Dear 99 Members:

Even though Ihaven't been contacting your chapters individually, I have kept in contact with you and your flying activities through the articles in the monthly Newsletter. It certainly is an inspiration to see how much flying is being done by members of our organization, and I then begin to wonder how much time is spent in the air by girls who fly but who are not members of the 99's. If we could total the two, I imagine the sum would be overwhelming.

Since there doesn't seem to be any rules and regulations governing the duties of the Flying Activities Chairman and since the many, many Fly-ins, breakfast hops and all the Women's Sky Derby's and such, seem to be the main stimulus to our activities, I decided it might be worthwhile and cer-I decided it might be worthwhile and certainly very interesting to write some member in our foreign countries to find out what they are doing. To date I have received, among others, a letter from Hideko Yokoyama of Tokyo, and I feel it will be most interesting to print these letters in the Newsletter.

"Dear Isabelle: I have received your inter esting letter and I am indeed very pleased with it. It certainly was a very good surprise for me to hear from you who is contributing a great deal as a woman in the field of aviation in your country. I feel sorry not being able to tell you very much about aviation in Japan at present for it is only in a stage of infancy. We have as yet to learn a great deal from your country in this field. Especially when there are only two woman pilots in my country at the present moment, you can easily imagine that present moment, you can easily imagine that not much be expected. So for myself, I am running a confectionery called "Ginza Fugetoudo" here at Ginza, Tokyo with my husband. I also work as a permanent inspector for Central Aviation Corporation of which my husband is the president. I am very happy to tell you that recently I was lucky to be given a rare opportunity to fly in an American Jet plane through the kindness of Far East Air Command. By the way, my license number is "Commercial Pilot No. 259" and own a Cessna No. 170. So you may have already heard or read there are

many hurdles to jump for Japanese women to do anything new because of the feudalistic idea which still remain among Japanese people. Your letter encouraged me a great deal and will do so in the future whenever I hear from you. Expecting to hear from you. I remain.



SANTA CLARA VALLEY CHAPTER By: Ardell Hauk





PERCENT OF HOURS FLOWN BY TYPE OF FLYING


