

If your chapter is still looking for a project to help raise funds, this is a good time to start planning a dance to be given in the Spring.

Some hotels are willing to make no charge for a room if they can sell food and drinks but others will not. So, if heavy expenses are to be incurred you have to be able to sell a great many tickets in order to have a profit.

Our chapter sponsors a contest for "Miss Aviation". Girls are sponsored by various flight schools, airports, airlines and other aviation organizations and business-Each ticket has a stub attached for the purchaser to vote for his choice and the purchaser to vote for his choice and the one getting the most votes wins. We also give \$100 in flight time to the winner and the girls and their sponsors work very hard to sell tickets in order to get the most votes. Interest runs high and such a contest gets better publicity than just a dance. We usually clear \$350-600, although our expenses run about \$500. We have had such a contest for several years and some things we have learned the hard way, so if any chapter is interested in a similar project; if you will write me, I can send you more information.

Hangar dances are fun and can be put on without much expense. Square dance callers and juke boxes can be used for music at a small cost and you can sell your own sand-wiches and refreshments.

For sandwiches at such a dance or for any other occasion, see if there is a Stewart In-Fra-Red company in your town. Here, the will furnish a machine (for free) and sell sandwiches already packaged in cellophane which are put in the machine and are cooker and ready to serve in 3-4 minutes. They will also take back any not used. Practically no work involved and all clear profit. I understand there are other similar machines, but this is the only one I have seen.




1955 Air Tour:
