refuse gifts of importance to the Ninety-Nines only because space to display them properly was lacking. At present writing, your Ninety-Nines archives consists of many priceless mementos - among them many personal effects of Amelia Earhartwhich the board feels should be displayed where all may see them.
Unfortunately, most of these items are scattered far and wide across the country. Now is the time for us to gather them together at one central point. And what would be

more fitting than to have them displayed at your Ninety-Nines Headquarters? A headquarters that is indicative of the growth of our organization...one that can properly portray the dignity and calibre of the Ninety-Nines.

However, we are not going to rush blindly into a permanent headquarters site until we have had ample time to thoroughly check all possibilities.

The Executive Board has decided to present to the members, for your approval, a change in the Constitution which will enable us to raise the present dues to \$10 (To be voted on by annually. Chapter delegates at the International Convention in July) This increase should more than enable us to (1) establish a permanent Ninety-Nines Headquarters, (2) to furnish and maintain such an office in the proper manner, (3) to publish our 12 page Newsletter, (4) to in-crease the amount of expense money allotted to International Officers and Committee Chairmen. . which, in turn, will enable them to do an even better job, (5) to increase the amount of money refunded to the Chapters from members' dues, (6) and to make possible a fund to support Ninety-Nines developmental projects. From time to time, the Ninety-Nines are called upon to contribute funds to other aviation organizations for activities that we, as an Executive Board feel we should support in the interest of aviation. Such participation would most certainly be good public relations, and good publicity for the Ninety-Nines as an International aviation organization. present budget, however, will not allow us to do this.

Ninety-Nines sponsored events should have more financial support from the International Organization.
This increase in dues will make such support possible. In the beginning, the major portion of this fund would be allocated to the relocating and refurnishing of your permanent Ninety-Nines headquarters. However, let us be ever mindful, all of the aforementioned can only become a reality if we vote to raise our dues.

Plans are shaping up nice y for the Convention entertainment. The time is really almost upon us-three months to be exact. Not any too early to make plans to attend.

Chapters don't forget to send in your BIDS for the 1956 Convention. If you are considering asking for the Convention, the bids should be mailed to me or to Deedo Heise, secretary, by June 15th.

Sorry I couldn't attend all the Sectional Meetings this last month. Your plans sounded interesting and fun. I find my job does get in the way occasionally. Am planning on attending the Northwest Sectional Meeting in Boise, Idaho May 13, 14, 15th, as I have not as yet attended a sectional in the Northwest. Dear resident:

As one of the 99's I am pleased to inform you that I received the annual "PAUL TISSANDIER" award for 1954. This award, instituted by the F.A.I. for outstanding aeronautical actions, was given to me for the trip (Solo-Flight) around the three Americas in 1951, using a 90 HP Cessna, crossing the Andes (Chile and Argentina) at 16400 feet, then to Fort Yukon in Alaska, visiting 29 countries, flying 25,000 miles, including a visit to La Paz (Bolivia) with their 12000 feet high airport. From the President of Bolivia, I received, as only woman in the world, the condecoration "Condor de Los Andes."

My plane is actually being exhibited at the International Trade Fair of the Fourth Centenary of the city of Sao Paulo. For the time being, due to the acute dollar shortage it is impossible for me to visit your beautiful country again, but I hope that this difficult situation for Brazil changes in the near future.

After dinner, we all went over to the Curtiss-Wright Corporation plant, Electronics Division, at Carlstadt, N. J...Thanks to Kay Brick! Her ground work led to the fulfillment of this program. We were welcomed by Capt. Harry Sartorus and given visitor tags after signing in. We were taken to a lecture room where we listened to Murray Brilliant tell of their instrument Flight Duplicator, to satisfy the requirement of the Armed Services and the Airlines for synthetic flight and navigational training aid.

One after another, we climbed into the cockpit, attained altitude, tried to keep her level, watched the instruments. We listened to the instructor who answered our questions. He seemed to enjoy the interest shown.

After seeing the Duplicator, we were shown the CV-340 Simulator which the Curtiss-Wright Corp. manufactured. This Simulator is designed for coordinated flight crew training, reproducing the controls, instruments and responses of the CV-340. It enables pilots, without leaving the ground, to fly anywhere-utilizing the identical navigational aids available on the particular route to be flown. Emergency situations which could

be encountered in the actual aircraft can be duplicated as often as necessary to insure the safety of flight.

Our Novetah Davenport who has just returned from the National Aviation Education Council convention in St. Louis, as a representative from Girl Scouts of U.S.A., says all should be proud of 99's contribution to this successful meeting-from Jackie Cochran on down...

WASHINGTON, D. C. - HAVANA, CUBA



The Sixth International Air Race is set for June 9-14 from Washington, D. C. to Havana, Cuba. Here is the tentative schedule --

Proposed festivities in Washington prior to June 9th Take-Off (National Airport)

Ron Key West on June 10th Customs Requirements a barbecue
Race termination in Havana, June 11.
A day and night at Varadero Beach
(90 miles from Havana)
Awards Banquet and proposed military
ball in Havana, June 13th.
(Bathing suit and a type of formal
gown required.)

Cash prizes of \$2,000 (6 places) are being donated by the Cuban Government, which is also awarding 3 permanent trophies. This is in addition to the Rickenbacker Trophy which rotates for first place and the Labatte Trophy for second place.

The race is open to all types of aircraft. There will be individual, open handicaps. Air and sea escort service will stand by from Key West to Havana on the 11th and return on the 14th. The entry fee of \$25 will include a "Mae West" for pilot and co-pilot, to be picked up at Broward Airport. The Committee estimates race contestants expenses from Key West to Cuba and return will be approximately \$25.

Deadline for Race Entries-May 15. peadline for planes in Washington-June 6.

Request for applications should be made to the Chairman, Dorothea Vermorel. Detailed plans on Washington, Key West and Cuban arrangements are in the making and will be announced later.

UPPER IOWA CHAPTER By: Betty Barton






many towns already lined up and just waiting for us to "drop in". By the time this appears in print, we hope to have 6 or 8 airmarkers completed.
