We have three very prominent gentlemen as Honorary Judges for the 1968 Amelia Earhart Scholarship Awards and the following is a brief summary of their biographies:

Manager of Bethlehem Steel Corporation. He started flying in 1931 and operated airports in New Hampshire and New Jersey. In 1934 he organized and taught a General Course in Aeronautics at Middlebury College, Middlebury, Vermont. He qualified as a celestial navigator as well as pilot with this company. He was with the Air Corps from 1943 to 1946 and held the rank of Lt. Colonel. He later resigned from American and joined the Babb Company as Assistant to Vice-President and Sales Pilot for the Eastern Division.

In 1946 he was offered the position of Operations Manager at Robinson Airlines, then an intra-state operator. He built up the flight operations, maintenance and communications sections and shouldered additional duities of

He is a graduate of Parks Air College. He was with the Experimental Test Department of Pratt & Whitney Aircraft Company in Hartford, Conn. and Sales Engineer and Pilot for Standard Oil Company of New Jersey. He was a Salesman and pilot for Inter City Aviation, Boston and Captain with American Airlines prior to founding ROTAIR Port, Inc. In 1938 he received a 2nd Lt. Commission in Air Corps and served on Active Duty during World War II. Later held the rank of Lt. Colonel with Senior Pilot's Rating. He was Deputy

Chief of Staff for Massachusetts Air National Guard. He is a Past Governor of Q. B. - Past President of Sportsman Pilots Association - Member of American Helicopter Society, Flying Farmers of Kentucky and AOPA. He is Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Sayre School and Chairman, Capital Fund Drive, Sayre School.

DR. ROLAND H. SPAULDING, Ph.D. is a graduate of the Curtiss Flying School and received his pilot's license in 1929 - No. 9442. Professor Emeritus, School of Education, New York University. Former teacher, Secondary School Principal and Superintendent of Schools.

He joined the faculty of the School of Education in 1928 as a Specialist in Aeronautical Education. There he organized the School's program for the training of public and private school teachers in aviation subject matter. AMELIA EARHART served on an aviation advisory committee to this program for several years.

DR. SPAULDING continued to develop and direct this aeronautical education enterprise until his retirement in 1960. Since then he has been employed as a consultant for the development of aviation technical and vocational education projects. Currently he is preoccupied with an aviation training program in Liberia, West Africa.

Calling All VFR Pilots

The Proposed Plans for High-Density Terminal Areas have been devised by the FAA to facilitate the flow of air traffic and to secure greater saftey of air transportation.

In the interests of General Aviation, will all 99s study the proposals and **BEFORE** the end of **MAY** send their comments to:

Federal Aviation Administration Office of General Counsel GC 24. Docket Section 800 Independence Ave. Washington. DC 20590

Copies should also be sent to MR. ROBERT V. REYNOLDS, Asst. Administrator, General Aviation Affairs, FAA.

In addition, write your CONGRESS-MAN and make clear to him that General Aviation, not just the airlines, is a fact of the present and must survive in the future. We cannot complain if we lose rights and privileges if we do nothing to keep them alive except to assert them. NOW is the time for 99s to give their "Friendly Aviation Administration" and the future, the benefit of their experience and judgment which has made possible the high safety record chalked up by women pilots!

FAA PLAN I FOR HIGH DENSITY TERMINALS

The Airspace Configuration

Establish, through rulemaking action, a circular terminal airspace area centered on the major terminal and extending outward 30 miles. The air-space will have a top of 10,000 feet MSL; however, the base of the air-space will be in three tiers or segments. The inner area, which is essentially the control zone will extend from the surface upward. The second tier will normally extend out to 20 miles and have a base of 2200 feet above the surface of the major airport. In this tier, it will be necessary to lower the floor of the designated airspace to 1200 in approach/departure cooridors to protect the approach and climb cut flightpaths. The normal 20-mile radius will be reduced to 15 miles where feasible. The third tier extends out to 30 miles and has a base of 5000 feet above the surface of the major airport. The 1200, 2200 and 5000-foot levels will be converted to MSL.

The Operating Rules

Within the airspace described above, no person may operate an aircraft without an ATC clearance. Further, all VFR operations shall be for the purpose of landing/departing from the

airport on which the airspace is centered, except during published hours. All aircraft operating within the airspace described above are controlled (separated) by the ATC system and segregated from all uncontrolled aircraft. Within the control zone of the primary airport, VFR weather minimums shall be 1500-3. Special VFR shall be prohibited for fixed-wing aircraft at the primary airport. If independent operation is feasible at satellite airports within the primary airport's control zone, VFR aircraft will ingress and egress through corridors on an uncontrolled basis.

All IFR aircraft operating between the primary airport and points more than 50 miles distant, shall operate within the designated airspace while approaching and departing the primary airport.

Within the designated airspace, there is no speed limit; i. e., the 250-knot speed limit below 10,000 feet is not applicable. In the airspace underlying the designated airspace, i. e., within 30 miles of the primary airport, there shall be a maximum speed limit of 200 knots.

VFR Operations at the Primary Airport

VFR aircraft operating into the primary airport will not be permitted to enter the designated airspace except at specified ingress points around the perimeter of the 20-mile circle. This means that VFR inbounds will come in under the outer circle, below 5000 feet. VFR fixed-wing aircraft will penetrate the 20-mile circle at the specified points at specified altitudes within the designated airspace, i. e., the lowest altitude the VFR fixed-wing inbound would penetrate the 20 - mile circle would be 2500 feet above the airport elevation. If weather conditions do not permit entry at the specified altitudes, VFR aircraft may enter at any altitude below 2500 feet, but they must establish contact with ATC at 20 miles.

VFR fixed-wing departures will normally operate at or above 2500 feet, weather permitting, until beyond the 20-mile circle.

VFR Operations at Satellie Airports

VFR satellite traffic will operate beneath the 20 and 30-mile tiers on an uncontrollable basis. No change in weather minimums.

IFR Operations at the Primary Airport

IFR operations at the primary airport will be confined to the designated airspace, i. e., they will be in a totally controlled environment from 10,000 feet to the surface within 30 miles of the airport. This will require many changes in the IFR traffic handling at the major airports.

IRF Operations to Airports Within 30 Miles of the Primary Airports

IFR Operations to these airports will be conducted the same way as at present.

Equipment and Pilot Proficiency Requirements

For VFR operation into the primary airport, a private pilot's license or higher is required, i.e., no student pilots. VFR aircraft operating into the airport must have a VOR receiver and capability to communicate on listed frequencies. These are initial requirements.


The candidate airports for Plan 1 application ARE ORD, LAX, JFK, LGA, EWR, ATL, DCA, SFO, DAL, BOS. MIA, and DET.

PLAN II - HIGH-DENSITY TERMINALS

The Airspace Configuration

Establish through rulemaking action a circular terminal airspace area centered on the major terminal and extending outward 20 miles (variable

to 15 miles). The airspace will have a top of 5000 feet above the airport elevation. Within this 20-mile area the airspace is configured the same as Plan I, i.e., 2200-foot floor outside the primary control zone lowering to 1200 feet within designated approach / departure corridors.

The Operating Rules

As in Plan I, no person may operate an aircraft within the designated area without an ATC clearance and all VFR operations shall be for the purpose of landing/departing the airport on which the airspace is centered. All aircraft operating within the airspace described above are controlled (separated) by the ATC system and segregated from all airports located outside of the 20-mile radius will be required (through rulemaking) to conduct flight below 5000 feet while operating within 30 miles of the primary airport control zone will be 1500-3 with special VFR prohibited.

VFR Operations at Primary Airport

Arrivals will enter the designated airspace at specified points and altitudes (between 2500 and 5000 as in Plan I. If weather conditions do not permit entry at the specified altitude, entry may be made at a lower altitude; however, communications must be established with ATC at 20 miles. Departures will normally operate at or above 2500 feet (weather permitting) until beyond the 20-mile circle.

VFR Operations at Satellite Airports

Satellite traffic will operate below the floor of the designated area while within 20 miles of the primary airport and below 5000 while within 30 miles. If independent operation is feasible at satellite airports within the primary airport's control zone, VFR aircraft will ingress and egress on an uncontrolled basis.

IFR Operations

IFR aircraft operating to/from the primary airport will operate above the floor of the designated airspace while within 20 miles and will be confined to altitudes at or above 5000 feel while between 20 and 30 miles of the primary airport.

Criteria for Establishment

Any airport classified as a large hub that does not meet Plan I criteria, is a candidate for Plan II. The following airports are potential candidates: DEN, PHL, PIT, STL, CLE, MSP, HOU, MKC, SEA, MSY, CIN, and LAS.

OUR ORIGINAL GREEK NINETY - NINE

HELEN HUNDA of Athens, Greece, became a member-at-large of the Ninety-Nines at the 1967 Convention. Since then she has married and been active giving air shows of acrobatics. The following is a summary of a newspaper account:

From: ETHNOS (Athens evening daily), 22 Aug. 1967 AIR SHOW AT LAMIA — PLANES AND GLIDERS PUT ON EXHIBITION 30 Young People Receive Their Baptism of the Air

An air show at Lamia! (Small mountain town in central Greece). Six light planes and a glider of the Athens Aero Club flew to Lamia Sunday, August 20, put on a show of aerobatics, and then gave 30 young inhabitants of Lamia their baptism of the air.

The first plane, a Piper, left Tatoi field at seven thirty in the morning. The other five followed in ten minute intervals. The last one was towing a glider carrying the Secretary General of the Club and one student pilot. The glider was released over Lamia and it went on in a series of graceful loops, climbs, turns and dives, until it made a soft landing half an hour later.

In another aircraft, MISS HELEN HUNDA, the first licensed woman pilot of Greece, carried out an impressive series of aerobatic figures.

The purpose of the show was the dissemination of the Club's air-mindedness. At this time the Aero Club disposes of nine planes and two gliders. The planes have dual controls. The Club operates a private pilot school with a current enrol-

ment of 16 students.

The Hellenic Air Force General Staff is assisting the Club in aircraft maintenance and repairs, and it provides parking and hangar space at Tatoi air-



Aerospace Education

Mary Jo (Janey) Oliver

Did you know that there are over 30,000 high schools in the United States? That there are more than 15 million high school students? That there are fewer than 500 high schools (one in sixty) that have a planned aviation program for their students, and that less than half of these are courses students can take for credit? That the number of high school courses in aviation offered for credit has doubled in the past two years? To continue this numbers game a little further, estimate each aviation class at an average enrollment of 20. Two hundred (courses) times 20 (average enrollment) gives 40,000; only one in thirty seven high school students is receiving anything more than rudimentary knowledge of aviation?

For an industry that is estimated to be at least 5 per cent of the Gross National Product, much more needs to be done in making schools aware of the aviation educational needs of our boys and girls.

Thinking this to be an activity that Ninety-Nines could do with great success, I mailed to all Section Governors and Chapter Chairmen in the United States some materials and suggested procedures Chapters could follow to contact local and district high schools, both parochial and public. Each section was given a set of representation filmstrips and records for 1 o an to Chapters. Printed materials including a sample Course Guide was sent to each Chapter.

Additional printed material can be obtained from me as needed.

Since January, I have received notice of Aerospace Education activity or comment from the New Jersey Chapter and Oklahoma Chapter, and from the Southwest, Middle East and South Central Sections. It will soon be time for an annual report to International President DONNA MYERS. Chapter and Section Aerospace Education Committee Chairmen should forward to me a report of your Aerospace Education activities as soon as possible.

April 4th GRETCHEN FRASER, her 491/2 er DON and I were privileged to be among those invited to attend the 25th Air Division Indoctrination Education Program held at McChord A.F.B. This program was a joint effort of the 25th Air Division and the FAA. It was a most interesting and enlightening day. The main purpose was - Accident and Incident Prevention in areas of usage by the ADCF for low level practice runs. General Aviation pilots are unknowingly getting into these low level areas and the "putting" pilot must be made aware for his own safety as well as that of the Air Defense Pilots. It is important that this mutual problem be solved before some one has an accident rather than an incident. The All Weather Intercepts must be ready at all times and must do this type training so we in general aviation should be more than willing to cooperate. It takes only a little effort on our part to check with the Control Center or FAA when we plan to fly these areas. This way, we make sure we are aware of the activity in the area. In the Northwest the areas to watch are Pasco, Tillamook, Olympic, Hoguiam and Chelan. These are low level altitude areas and will be used 6000' and below. The ADCF will, with 5 minutes notification, vacate an altitude. Portions of this area are non-controlled airspace-so-the message they wanted us to carry back is-Do Not Putts around in this area-look around-this may mean your life or that of the fellows who are practicing to save you.
