that in 1930, there were more women pilots named RUTH than any other name. The MARYS and MARJOR-IES followed closely behind.

that probably the pioneer flying husband and wife team were PHOEBE OMLIE and her husband who had pilot licenses numbers 199 and 200 respectively.

that JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER had his first flight at Ormond Beach, Fla. He was flown by BLANCHE and DEWEY NOYES of Cleveland, Ohio, who received shiny new dimes for their pains as well as the distinction of being the first to get the richest man in the world up into the air.

that ANNE LINDBERGH (Mrs. Charles A.) qualified for her first class gliders license at San Diego, Calif. that by Feb. 1930, there were at least

182 WOMEN PILOTS, or more than five times the 34 who held licenses on Jan. 1, 1928.

that women pilots early recognized the need to have the names of towns displayed prominently on buildings to aid fliers and did something about it. The same yellow and black colors are still used today.

that women pilots of the 30's were iust as clothes conscious when flying as they are today as noted by this article. "As the thermometer tends upwards furlined flying suits are going up also, up on the peg until next winter. Our spies tell us that a number of couturiers are busy working out designs for fetching spring flying togs. Some sketches by FAY GILLIS, that versatile young lady caterpillar and pilot, who designs flying suits what time she isn't selling airplanes and flying courses to Curtiss Wright customers literally took our breath away. A little creation which will emerge in Alice blue and orange rajah, or printed cotton pique or any desired color or material, suggests beach pajamas gone ever so airminded and in a very entrancing though not too fussy way. Big pockets have been literally provided for. Then there is a bloused trouser affair that has a neatly rounded collar, and a profusion of pocket space."

THE AMELIA EARHART MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP: A 1968 REVIEW

AMELIA EARHART, the first president of the Ninety-Nines, Inc. disappeared in July 1937 in an attempted flight around the world. Her loss was felt by all people and especially by The Ninety-Nines. It had been AMELIA who, when she was president, had suggested the name, The Ninety-Nines, based on the number of charter members of our organization. The Ninety-Nines wondered what they could do to honor AMELIA and carry on her unselfish interest and enthusiasm for all women in aviation.

Out of many suggestions submitted, a scholarship was finally selected as a "living memorial". The Amelia Earhart Scholarship Fund was created in 1940. ALMA HARWOOD served as the first permanent trustee. She assumed the task of raising funds and working out the details for the trust. At the International Convention of the Ninety-Nines in Albuguerque, New Mexico in July 1941, under the presidency of BETTY GILLIES, the resolution legally establishing the trust was adopted. The care in drawing up the original terms is attested to by the fact that very few amendments have been necessary to keep it up-to-date.

The trust and its fund are administered by five trustees, two of whom are appointed by the Executive Committee of the 99s to serve permanently, and three of whom are elected for three year terms on a rotating basis. All are 99s.

The first scholarship award of \$150.00 was made in 1941. The total award was supposed to come from the accrued interest from the fund. At that time this amounted to \$21.37. But generous 99s helped out to make the award possible that year as well as in 1942. During the war years 1943-46 no awards were made and the infant had a chance to grow.

The award was increased to \$200.00 in 1948. By 1955 it was increased to \$300.00. In 1954 for the first time two awards were given. This was the year of the anniversary of the 99s. It then reverted back to one scholarship per year. In 1959 the amount was raised to \$350.00 and a new procedure was adopted. No longer did ALL the funds

available for scholarship come from the interest of the fund. That year the procedure was established whereby half of the contributions from the chapters would go directly into the scholarship. The other half to go into the trust. Because of this the 1960 scholarship was raised to \$700.00. In 1963 two scholarships were given. In 1964 three \$700.00 scholarships were given. In 1967 and 1968 this would have been the case except through the generosity of the Michigan Small Race a fourth scholarship of \$700 was made possible.

Each year since 1959 the award funds used come from two sources. Half come from the trust (only the interest may be used) and half from chapter contributions of that year. Chapter contributions are divided and half of the money is applied to the current year's award and half is deposited in the trust. Each year's contributions are therefore important.

In July 1963 under the leadership of charter member FAY GILLIS WELLS, the 99s gained well earned publicity and the coffers of the trust were augmented in a celebration and mass flyaway from Atchison, Kansas of the Amelia Earhart Commemorative Airmail Stamp First Day Covers, Although the stamp is now out of print, some of these special First Day Covers may still be obtained by sending a taxdeductible contribution of \$1.00 or more and a self-addressed stamped envelope to the Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Fund, P. O. Box 625. Rancho Santa Fe. California, 92067.

Who may win the award? She must be an active 99 in good standing, have logged at least 200 hours as pilot in command, must intend to carry on some work in the aviation field, (applications may be made in related fields such as teaching, research, engineering, mechanics, etc., as well as for advanced flight ratings), and must agree to maintain the certificate of rating acquired for at least two years.

How is a winner selected? Each chapter may submit one applicant for each twenty members. The Section Scholarship Committee screen them and on the basis of 1 per 100 members within the Section, then submit their quota to the Trustees. The Trustees grade them according to worthiness, based on past aviation accomplishments and the need of the applicant. Finally they are referred to the Honorary Judges, prominent people in various fields of aviation — military,

civil, educational, government, industry, etc. — who make the final determination of the winner(s).

The award has been used in many ways: as an aid toward Commercial, Instructor, Instrument, Instructor, Instructor, Multi-engine, Link Instructor, and Air Transport Ratings; for academic studies in Aeronautics and Journalism for a Master's Degree; for a Ground Engineer's License and A. & E. Mechanics Rating and an Airline Transport Rating.

Through 1968 thirty-eight scholarships have been awarded. The great majority of the recipients are still using the training they received. Through them hundreds of students have received instruction. Some awardees have financed college degrees. Some are FAA Flight Examiners. Some are widows who have been able to maintain small airports and educate their children. They have managed large operations on major airports. One has flown as co-pilot on a regular airline. Many of them have held office in the 99s. They have taught Air Age Education in the secondary schools. The list is endless.

The continued interest of each chapter and each member is important. It has already been recommended that the award be raised above the \$700.00 figure. This can only be done if contributions are generous and continued annually.

Cleveland National Air Races

Over Labor Day Weekend, Cleveland Lakefront Airport was the site for the second National Air Races of '68. It was action packed weekend with BOB HOOVER doing his superb aerobatic act not only in the F-51, but also in a twin Commander "500", the Golden Knights skillful parachuting team, and the US Air Force's Thunderbirds.

The Formula Ones', the Sports Bi-Plane, the T-6's, and the Stock Aircraft were featured daily in closed course racing on a 2½ mile course. On the first day, in the stock plane class, it was a 3-way contest between JUDY WAGNER, DOT ETHERIDGE, and ELAINE LOENING, DOT ETHE- RIDGE, flying her Commander 200, got to the finish line just seconds before JUDY and ELAINE, flying a Commander "200" and a Myers 285 respectively.

On the second day, the 60,000 racing fans watched PAT ARNOLD, flying her Commanche 260, hold the lead for 5 laps before being overtaken by JUDY WAGNER. On the final day, DOT ETHERIDGE and JUDY WAGNER were literally "prop to prop" until the very last lap when JUDY nosed out DOT by a fraction of a second.

The top money winners: JUDY WAGNER . . . \$1200; DOT ETHE-RIDGE . . . \$1100 and PAT ARNOLD . . . \$830.

Latest On The Pacific Air Race

There are a total of 48 airplanes entered in the PAR and everyone is eagerly looking forward to the individual handicapping which is being tried here for the first time.

HARRY CULVER, Gillespie Field airport manager, recently had the honor of drawing the names of the first five entrants in the Pacific Air Race. The PAR will start October 12th from Gillespie Field as one of the events of the annual Aircade. The Aircade is sponsored by the El Cajon Chamber of Commerce and the PAR is sponsored locally by the San Diego and El Cajon Valley chapters of the Ninety-Nines.

DOTTIE SANDERS of Santee and BETTY WHARTON of San Diego, cochairmen, met recently with MR. CULVER and asked him to draw the first five names of contestants for the PAR, formerly known as the Fun Race. ELEANOR RICHARDSON, also cochairman, was unable to be present for the drawing. The PAR is open to any woman holding a private pilots license or better and any woman co-pilot holding a student license or better. The airplane the women fly must be a stock model between 90 and 450 horsepower with no age limit, all planes will receive individual handicaps. This year's route will start at Gillespie Field and continue to Bakersfield, California for an optional gas stop and then to the finish line at Sacramento Municipal Field in Sacramento, California. The terminus of the race is being handled by the Sacramento Valley Ninety-Nines and the gas stop is being coordinated by the Bakersfield Ninety-Nines. The race is sometimes considered a warm-up for the Powder Puff Derby, the 1969 transcontinental air race will start from Lindberg'i Field in San Diego in conjunction with the 200th Anniversary.





DIABLA) (HAPTER "Buckie" Johnstone, Reporter

Wheeee—we went to visit a winery. The Beautiful Napa Valley of California played host to a group of us—don't remember all the names! to see first hand just how the wonderful California wines are made. They have tasting rooms—loo!!!

No VIRGINIA—they don't crush the grapes with their feet anymore. Unsomething or other we're told. If I can remember all this correctly here is the story of how wine is made. From crushers the grapes are pumped into fermenters. Sulfer dioxide is added to lessen oxidation, this is used as control to lessen destruction of quality in fine wines. From here on the red and white wines are handled differently. The whites are drained within few hours to prevent extraction of bitter tannin and other undesirables from skins. By next morning the clear juice is "Racked" (transferred) into closed fermenting tanks. Here juice is inoculated with definite amount of specially cultured wine yeast. This includes an immediate and clean fermentation. Essential to production of fine quality, true flavored wine. Next step. refrigeration because fermentation creates heat during conversion of sugar in grapes to alcohol and carbon dioxide.

White wines fermentation is controlled between 45-50°. Red wines are fermented on the skins, the source of color, tannin and the complex flavors characteristic of red wines. Favorable temps. for reds is 70-80°. More warmth necessary to extract required amounts of tannin, etc. from skins. The pink wines are left on skins only long enough to get the wonderful pink color required, then drained and handled as the whites. All wines respectively are now transferred to closed storage tanks where final stage of fermanation is completed within several days. Next the wines are racked several times to free them of any accumulated sediment and stored in full containers. A clarifying agent is used for week or two next to complete the clarifying and filtering processes. We

were informed that to be of exceptional quality a wine must have a certain period of storage in wooden containers. The slow breathing process thru the pores of wood is a must, and perhaps somewhat contradictorily each container MUST be kept completely full, this prevents oxidation. White wines of Sauterne variety such as Sauvignon Blanc do best in oak casks of 500-100 gal, capacity for from 12 to 18 months. All other whites need only about 9 months. The Rose varieties need even less time than that. They are at their best when young. The reds are best when aged in wood for over 18 months to up to couple years or so-depending on the grape variety, and are stored in small 50 gal. barrels or so. Following wood aging period comes the glass aging. Both steps essential for the production of fine table wines. The vitnet must continually check the wood aging wines to reach optimum time for removal from wood to glass. We were told a month or two overtime in wood is very, very bad.

Once wines have had sufficient breathing time in wood the glass storage is valuable in preventing any outside interference. It also allows the various acids in the wines to react further with the alcohol to form important aromatic esters. These reactions, along with numerous others, take place within the wine to create many complex constituents that unite to form the bouquet of a properly aged wine. Aging continues in glass tanks for periods up to a year, then to the bottling works. Because oxygen is not desireable in wine, the wine is transferred from the tanks to bottling machine by means of use of inert gas such as nitrogen. Gentle pressure with the gas forces wines along to filling machinery. The bottles to be filled are blown out with nitrogen to free them of air, filled, and before corking a vacuum is created to eliminate all air. The job now complete, packing, shipping, etc. and "Shall we have a glass of wine with dinenr tonite?"
