President's Column


May 1, 1958

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION

Proposed By The Executive Committee

To amend Article IV, Section 2, Paragraph D of the Constitution by striking out the paragraph "Honorary: Upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee outstanding women who are, or have been, active in aviation may be elected honorary members, at the annual meeting. Honorary members shall be exempt from dues and may not vote."

REASON: That since is organization 29 years ago, the Ninety-Nines has never named an honorary member. Furthermore, as there have been no standards set up for choosing such a member, it would be difficult for the Committee to make such a recommendation.

Proposed Amendments to Standard Constitution For Sections

Proposed By The Executive Committee

To amend Article IV, Section 6 of the Standard Constitution for sections by striking out "after the annual international meeting."

Proposed By The Executive Committee

To amend Article X, Section 3 of the Standard Constitution for sections by striking out "after the section election."

REASON for the above two proposals: That, by the removal of this time restriction on elections, chapters and sections may elect closer to the end of the fiscal year. This will allow earlier committee appointments, facilitate the roster printing and, in general, keep the chapter and section in organization which starts its activities on September 1.
