Kenny and many of the patients are looking forward to the day when I can take them for an airplane ride. It will take a DC-3 to handle the patient, stretcher, Huxley or Monahan respirator, and the rest of the equipment, but when they are better I will try to get them the plane ride. They are all so grateful for little things.

Another year has rolled around to open competition for the annual A M E L I A EARHART MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP. Are you planning to embark upon a career in some field of aviation or, if you are already "embarked," do you need an additional rating or additional training to boost that career? Will \$300 help you out? \$300 is the nice tidy sum that will be available to the winner of the 1957 A M E L I A EARHART MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP.

You are eligible to enter the competition if -

- 1. You have been an ACTIVE Ninety-Nine member for TWO consecutive years immediately prior to September 1956 and your membership is still in good standing for this current fiscal year;
- 2. You have at least 200 solo hours since acquiring your private rating:
- 3. You agree to use the rating or training acquired thru the Award for at least TWO years in an Aeronautical field:
- 4. You are earning at least \$1,000, but not more than \$3,500 per year. If you are married, your husband's income and your family's status and needs will also be considered by the judges.

Among Our Members-At-Large

We have the pleasure of presenting this month:

Anesia Pineiro Machado of Sao Paulo, Brazil, who has been referred to as the "dean of all women flyers of the world" has enough firsts in aviation attached to her name to place her high on the list of men and women flyers. However, she's probably prouder of being called a "pilot's pilot" than any other title that has been bestowed on her. While Mrs. Machado's name is known in aviation circles that encircle the world, she is equally well known in the diplomatic circles of many areas.

To say anyone is the "dean" of anything is a touchy business. However, Mrs. Machado today is holder of the oldest active license than any other woman pilot in the world (License n 77, F.A. I. - April 9, 1922). Mrs. Machado was the first Brazilian flyer to make a transcontinental flight over the Americas, flying from New York to Rio de Janeiro via Central America and Pacific Coast to Chile. During this flight she crossed the Andes at 23,080 feet, if this doesn't impress the reader then take a look at the map, study the terrain of Brazil, looking closer at the territory marked "uninhabited." Quite a feat even in these days. It was on this tour that she served as diplomat bringing messages from the presidents of all the countries she had visited on her good will flight to the President of Brazil.

For her efforts in behalf of aviation and of "good will" she was awarded Chile's highest decoration, the first time it had ever been presented to a woman. Brazil, in turn, has presented her with most every medal bestowed by that Republic. Most pioneer pilots can point with pride to one or two "firsts" in their lives, but few can claim as many as those attached to the career of Anesia Pineiro Machado.

EASTERN PENNSYLVANIA CHAPTER By Peggy Borek




