## AIRPORT BEAUTIFICATION

The First Lady wrote: "What an appropriate place the airport is for communities to emphasize in the beautification programs, since it inevitably makes a first and vivid impression on arriving guests."

The FAA Women's Advisory Committee on Aviation, most of whom are Ninety-Nines, is working on plans for airport beautification and with the cooperation of the Ninety-Nines, the program should show great progress.

President Alice Roberts encourages 99 participation in this program. Ninety-Nines, familiar with all aspects of airport safety, can serve as liaison between airport managers and local civic organizations to stimulate airport beautification activities, encouraging general airport cleanup including removal

of unsightly rubbish, painting, and planting of shrubs and flowers.

Assistance in promoting airport beautification is available from your local FAA office and WACOA members. State Aeronautic Departments, the American Association of Airport Executives and the Airport Operators Council have been contacted and support the program. Kits containing helpful material may be obtained from the WACOA member in your area or by addressing a request to: Women's Advisory Committee on Aviation, c/o Mrs. Nona Quarles, GA-5, Federal Aviation Agency, 800 Independence Avenue, S. W., Washington, D. C. 20553.

## 1966 International Convention

(Have not received an official report on the meeting but will attempt to summarize the order of business — from memory and partially legible notes — for the 2500 members unable to attend.

A quorum was declared following the call to order by President Alice Roberts, June 30, Seattle, Washington. All committee reports were accepted as read except Resolutions and AE Commemorative Stamp which required delegate action.

Resolutions: Amendment to requirement for membership from Eastern Washington Chapter, "Is recommended by an Active Member and accepted by a three-fourths majority of the Chapter; or if no Chapter exists, by a majority of Section officers, including the Section Membership Chairman; or if no Section exists, by approval of the Executive Board as a Member at Large." This amendment was killed as a result of discussion concerning its suitability to all Chapters due to their size and geographical area.

Amendment to "Officers & Elections" from Cape Girardeau Chapter, "The Executive Board shall be composed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and three additional members from separate Chapters not already represented on the Executive Board. The three additional members shall be elected by the delegates present at the Annual International Meeting. The immediate Past President shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Board. As such, she shall be authorized to attend all meetings thereof and shall be entitled to all privileges as other Board Members except the right to vote." This amendment rejected.

Amendment to "Officers and Elections" from Washington, D. C., Chapter, "The Executive Board shall be composed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and two additional members from separate Chapters not already represented on the Executive Board and the out-going President even though her Chapter is represented on this Board or three additional members from separate Chapters not already repesented on the Executive Boad when there is no out-going President. The two or three additional members shall be elected by the dele-

gates present at the Annual International Meeting." This amendment also rejected.

Amendment to "Dues" from Alabama and Georgia Chapters, "New members joining on or after March 1 will pay \$5.00 dues plus \$5.00 initiation fee. New members joining on or before February 28 will pay \$10.00 dues plus \$5.00 initiation fee. Both dues shall only carry them to the beginning of the ensuing year." This amendment passed after a motion carried to change "Feb-

ruary 28" to "end of February".

Amendment to "Officers, Standard Constitution for Sections and Chapters" from Oregon Chapter," Section 2, Officers: A. Elective officers of the Chapter shall be Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, or Secretary-Treasurer may be a combined office, and a three member Nominating Committee. (1) Offices shall be Active Members in good standing. Section 3, Elections: A. Officers shall be elected in the same manner as set forth for

Section Officers. (Art. IV, Sec. 2, Std. Const. for Sec. and Chap.) (1) The Nominating Committee shall consist of three members, elected by direct ballot each year. The number receiving the largest number of votes shall serve as Chairman. (2) The time of the election shall be as soon as practicable and

not later than October First. (3) No Chapter officer shall serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office. This amendment was rejected.

A motion was carried to pay approximately \$200 balance due on the AE Flyaway Stamp Film plus \$500 for one copy of the film. This 28 minute

film was shown during the meeting and, in the Editor's opinion, a truly wonderful presentation. A method of handling the film for Section/Chapter showings will be worked out and individual Chapters or Sections may purchase a copy of the film. Fay Gillis Wells. Committee Chairman.

A standing ovation was given the Northwest Section for their wonderful hosting the Convention and AWTAR start.

Prior to adjournment, time was allotted to Mr. Blanchard, Seattle FAA GADO office, and Mrs. Nona Quarles, FAA General Aviation Affairs, Washington, D. C., to present the Airport Beautification Program. Kits were distributed to delegates and available for all members.

Those of you who were not fortunate enough to attend the International Convention in Seattle will be interested in the following report of this Committee which was read at the Convention:

"Following recommendations of last year's Air Marking Committee, efforts to further the program through cooperation with civic club and state officials were the prime concern of your committee this year. Results have been gratifying, and it appears that air marking is finally being recognized as a necessary component of general aviation.

"State identified air marking programs are becoming more widespread through efforts of 99s in cooperation

ed as of September 1, 1966. Anyone objecting must advise Ninety - Nine Headquarters, Box 99, Okla. City, Okla. 73101, prior to September 1st.

with State Aeronautics departments, Jaycees, Kiwanis and other civic groups. The Air Traffic Controllers Association has joined 99s in encouraging such programs.

"This year three states were added to the several where programs have been in progress in former years under state or civic sponsorship. Several other state bodies have indicated interest in future programs.

"Where 99s have been unsuccessful in securing such help and interest, Chapters have continued air marking as 99 projects. Each Section has indicated interest, and many markers have been accomplished. An estimate from figures available indicates 59 markers were painted by 99s since the last annual report and approximately 1,000 by state aviation officials. Many chapters have had airmarking fund raising projects.

"In summary, it is recommended that air marking chairmen be appointed at Chapter and Section level early enough each year for the names to appear in the roster, that files be passed from one committee to the next, and that efforts be continued to enlist State Aeronautics commissions and civic groups in the program.



Fran Blair has been active in Aviation Education Programs since 1950 when she was instrumental in establishing a training program and also instructed in ground school and link during a four year enlistment in the U.S. Navy All-Weather Flight Training Program. ## Farnborough Air Show And British Tour

The British Ninety-Nines with the cooperation of BOAC (British Overseas Airways Corp.) have arranged the following fabulous program for a limited number of lucky U.S. Ninety-Nines and possibly some 491/2 ers.

1st Day, Tuesday, Sept. 6th. New York enroute for London, Depart New York at 2200 by BOAC for the overnight crossing of the Atlantic by Super VC-10.

2nd Day, Wednesday, Sept. 7th. London. Arrive London in the morning where you will be met and conveyed by private motorcoach direct to the Kensington Hotel, where accommodation will be provided. The remainder of the morning and afternoon will be at leisure.

At 1800 hours you will be conveyed by private motorcoach and meet the British Ninety-Nines and leading aviation personalities at the Royal Aero Club, Berkeley Square, at a cocktail party.

3rd Day, Thursday, Sept. 8th. Farnborough. Leave London in the morning by private motor coach traveling by way of Staines Virginia Water, Sunningdale, and Bagshot to Farnborough. Spend the day at the Farnborough Air Show before returning to London for dinner at your hotel.

whole day of sightseeing in the centre of the British Commonwealth. The morning drive will include Trafalgar Square, Piccadilly Circus, London's famous shopping centres, Kensington Museum (visit), Chelsea, Buckingham Palace and Westminster. The highlight of today's tour will be the changing of the Guard at Buckingham Palace. In the afternoon the tour goes to the old part of the city visiting St. Paul's Cathedral, the Tower of London where you are shown the Crown Jewels, and the Old Curiosity Shop of Dickens fame, built in 1567. In the evening, tickets will be sup-

plied for a theatre visit.

5th Day, Saturday, Sept. 10th. London/Paris. Leave London by midmorning flight to Paris where, on arrival, you will be met and transferred in a private motorcoach to the Hotel Grand.



### MOUNT AMELIA EARHART

July 2, 1966, to commorate the 29th year of Amelia's disappearance, a bronze plaque of Amelia's poem "Courage" was cemented into a solid granite rock at the summit of this mountain.

The Rocketdyne Club has petitioned (petition follows) the National Geographic Society to make this an officially dedicated mountain. The name would then appear on all maps and charts.

## PETITION Mount Amelia Earhart

We, the officers of the Rocketdyne Mountaineering Club, submit this petition to have the name "Mount Amelia Earhart" the official designation of a mountain in Yosemite Park. The altitude of the peak is 11,982 feet and is located at approximate latitude 37° 47', longitude 119° 17', reference United States Geological Survey Tuolumne Meadows Quadrangle (California).

It is our sincere belief that Miss Earhart, one of the truly outstanding aviation figures and Americans of this century, should be honored by the dedication of the mountain, for the reasons presented in our attached argument. It is our hope that the designation can be made official on or before the thirtieth anniversary, in 1967, of Miss Earhart's untimely death, on July 2nd, 1937.

#### **Arguments**

The Rocketdyne Mountaineering Club climbed a hitherto - unnamed peak on the 2nd of July 1966 in a tribute to Amelia Earhart and as the first step in having the mountain officially named "Mount Amelia Earhart". The day marked the 29th anniversary of the disappearance of Miss Earhart on her around-the-world flight in 1937.

This particular peak, located in Yosemite Park, was chosen for a number of reasons. Of importance is the fact that it towers above a hugh amphitheatre which contains Ireland Lake. Ireland was the first land Miss Earhart sighted after her epic solo flight across the Atlantic in 1932. For this feat, incidentally, she received the National Geographic Society gold medal, the first woman to be so honored.

Lakes bearing the first names of flying contemporaries of Miss Earhart are nearby, such as Lake Evelyn (Trout), Lake Florence (Klingensmith) and Lake Helen (Richey). Electra Peak is in the immediate vicinity; Miss Earhart was flying an Electra aircraft when she disappeared. For a number of geographic coincidences alone we believe the location is fitting. However, there is more than a mere coincidence of names. Miss Earhart was an honest lover of the beauties of nature. In a recent letter to this society, Mrs. Muriel Morrissey, her sister, disclosed that Amelia enjoyed mountain climbing among her other activities. In 1923 when she and her mother were to travel east to Boston from Los Angeles, she toured all the national parks she could. She visited Yosemite Park and so it is not inappropriate that the latter location be the site of her mountain.

After her first flight she wrote, "We were friends — the ocean, the hills, I."

Of greatest insight to her true regard for the outdoors and life was her poem "Courage", in which she wrote, in part,

"Courage is the price that life exacts for granting peace.

The soul that knows it not, knows no release

From little things;

Knows not the livid loneliness of fear Nor mountain heights, where bitter joy can hear

The sound of wings."

We, as mountaineers, find it impossible to believe that one could write these lines, expressing the emotions of the heights, without being there in spirit if not in body. Perhaps this imagination was the spark lighting her daring soul to perform deeds never before achieved by a "mere woman" before in the annals of aviation.

As the 30th anniversary of her disappearance approaches, this society, with the support and encouragement of the 99s, the National Women Pilots' Association, Zonta International, an organization of 18,000 professional and business women, the National Geographic Society and prominent individuals, hope to have the proposed name made official by July 2nd, 1967.


The AKINS were back in Houston a



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
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
