The Convention will spotlight the exciting progress of Women in Aviation since we were founded in 1929 with 99 members, to our more than 2700 in 25 countries around the world, today. Our overseas members and the Ambassadors and other officials of their countries will be honored on International Night, June 30. Other planned highlights-morning coffees at embassies; fascinating sightseeing trips; a tour of the White House for earlybird registrants. On July 1, the 30th anniversary of Amelia's last flight, a special ceremony will be conducted at the Smithsonian Institution of History and Technology, when we present our worldwide histories to the aeronautical archives

The morning of July 2nd we wish Happy Landings to our overseas 99s as they take-off on their coast-to-coast, getting-to-know-you American tour, and Good Luck to the girls heading for Atlantic City and the start of the Powder Puff Derby, July 8th.

The United States Travel Service representatives overseas are helping

us co-ordinate the global aspects of the convention. All overseas members should contact them with suggestions to highlight your country at the convention. (See list below).

The Capital-Fly-In is planned for those who believe it is more fun to fly together, as we collect the invitations and pictures for our See The USA portfolios the overseas members will take back home with them, spreading the American message of friendship around the world. There are three routes, starting at Olympia, Washington; Sacramento, California, and Los Angeles; with a fourth for the extreme south originating at Austin, Texas, flying east through as many capitals as possible. 99s in state capitals off the main flight pattern can co-ordinate their take-offs to join with one of the main flights as it passes through their area. The Fly-In is in no way competitive - just a safe, fun flight of mutual admiration, gathering more friends as it flies across America to our Nation's Capital.

The State representatives of the United States Travel Service also are

working with us on the Capital Fly-In. More on this later.

So, put a big red ring around June 28-July 2, 1967. We have a big, red carpet of Welcome waiting for you.

AWTAR POWDER PUFF DERBY

Now is not too early to start planning for the 1967 race, especially for getting sponsors.

Impound deadline will be July 4th, 5 P.M. Eastern Daylight time at Bader Field, Atlantic City, New Jersey. Takeoff will be July 8th at 8 A.M. Eastern Daylight Time W. P. (Weather Permitting). There will be nine intermediate stops: Martinsburg, West Virginia, Municipal Airport; Cincinnati, Ohio, Lunken Airport; Carbondale, Illinois, Southern Illinois Airport; Springfield, Missouri, Municipal Airport; Tulsa, Oklahoma, Riverside Airport; Amarillo, Texas; Albuquerque, New Mexico; Flagstaff, Arizona, Pulliam Airport; and Palm Springs, California. The Terminus will be at Torrance, Calif. Deadline for race finish will be July 11th, Official Sunset as of that date Pacific Daylight Time. Awards Banquet will be held the evening of July 13th, Most of this route will be familiar to the perennial Powder Puffers. There are two restricted areas on this route: 2501 outside of Palm Springs and R4001 the Aberdeen Proving Grounds. Both have been cleared as of this date pending, of course, any state of emergency.

Entries open April 15, 1967 and close June 1, 1967. Information Kits will be available from AWTAR Headquarters on and after February 15th upon receipt of 50c.

Anyone wishing to enter an airplane not already on the handicap list must notify AWTAR before February 1, 1967. Two airplanes of the make and model must be made available for handicapping no later than March 1, 1967.

Thanks for all those clippings of the 1966 race, keep them coming especially those from magazines. When you throw them out, throw them our way.

Many of you have sent clippings of other events where the name "Powder Puff Derby" has been used. In the future will you please send specific name of Company or Organization using same, otherwise no action can be taken. Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Fund

We are starting our new year in the nicest way. From the Columbia Broadcasting System the Scholarship Trust has received a check for \$500.00 in appreciation for the assistance given by the Ninety-Nines during the filming of the 20th Powder Puff Derby.

JANET FERGUSON of England, Scholarship Winner in 1965, has obtained her U.S. Multi-engine and Instrument ratings and immediately upon her return to England following Convention and the AWTAR, will put them both to use on a ferry flight to New Zealand.

As a reminder to all prospective applicants for the 1967 Scholarships, I'm listing the qualifications and procedures to be followed:

An applicant must have been an Active Member of The Ninety-Nines, Inc. in good standing for at least two years, with a minimum of 200 hours pilot-in-command time since receiving her private license.

She must apply to her Chapter for consideration as their choice to represent them in the competition. If selected by her Chapter, she must complete the application forms sent her by the Chairman of the Scholarship Trustees upon the request of her Chapter Chairman. The completed forms accompanied by a picture suitable for reproduction, are then submitted to her Chapter Chairman for the letter of recommendation on the back.

The Chapter Chairman, having written her letter of recommendation on the back page of the application, will forward it to the Section Scholarship Chairman . . . to reach her no later than January 15, 1967. The Section Scholarship Chairman and her Committee have approximately 30 days to evaluate all applications sent from the Chapters in her Section, and to select their Section's quota of those they consider the most deserving to represent their Section in the finals. These so selected are sent to the Chairman of The Amelia Earhart Scholarship Trustees (EUGENIA HEISE) to reach her no later than February 15, 1967. Applications received after that date cannot be considered.

Each Chapter may submit one application for every 20 members or major fraction thereof, and each Section has a quota of one application for each 100 members or major fraction thereof as listed in the 1966-67 Membership Directory. Every Chapter and every Section, regardless of size is entitled to at least one application.

Still another flight to Monterrey. VIJA BERRY, who by the way, was


