'Women With Wings' Calendar Paintings

JACQUELINE "JACKIE" COCH-RAN — business executive, former International President of the 99s, author and pilot who set more world flying records than anyone in history — was the guest of honor at a special preview showing of CHARLES H. HUBBELL'S 1968 TRW Aviation Calendar paintings, "Women With Wings."

The twelve TRW - commissioned paintings were shown to the public for the first time on December 7 at the Frederick C. Crawford Auto-Aviation Museum of the Western Reserve Historical Society in Cleveland.

The "Women With Wings" preview marks the first time the award-winning Hubbell aviation paintings have been unveiled in a museum since the annual calendar series was inaugurated in 1939 by Cleveland-headquartered TRW Inc., a major diversified manufacturer of systems and products for aerospace, automotive and electronics markets

The first TRW Aviation Calendar paid tribute to the nation's daredevil, pylon air racing Thompson Trophy winners. The first calendar was so successful that Hubbell has since painted more than 350 scenes of aviation history, most of which are on display at the Auto-Aviation Museum.

In addition to JACKIE COCHRAN and the WASPS, the TRW Aviation Calendar commemorates: HARRIET QUIMBY, first woman to fly across the English Channel; KATHERINE

STINSON, Washington D. C. chapter member and one of the most famous of the early women pilots who flew for the American Red Cross during World War I: PHOEBE OMLIE, first woman to compete in an air tour and a charter 99; GLADYS O'DONNELL, spectacular pylon and transcontinental air racing champion as well as a charter 99; RUTH NICHOLS, charter 99 and first woman honored as the American Champion Aviator; MAE HAISLIP, record-setting winner of the National Air Races; LAURA INGALLS, first weman to fly non-stop across the United States; LOUISE THADEN and BLANCHE NOYES. charter members of the 99s and first women to win the Bendix Transcontinental Air Race; AMELIA EAR-HART, 1st International President of the 99s who disappeared mysteriously while on a world-circling attempt in 1937; and JERRIE MOCK, the grandmother pilot who flew solo around the world from Columbus, Ohio, in a single engine monoplane in 1964.

The Phyllis Pierce Parachute Jump!

Possibly the best way to describe a parachute jump can be done by answering the most asked questions:

For Heaven's sake why did you do that? There really was a reason. My godson is 101st Airborne; he was home on leave before going to Vietnam, and asked me to jump, with him "tapping" me off.

How did you know what to do? Easy. you go to school and learn. You spend 15 hours of ground school in pre-jump training which includes: parachute landing falls, canopy manipulation, reserve action procedures, aircraft exits and procedures, parachute packing and rigging. This sounds good on paper and is straight forward enough, but possibly something extra should be said about "parachute landing fa'ls" when practiced by a Grandmother whose main athletic achievements consist of pruning the pyracantha! By the time all was in readiness for the jump, there wasn't one square inch that didn't ache (in loud and ringing tones), bruises you wouldn't believe and a definite trauma easily induced by looking at any five foot bench from which you might be commanded to throw yourself off onto the floor and into a wheel-like roll . . . 50 or 60 more times.

What was it like (the jump)? Wonderful! So beautiful and quiet. You seem to be decending slowly with lots of time to "rubber-neck" while executing the two 360° turns required, checking the wind and trying to get in closer to the target area. The parachutes are quite maneuverable and it's fun to move around. (This is done by pulling the toggles on the risers.)

What kind of a plane did you jump from? Not the one I trained for. We spent hours drilling on a mock-up of Fairchild 51. You get out on the step with your hands wide apart on the strut in front of you, then push off evenly and immediately hit a spread eagle arched position (also practiced 3 million times) which keeps you floating like in a swan dive until the chute opens. Sc-I jumped out of an Aeronca Sedan. Ho, ho, ho. . . the strut is in back of the door and no step (just one long one if you miss the strut). Imagine yourself all trussed up in 50 pounds of gear trying to get out on that strut backward-right hand way

out, right knee next, left hand on the door frame and lastly right foot out where the strut joins the fuselage. There you are ready to go! Then comes the flick on the leg and the command to "jump" . . . and away you go. Trust me. On one foot and one knee I didn't push off evenly and immediately got over on my back. It took fantastic concentration to get untangled (arms and legs that is) and

get into the "brace" before the parachute opened . . . whew, made it.

Do you get an awful jolt when the chute opens? No, not really. Not as much as you'd think. It is kind of nice and reassuring. You don't mind at all.

Isn't the landing terrible? Return to earth you must and it is solid. You are thoroughly briefed on watching the horizon as you get close to the ground to avoid the sensation of "ground rush". This may work if you are not a pilot. But a pilot, even with your attention riveted on the borizon knows where the ground is, and you have a tendency to start pulling your legs up. Fortunately, I didn't get them all the way up. A landing directly on the glutimous maximus is something to avoid. Friend husband remarked that he was surprised I didn't hurt myself et all. Maybe I did . . . I already hurt everywhere from the training, so how would I know?

Weren't you scared? No, the I kept expecting to be. You wender if you'll freeze into position and not jump, or if you'll keep your eyes closed, or scream on the way out, or who knows what you're liable to do? The jump went just as planned, according to schedule, and was well worth the sore muscles.

Are you going again? Not likely. At least unless 49½ er FRED decides he'd like to. He has just barely started talking to me again!

Everything possible is being done to resolve the individual handicapping of airplanes for the AWTAR as requested by many of you. We are not sure whether or not the system will be worked out in time for the 1968 race. Therefore, at this time, the following will apply. PROSPECTIVE RACERS PLEASE NOTE. Eligibility of Aircraft: Fixed wing aircraft manufactured on or after Jan. 1, 1958; powered by engines 145-450 hp. The aircraft listed in the 1967 official Program have been handicapped and are eligible to be raced in 1968.

Request for consideration of any other models or aircraft must be submitted to the AWTAR Board, in tuplicate, no later than Feb. 1, 1968, and must be accompanied by the engine and airplane specifications, all available factory performance data and an owner's operating manual. At least two airplanes of the same make, model and configuration must be made available to the AWTAR Board no later than Mar. 1, 1968 for handicapping purposes. Exception: Aircraft not of U.S. design and manufacture — re-


