1. The Ninety-Nines, Inc., By-Laws, as printed in the 1937-68 Roster.

Article V. Representation and Rights Section 1.B. Each member is represented at the Annual International Meeting by the Governor of her Section and by the delegate(s) elected by her Chapter.

Amendment proposed by the Long Island Chapter:

Section 1.B. Each member is represented at the Annual International Meeting by the delegate(s) elected by her Chapter.

Reason: It is felt that the Governor cannot be truly representative of her Section, where the delegate can be. Committe: We concur with the proposal. Elected delegates are instructed. Findings: By their Chapters before young on issues whereas the Governor on issues whereas the Governor.

Executive: The Executive Board feels that no change is warranted. Board:

N.I.F.A. Award Committee Resume

MAY, 1968

On May 9, 10 and 11, the National Intercollegiate Flying Association held it's 20th Annual Spring Flying Meet at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio. Twenty Colleges and Universities were able to get their teams and airplanes into Athens, which is nestled in the foothills of southern Ohio. Approximately 200 well mannered young people were entered in the competitions which included Spot Landings, poweroff and power-on, Navigation and Bomb Dropping events. Weather prevented the completion of all events since only one day was flyable for competition. None the less, practice was at a premium on Thursday and the portable FAA tower recorded 1500 operations.

Eighteen girls were among the competitors this year, of these 9 were applicants for the Ninety-Nine Achievement Award. Those 99s acting as review and interview judges were: BERNICE STEADMAN, PAGE SHAMBURGER, CONNIE JONES and JOAN HRUBEC. The selection on basis of achievement was quite difficult, since all are exceptionally young women. CAROL CONAWAY, last year's Achievement Award winner and presently on O. U. aviation faculty member acted as the 99 laison for the N.I.F.A. Committee.

The Ninety-Nine Achievement Award Winner: ANNELIESE BOETTIGER. ANNELIESE BOETTIGER is a native of Germany who has been in this country on a Fulbright Grant and is a graduate assistant in the Engineering School at Purdue University, ANNELIESE maintains a scholastic index above a 5 point in Purdue's 6 point system while carrying a tremendous teaching load along with her research and studies.

ANNELIESE holds a Commercial and Commercial Flight Instructor ratings. She has passed the writtens for her Instrument and Instrument Instructor ratings and is scheduled for these flight tests in late May or early June. All of ANNELIESE'S flight time has been attained in the Purdue Pilots, Inc. Flying Club airplanes and paid for by money earned through extra hours tutoring. Since acquiring her Instructor's rating she has been instructing other club members.

ANNELIESE will return to Germany

this summer and intends to use her Electrical Engineering either in research or college instruction. She intends to continue as a Flight Instructor, since she enjoys this phase of flying. In the future she would like to fly some high performance aircraft and do some aerobatics.

It is hoped that ANNELIESE BOET-TIGER will become an Indiana Chapter 99 before returning to her "Motherland" Germany. The 99s are proud to have her as the recipient of their Achievement Award for 1998.

As a result thousands of square miles are reserved for the animals in National Parks and we hope will be there for years to come. 

KATHLEEN HITCHOCK and MAURICE and their son flew into Gegier for the two day Aerospace Physiological Training Course given by the 310th Medical Group at Fairchild Air Force Base along with our section's Governor ILLOVENE POTTER and half dozen pilots from the Seattle area. Eastern Washington Chapter girls took the course three years ago so this time we invited families along with girls who did not take it last time. The HITCHCOCKS were especially interested since they are waiting for their newly ordered Duke to be delivered.

The procedure for taking this course is as follows: Obtain application blanks from the FAA in Oklahoma City, have a physical exam (pilot) within the last 12 months, this is a requirement . . . contact your local air base, find out the number of pilots they can handle, then send in the application form and \$5.00. There were twenty-five girls and men who took it this time. They felt it was worth the time and effort. The first day was spent listening to lectures on what happens inside the body when you fly a modern airplane and how to survive and function at high altitude. The second day was spent in reviewing the use of the oxygen equipment and the anticipated handling of it in preparation for entry into the altitude pressure chamber as well as the decompression chamber.

Before entry into the altitude pressure chamber, each pilot is fitted with a helmet, ear phones, oxygen mask and the knowledge gained the day before. Loose-fitting casual clothes are necessary to be worn. Within the chamber, Air Force personnel check each pilot's gear and the operation of the oxygen equipment. Outside the

chamber, Air Force personnel man the plane and carry on instructions as well as keeping personal alert vigil upon each pilot's movement and breath. They ascend to 43,000 feet and on the descent to 25,000 feet, a hypoxia exercise is conducted. The symptoms are nausea, dizziness, tingling sensation of skin or being hot or cold. Over confidence is often a symptom and the vision usually narrows. Immediate use of 100 per cent oxygen is the cure.

In the decompression chamber, same conditions were simulated should a window be blown out at 22,000 feet. All the 99s demonstrated their speed at hooking up and donning the oxygen masks while the air becomes very cold and foggy. LT. JERRY WILLIAMS and the other sergeants who lectured did a fine job for everyone felt it was worthwhile.
