Batry boselil, France: Betty is still with the Import \& Export Section of the Air Ministry. Her year has been busy and prodictive. She set three world records (still good as of Christmas) which have been recognized by the F.A.I.

In the Mistral, single jet fighter on Jannary 26,1955 , she captired the record on the 1000 k on a closed circi1t; March 1, distancs in a straight line; February 22, distance in a closed circuit.

She has also flown the Vampire Jet and now owns "about 100 hours on the fets. I wish coul share some with you". There's a real friend.

On Jannary 1, 1956, she was rolled down 9000 foot Val d'Ssere and covered in a yard of snow - resclied - ankles and ilingers sorained "No more skilng! It would have been too silly to have died that way.

MAIE CASEY, Allstralia: Met her hubby recently in Bangkock on his way back from Europe. On the ensiling visit to most of the Sollth Jast Asian countries, she met women pllots. "In Siam, Bangkock, the Aunt of the Queen, Princess Palnu, is quite an experienced pilot. It is difficult to own a private plane there on account of opium minning which is liable to be conducted by alr. There are several women pilots in Indonesia, bit there, too, private flying is quite restricted and the country they fly over is unfailingly heavily wooded or else broken in into small wet paddy fields, not at all appetising after our stretches of open cointry here." Male has been doing lots of flying, both in the F24 and the Messenger.

NANCY ELLIS LEEBOLD, Anstralia: Nancy has been elected Federal President of the Australian Women's Pllots Assn. For her 12,000 mile delivery flight of a 4 place Miles Messenger, 53 of which was over water from England to Australia, she won the annual Evelyn Follet Trophy.

From Nancy herself: "No troubles on the flying or aircraft side, but were weighed
down by officialdom and paper work. I spent hours at a time on instrimenta when on the long ocean hops...on all there was very low clond or haze or both. Mist do some more long ocean hops; have the Pacific in mind for the future..." Sich is the ambition of our A.E. Scholarship winner

FREDA THOMPSON, Alstralia, is fust back from a six-month pant to South Africa and South East Asia. I am longing to drag my little Moth ort of the hanger cnce again and blow the cobwebs off 1t." A new Ninety-Nine soon sored by Maie Casey, Freda is probably the most experienced woman pilot in Anstralia having been flying since 1930. as early as 1934 she flew solo from Ingland to Anstralia in a Moth Major. No radio, but had a 1000 mile range. In 1950 she flew around Australia, some 10,000 miles in a Hornet Moth and in 195 ? flew to New Guines. Anter dinner (which was preceded by cocktails courtesy Republic Aviaton!), Roland C. Berg, Vice Chairman of Aeronaytical Activi ties of this Section of S.A.5., introduced the speaker, Lt. Col. John Pari Stapp, authority on aero medical research and who has personally completed rocket sled high speed acceleration and deceleration tests

The banquet room was filled to capacity With engineers, $99^{\prime}$ s and guests who list ened breathlessly to Col. Stapp who gave a succinct commentary as moving pictures and slides were shown of the actual tests, with closeups of physical after effects.

Hearing Col. Stapp tell so unassumingly of what he terms "human salvage", made us realize our privilege in listening to a tmily great American who is giving himself $100 \%$ mentally and physically to saving manpower needed to operate our jet powered machines.

Plctures were also shown of a sedan which was towed at extremely high speed into a concrete wall. The car contained four dumminies, two wearing seat belts and two withorst. As your can imagine, the two free dummies were shuttled around in the car and blown through the windshield to crash on the pavement many feet away, while the dummies secured by seat belts were still in place and had not been stryck. The force of the impact cmimpled the entire front of the car but did not destroy beyond. Running the film in slow motion the second time, corroborated Col. Stapp's figures on human salvage by the use of seat belts. He sald he always fastens his seat belt before he starts his automobile engine!
