She is a great girl and one can readily understand why she was deemed eligible for the first woman astronaut ready for outer space. Ceil Hamilton introduced Jerri by telling us of her many valuable qualifications which she was able to observe while flying as her co-pilot in an Aero Commander across the Atlantic. And who could have found a better place to observe. Jerri thrilled us with her information about the 16 women who are now being tested at Lovelace Foundation in Albuquerque for their suitability as women astronauts and all of them are 99's. How about that! Seven or nine of them will ultimately be selected. She gave us a run-down on the various rigorous tests she endured for which she had to train extensively and intensively. She pointed out that women are more suitable in some respects for outer space travel than men, due to size, weight, emotional stability, less susceptibility to radio-activity. In other areas men are better equipped for the task. After Jerri's very interesting talk, we asked questions and she happily answered all, Marion Lopez. our governor, presented Jerri with a 99 silver pin and asked her to wear it on her first trip to the moon. Our hats off to Jerri Cobb.

We were also very fortunate to have with us Paul Coulhardt of Nafec our Atlantic City host. He extended his felicitations to us and is ready to welcome all of us in July—and you will want to greet him.


ALBUQUERQUE CHAPTER Mary Morgan
