It is an Efficiency Cruise Race for light stock-model aircraft of less than 300 hp; the winners will be determined on the basis of fuel consumption and speed with relation to the manufacturer's claimed performance for each type of aircraft. By this method, the most skillful pilot has an opportunity to win regardless of the size and horse-power of the airplane.

Course: Mineral Wells, Texas; Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; Joplin, Missouri; Wichita, Kansas, a total of 555 miles in the great Midwest.
