Backward Glance Column

Thanks to the kindness of CECELIA KENNY, we now have Editions No. 1, 7, and 22 of "Women and Aviation" as well as original letters regarding the formation of our organization, and several pictures of charter members. Isn't she a jewel to make these available to our organization?

THE FOLLOWING ARE EXCERPTS FROM EDITION NO. 1 of "WOMEN AND AVIATION" DATED SEPT. 1, 1929.

"THE FIRST WOMEN'S AIR DERBY"

The most signi icant event in many respects that has ever taken place in aviation is the recent National Women's Air Derby, which was sponsored by the National Exchange Club. This derby indicated in a definite and concrete way just what may be expected of a woman when she takes hold of the control stick of an airplane and plants her feet on the rudder bars.

First of all, fourteen of the twenty women who took-of on August 18th rom Santa Monica, California, finished at the National Air Races at Cleveland on August 26th. This is a larger percentage of finishers than any other air derby ever held in this country. Most of the girls flew the 2700 miles of some of the most difficult cross-country flying in the world to finish with a flourish.

Secondly, these girls displayed not cally high grade flying ability but remarkable grit and determination throughout the race, and the difficulties they encountered along the way were neither few nor far between.

And, on the other hand, when the Derby fliers were presented at a banquet one by one on the night of their arrival, and were faced with a microphone for a nation-wide broadcast, they each had something to say. And, as one of the men in the audience stated with emphasis, "You may take my word for it that in a like situation an equal number of men pilots would have been at least ninety per cent speechless or trite."

Probably because these women are pioneers—pioneer women fliers—they each seem to possess a certain individuality that distinguishes them from those of us who are still groundlings. LOUISE THADEN, the winner of the Derby, with her classic features

and slim, light-footed figure might be a sister to Icarus, God of Flight. As they circulated about among the crowds, dodging or submitting to the pleas of autograph hunters and responding to the greetings of friends and of strangers, they added a feminine touch that was an integral part of the working cast at the Air Races. They were dined, lunched, breakfasted and tead throughout the week.

Winners in the Derby were announced recently. In the D. W. OR HEAVY PLANE class: LOUISE THADEN, of Pittsburgh, received first place together with the \$3,500 prize and \$100 lap money; GLADYS O'DONNELL, of Long Beach, California, re-

ceived second place with a prize of \$1,750 and \$200 lap money; AMELIA EARHART, of New York, third place, prize \$875; RUTH ELDER, of Hollywood, fourth place, prize \$525; NEVA PARIS, of Great Neck, L.I., fifth place, \$350; BLANCHE NOYES, of Cleveland, \$200; FLORENCE LOWE BARNES, of Pasadena, \$100.

In the C. W. or LIGHT PLANE GROUP, the first prize of \$500 went to PHOEBE FAIRGRAVE OMLIE, with \$100 fer laps and a \$300 trophy; EDITH FOLTZ, of Portland, Oregon, received \$600; MRS. KEITH MILLER, of New Zealand, \$325; and THEA RASCHE, of New York, \$175.—Woman's Dept., Curtiss Flying Service

AMELIA EARHART MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Dr. Dora Dougherty Strother, Chairman

It is the time of year when chapter chairmen and AMELIA EARHART SCHOLARSHIP chairmen must consider their membership to determine if they wish to back a candidate for one of the 1969 AMELIA EARHART MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS. It is also the time when any potential applicant must apply to her chapter for consideration as their choice to represent them in competition. If her chapter selects her within their quota of one applicant per 20 members or major fraction thereo") her chapter chairman must apply to the CHAIRMAN OF THE AMELIA EARHART MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND (DR. DORA DOUGHERTY STROTHER, 3616 LAN-DY LANE, FT. WORTH, TEXAS 76118) for an application. The application will then be sent directly to the applicant, who must complete it and get her chapter chairman to write a letter of recommendation for her. IT IS THEN SENT TO THE AMELIA EARHART SECTION CHAIRMAN, TO REACH HER NO LATER THAN 15 JAN. 1969. An individual 99 cannot apply for an application directly. The request must come through her chair-

In considering who may apply, the rules state: An applicant must have been an Active Member of the Ninety-Nines, Inc. in good standing for at least two years with a minimum of 200 hours pilot-in-command time since receiving her private license. She must intend to carry on some work in an aviation field. She must agree to maintain her rating (it a flight rating) for at least two years.

It may help you to know the items considered by the judges in making their selection.

- 1. What has the applicant already accomplished
- 2. How much does she need the Award?
- 3. How well will she use it?
- 4. How wide a field in aviation will this benefit?
- 5. Is she worthy of the Award?
- 6. Will she be a "good investment"?
- 7. How long has she been a Ninety-Nine and how active in its af airs? This is a good list and in keeping

with the spirit of the memorial scholarship.

Remember the number of scholarships which can be given each year depends directly on the amount contributed to the fund for that year, since ½ of the moneys contributed goes directly into the scholarship for that year.

3. Explain fully, in 200 words or less, the reasons for the proposed amendment

 Submit a copy of your suggested Resolution to each member of the Resolutions Committee, by February 15, 1959.

- 6. Prize for contestant winner will be one free entry to the 1969 or 1970 POWDER PUFF DERBY. The prize may be used by either a pilot or copilot and is not transferable.
- 7. Entry by any contestant constitutes acceptance of all the above rules. The Judges' decision will be final.







The group was completely cut off from the outside world with the exception of a small ham radio which one of the searchers carried in.
