(Continued from Page 1) ville, Lynchburg, Hagerstown and Atlantic City.

AWARDS: The overall purse of \$2500 will be divided between the first five places—\$800 for first place, \$600 for second place, \$500 for third place, \$400 for fourth place, \$200 for fifth place.AWTAR trophies will be awarded to these five places.

"Leg Prizes" will be awarded for the highest score made between each of the "designated" airports.

Cash awards will be made for the highest score made by each category of airplane in which there are at least three in competition.

Other additional awards will be announced later.

Ninety Nine chapters will again be able to purchase official AWTAR programs for their members. Each chapter and section chairman will receive an order form so that programs will be available to Ninety-Nines, Inc. anywhere. The price will be 50 cents per copy (75 cents is airmail).

Remember, airplanes to be eligible for the 1961 AWTAR must have a date of manufacture after Jan. 1, 1961 and be not less than 85 horsepower and not more than 400 horsepower for take-off. Two-way VHF radio is mandatory.


