### CONVENTION NEWS

In the executive offices of MR. NAJEEB HALABY, President of Pan American World Airways, he congratulated MRS. DORIS RENNINGER and members of her committee on the Ninety Nines' forthcoming 40th Anniversary Convention and accepted the invitation to be the principal speaker at the Honors Night Banquet in the Starlight Roof of the Waldorf Astoria on July 12, 1969. MR. HALABY was formerly Administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration and began his flying career at the age of 17, served as a commercial pilot, instructor of the Army-Air Force and later as a test pilot and a Navy pilot.

### Attention Delegates and Chapter Chairmen

Would you believe that each year only 50% of the Delegates arrive with Delegate cards? At our Executive Board meeting in April we decided to enforce the policy which for years has been a problem.
