True Confession:

I WAS A TRANSVESTITE FOR THE 99s

NEVER UNDERESTIMATE THE POWER OF A WOMAN, the ads say. Believe me, they know what they're talking about. Take the Powder Puff Derby, for example. I've known a number of the girls in it, and have always taken it pretty much for granted. When Seattle was the starting spot for 1966, I got a good look at the real work involved, and found that it started nearly three years before!

But that's getting a head of my story. My name is PETE BOWERS. I live in Seattle and am quite active with homebuilt and antique airplanes, flying them at air shows throughout the Northwest. Well, when the girls of

the Western Washington Chapter of the 99s were planning the 1966 Powder Puff Derby, they wanted an off-beat gimmick for the Start. ILOVENE POTTER was to cut the ribbon with her helicopter, but they needed something else. Someone suggested that I be invited to dress like my own grandmother and fly my 1912 Curtiss pusher replica across the line as the first plane off. Everyone thought it was a hilarious idea, but doubted that I would go for it. ILOVENE was directed to ask me anyhow.

Well, with a little hemming and hawing, she did, and I agreed to the idea. The immediate problem was one of costume — one doesn't casually pick up "granny" dresees for a six-foot-two, 200-pound male type. This was resolved by JAY LAWRENCE, who loaned a calico from her square dancing club. The rest of the outfit was up to me and truned into a real adventure.

Starting from the inside out, I went looking for lower-level undies. I wanted some leotards, preferably with horizontal stripes, but no leotards or long stockings could be found — period! I solved this one by taking a set of thermal ski longies and painting red stripes on them to make them look like striped stockings. The bottoms

were painted black for a few inches above the after-ski boots I was to wear; from a short distance this gave the effect of high button shoes.

Before JAY came up with the dress, I had gone looking on my own and entered a clothing exchange store. When I told the lady what I wanted the outfit for, she didn't say much but I knew what she was thinking. She didn't have a suitable dress, but I spotted the most ridiculous widebrim straw hat with flowers, a set of lace-edged calico pettipants that fit, and a fabulous wig. The wig was for sale on consignment for \$35 and the gag wasn't worth that much to me. The proprietress couldn't lend or rent it to me herself, but did agree to call the owner. Since she wasn't home at the moment, I said I'd come back after looking elsewhere for a dress. When I did return, there were several customers in the shop and the proprietress was busy telling them about her strange customer. Just then her seven-year old daughter spotted me coming in the door and ran to the back of the store shouting "Mommie! That man's back!" While the customers edged away from the nutty aviator, the proprietress told me that I could borrow the wig. Since I'd already tried it on, the customers didn't get to see the nut in action.

ILOVENE brought the dress to the airport where I kept the pusher. There we had a tryout and took some publicity shots for the papers. The dress was OK for length, but was snug on the upper deck. No room for falsies even if I had agreed to them, which I hadn't. I told ILOVENE that I'd fly contoured like AMELIA — pretty flat.

As is well known, the scheduled July 2nd start was rained out. The costume took a bit of a beating, too. However, when things did get under way two days later, the gag was a howling success. "GRANNY," who had originally been designated "CONTEST-ANT ZERO," moved up to the No. 1 spot when the real No. 1 dropped out and the pusher got a new number. "GRANNY" mixed with the 99s in the pre-race loading of the planes, was photographed by many, and attended the briefing on the flight line. Arrangements had been made for a small girl picked from the audience to present "GRANNY" with a bouquet of artificial flowers in a little ceremony on the announcer's stand. This was done, and I tied them to one of the pusher's struts. These were artificial

by prearrangement so that they would stay together at the pusher's terrific 45 MPH cruising speed.

For the takeoff, I traded the widebrimmed straw for helmet and goggles, which didn't fit well over the wig. The voluminous skirt wasn't a problem - the seat belt held it down. ILOVENE started the action with her helicopter, after which I backed off a couple of hundred yards from the starting line in order to be able to fly over it. Even when taxiing the pusher puts on a good show. It can't be steered, so "GRANNY" had to stop at every turn and lift the nose around to aim it in the desired direction. After takeoff, I buzzed the flagman, who dived flat onto the runway. A photographer for the Seattle Times got a good picture of this and the Associated Press got it into papers all over the country. I flew on to the far end of the runway and landed, and then got the heck out of the way!

I don't think that you girls, who think nothing of doing 150-200 MPH on your cross-countries, realize what a marginal flying machine that pusher is. It has a cruising speed of 45 MPH and a rate of climb of only 100 feet per minute, which means its service ceiling is sea level (slightly below on a hot day). Airports have to be chosen with careful consideration of departure routes — it takes seven and one-half miles on a straight-out departure to reach 1000 feet! You can tell pretty accurately how much gas is aboard by the way the ship handles, and those flowers on the strut had a noticeable effect on speed and climb. It's strictly a fun machineeven more so when an adventure like the 1966 AWTAR comes along. My hearty thanks to the Western Washington Chapter for their invitation and subsequent assistance.

Powder Puff

Compared with past years, as of this date, requests for kits containing the new rules and regulations have reached an all time high. Entries close June 1st. After this closing date, the only aircraft change allowed will be the FAA registration number (for a fee of \$10.00).

As previously reported, the major rule change concerns the timing at take-off. The log books will not be run to the individual airplanes as has been the custom at the Start of the race. The timing will commence at the drop of the flag for each contestant and will be recorded by the timers. At enroute Stops, the timing will start when the airplane starts its take-off roll rather than wheels off as last year. This method has now been finalized by the NAA and our legal advisor.

Because the question has been raised, aircraft with turbo-charged engines are NOT eligible to race.

Our first contribution from industry for the 1967 race, came from Astro-Aero Corp. We have also received contributions from Hawthorne Aviation and Aviation Insurance Managers. We are also grateful to NATA for again sending our posters to their entire membership.

The WCBS one hour documentary film of the Powder Puff Derby in color is available for showing to groups where there will be no charge for admission. However, contributions may be collected for AWTAR. Send requests with the date you need the film, to AWTAR Headquarters. Your only cost will be for shipping and insurance.

As of this writing, the entire AWTAR Board of Directors is sitting right in the middle of the 21st Powder Puff Derby race route. MARIAN BANKS, RUBY KEAVENY, and BETTY WHARTON left San Diego in BETTY'S 210 stopping at Palm Springs, Flagstaff, Albuquerque, and Amarillo on their trailblazing flight to Tulsa. ALICE HAMMOND, KAY BRICK, and BARBARA EVANS started from Milville, N. J. in ALICE'S Mooney trailblazing the eastern half of the route, namely: Martinsburg, Cincinnati, Carbondale, and Springfield.

The two planes arrived at Tulsa within the same hour! TERRY VAS-QUEZ, LOIS FAIRBANK, and I over flew the race route via commercial

AIR MARKING

It's spring! You know what that means . . . Cleanup time, freshening up time. Time to fly!!!

Air Marking is just about the most rewarding committee you are on—And you are ALL on it. It doesn't take much talent, it doesn't take much time if you have a good group, it doesn't take Amazon muscles, and it doesn't take any money. How many committees can make such claims?

If you have ever had a shadow of a doubt about your position, or just a little feeling of unsurety—the Air Marking bug is in your bonnet, and that location should be marked.

All it takes is a congenial group, one gal to line up a location, and a set date. Bring a box lunch-the airport or place of business you are doing usually provides beverages and paint-put on your dungarees, stick your husband's best wide brush in your hip pocket and have a Chapter meeting on someone's roof. Sounds great? It is! And what a feeling of satisfaction and pride you have whenever you fly over that spot. O! That roof NEVER looked so beautiful. Be sure to take pictures up there showing YOU with the paint brush in handyou are bound to have some friends who will never believe you, and won't have the opportunity to fly over it as soon as you would like.

For the serious part: It is a safety feature to all pilots as well as the students. So much so that the FAA makes note of the Air Marked fields on the Sectional. Be sure to send a report to BLANCHE NOYES, Chief Air Marking Staff, Federal Aviation Agency, Washington 25, D. C. She will send you report blanks free for the asking so you will be sure to include all the information the FAA will need to make it official.

Check with other chapters if you need templates. A good many have their own, and will lend them. Some State's have them as part of their aeronautical equipment. New Jersey does. For the record, the 99s have the full responsibility of the New Jersey Air Marking program and the State foots the bill for the paint.

Now come on and send that report to MARY ABLE, Rt. 4, Box 52, Houston, Texas 77036 so she can make up intelligent factual statistics that will correlate with the FAA reports. Surely, you will want your efforts recognized. It is really not the least bit immodest or bragadocia. It certainly is the most

concise report you have ever been asked to complete.

Remember — get to it while you are in the throes of Spring fever and Spring Cleaning!

Just think! If each state did only one Air Marking this year we would have 50 reports — and I have found that for each chapter that does one, it will do two the following year—Just think!!!

AIR MEETS

ALL WOMEN'S INTERNATIONAL AIR RACE "ANGEL DERBY"

The Florida Women Pilots Association has scheduled the 1967 "ANGEL DERBY" for May 21—May 27 from Montreal, Quebec to Miami, Florida in salute to Canada's Centennial of Federation and Miami's statute as a hub of international air travel.

The first leg of this 1667.5 mile flight passes over historic Lake Champlain to Hartford, Conn., where members of the Connecticut Chapter of 99s will assist the contenders through Customs. From Hartford the route veers westward via New York to Ealtimore where members of the Maryland Chapter will officiate: then onward to Winston Salem, N. C. and Macon, Georgia — a positive identification point-prior to bearing eastward again over the Okefenokee Swamp to Ormond Beach, Florida. From Ormond Beech a more southerly course leads over the Everglades to a flyover finish at the new Tamiami Airport-not yet open to traffic.

While in Montreal, contestants will have an opportunity to visit Expo '67 when not engaged with race activities and in Miami they will be treated to an evening at the area's new Planetarium.

Requests for information kits indi-

cate that more than 40 planes will be competing in this year's race. To make the contest more enjoyable a temporary tower will be in operation at Brainard Field, Hartford. An FHA Representative will be on the field at Ormond Beach to process flight plans, and FAA radio service will be provided for the new Tamiami fly-over finish.

Co-sponsor for this year's "ANGEL DERBY" is Metropolitan Miami Dade County, Florida. \$2500 in prizes, plus trophies will be presented to the top six places in addition to other prizes and awards.

The FIRST ANNUAL PILOTS POK-ER RUN, sponsored by the South Louisiana Chapter of The Ninety-Nines was held on Sunday, February 26th, after a meeting on January 25th when they decided they had to have a fundraising project quickly to support the various projects upcoming for their Chapter. Within 3 weeks, posters and data sheets were out in south Louisiana and southeast Mississippi and several newspaper, radio, and TV spots were before the public concerning the date and places. The Pilots Poker Run is an event designed for "fun flying" for pilots at all stages of flying proficiency, open to both men and women pilots, student at ATR. Trophies and door prizes were donated by interested FBOs and businesses, and the race was on!

Pilots flew to the 5 designated airports (Baton Rouge, Houma, New Iberia, Lafayette, and Opelouses) picking up a playing card at each stop. The person holding the best poker hand at the terminus in Opelousas was the grand prize winner of a trophy and his or her choice of a diamond tie pin or a lady's diamond pendant (jewelry donated by York Jewelers of BTR). Other trophies were awarded, along with twelve door prizes donated by businesses.

A total of 141 persons entered the

Poker Run, 83 licensed pilots (including 14 women pilots) and 58 non-pilots. There were 56 airplanes, 6 of them twin-engine aircraft from 15 different towns in La., Miss., Texas, Ark. and Alabama. Another 26 airplanes were

"clocked in" who were not participants—just stopped by to see what was going on. The caterer ran out of spaghetti dinners after 300 plates were sold. Of the total 57% of the pilots held a Fvt. license, 29% were Commercials (including 1 ATR) and 14% were Student Pilots. All of this with only 3 weeks' preparation and publicity!


the number of young people having a desire to use this tool for learning.

I've been a little lax in rounding up news, so if I have missed reporting anything vital — Solly — maybe next month things will be a little more interesting. See you.


Note to the Printer—What is home cooling? I will try this again. JUDY HELLMAN came home for some home cooking—Yum Yum.
