All-Woman Transcontinental Air Race

The All-Woman Transcontinental Air Race will take off from Torrance Municipal Airport July 9th and deadline for finishing at New Castle County Airport, Wilmington, Delaware is July 13th, Deadline for Impounding airplanes at Wilmington will be July

Entries for the 1960 AWTAR will open April 20, 1960 and will close June 20, 1960. Sequence of numbers for all entries with the postmark of April 20th will be determined by drawing and all subsequent Air Race numbers will be assigned by individual post mark

The race course of 2,516 statute miles follows a route via Needles, Calif., Prescott and Winslow, Ariz., Albuquerque, N. M., Amarillo, Tex., Oklahoma City, Okla., Ft. Smith, Ark., Memphis, Chattanooga and Johnson City, Tenn., Roanoke, Va., and MUST STOPS at Chattanooga and Roanoke.

Airplanes to be eligible for the 1960 AWTAR must have a date of manufacture after January 1, 1950 and be not less than 85 horsepower and not more than 350 horsepower. Two-way VHF radio is mandatory for all airplanes.

All information, rules and regulations, application for entry, airplane 'par speeds" and other information for prospective contestants will be ready for mailing February 1, 1960. Send your requests for information to AWTAR, Inc. Headquarters, 2611 East Spring St., Long Beach 6, Calif.

From Africa We Present . . .

In 1949 I obtained my "A" then private pilots license. Within 18 months I had a commercial license, and later a Senior Commercial license which I have unfortunately lost due to financial difficulty in keeping up an Instrument Rating. (Here I.F. ratings must be renewed every six months and this involves a lot of money.) In South Africa I won a couple of trophies for general flying, and in Rhodesia I held the not very wonderful record for altitude (light aircraft, women only) of 19,300 ft. in a very old Tiger Moth. The altitude was not so much, but at

least the only man to beat this, reached 20,000 feet, also in a Tiger, 20 years ago.

My first commercial job was carried out in Basutoland, South Africa's Switzerland. I enjoyed this thoroughly. I learned a lot and flew hard, but got no pay at all, which made life a bit difficult. I joined South African Airways as hostess until I married a pilot. I scrounged a bit of commercial flying (again unpaid) in Bechuanaland where we then lived. In Salisbury, Southern Rhodesia, I later flew for a charter company (one that paid, for a change) spraying tsetse flies at Kariba Dam Site, in a Tiger Moth, and later flying passengers in a 10 seater Gore 19 (like the old Auson, only the 19 has a VP prop, metal covering, and does not have the undercart wound up with 149 strokes).

Now, in the Congo, flying is limited, as costs are terribly high, and I just manage to keep up my Commercial license. Flying as a job is not possible for me in the Congo, due to a surplus of men pilots, and of course the usual prejudice, but maybe one day they will change their minds about women pilots.
