

What did Piper do with those flood-damaged parts? Scrapped 'em.

Early in September the first airplane came off the line at Lock Haven since Hurricane Agnes flooded parts of our plant and offices.

There was not one single part or component in that Navajo that was affected by the flood.

That airplane and the others following it, for domestic or international use, are certificated as "factory fresh," and are indeed that . . . totally new in every sense of the word.

How did we make positively sure that our new Aztecs, Navajos and Twin Comanches would never have a trace or taint of the flood? By the simplest, most positive means we could think of.

We totally cleaned out the huge sections of the plant where fuselages, wings and sub-assemblies are fabricated and then go into finished airplanes.

Any airplane in the process of assembly and any and all sub-assemblies were condemned, even though all Navajos and Aztecs are painstakingly primed, part by part, to prevent corrosion. These were summarily scrapped.

Fortunately, the flood did not affect the manufacture of the thousands of different detail parts that go into a fine, modern airplane, because these are made at two of our other plants at Renovo and Piper, Pa., which were not in the flood area.

Thus, by the time we got the physical plant back into shape, the pipeline of parts for sub-assembly was well filled.

In the meantime, we find ourselves in excellent financial health. Insurance and extraordinary tax considerations as well as long term government flood relief loans further lessened the real losses sustained.

To help meet the unprecedented backlog of orders, production will continue to mount at Lock Haven as rapidly as is possible while still maintaining our high standards. To assist in the orderly return to normal, we have added several hundred to the payroll which now totals 2,400, a near record.

In the meantime, our Vero Beach Plant continues to increase its production of Seneca and Cherokee aircraft.

The steps we have taken have been bold, decisive and expensive, but represent Piper's determination to put out the best possible product at all times.

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NEW 99 HEADQUARTERS BUILDING

For the first time, the concept of our Headquarters Building is in the form of an artist's drawing! In color, it presents an exciting look into our near future. The firm of Hudgins, Thompson, Ball, architects, prepared the drawing for the Ninety-Nines so it could be shown at the convention in Toronto. Delegates and other members attending the business meeting were all so eager to get a closer look, that the drawing was carried down the center isle while discussion was being carried on. A reprint, reduced in size and shown without color, is pictured below for all members to see.


A master plan of Will Rogers World Airport at Oklahoma City was first presented in order to show members the site selected west of runway 17-Left. North of the main terminal building, the higher ground would allow the building to be seen from a major highway interchange soon to be built. The view from the site includes all of the airport, the FAA Aeronautical Center, open country and a good look at the downtown skyline of modern buildings. Sufficient land is adjacent to accomodate additional satellite buildings or fingers built onto the center structure. Future plans could include a taxiway to the building site with a parking area for visiting aircraft.

The architect was asked to picture a round building, symbolizing an omni station (with smokestack removed) and communication to pilots. The official 99 emblem, pictured in gold on the building by the entrance, is a striking symbol of our organization. The compass

rose is shown to be inlaid in the floor of the center of the building where displays could be located. The choice of materials to be used is almost unlimited! The ceiling in the center part is four feet higher than the rest of the building ceiling, for suspending displays.

Presentation of the building plan was made by Susie Sewell as a part of the Headquarters report; when called for by Lois Feigenbaum, Headquarters Committee Chairman, it was referred to as something very "exciting." Delegates voted to accept the report which included a recommendation that the President and Executive Board continue to pursue the plan and study an offer made by the Oklahoma City Airport Trust to build the building with airport revenue bonds. An exclusive long-term lease on the building to the Ninety-Nines would include an option for renewal after the initial term of the lease which would be from 25 to 50 years. The proposal is expected to be available for study early this fall.

The establishment of a permanent headquarters building in the center of the country has long been our dream, ever since our first real headquarters office was established at Oklahoma City over 18 years ago. We had only one file cabinet when our records were moved from New York and an office was "made" for us in the terminal building. Oklahoma City has always treated us fairly and with much enthusiasm for our future growth. They wish to continue to play a major part in helping our dream come true.



International Women's Air and Space Museum

The International Women's Air and Space Museum, located in Ninety-Nine Headquarters at Oklahoma City's Airport Terminal Building was bustling with activity May 22, 1972. Members of the Museum Committee were arriving for a Museum Trust Meeting, and they were laden with articles and material they had been receiving and collecting for the Museum. There was excitement and enthusiasm as they began unpacking and sorting these newest Museum accessions — many to be included in the imminent Powder Puff Derby and International Museum displays.

Museum Chairman, Bernice Steadman, carefully unpacked a large, white oval plaque that was a beautiful bas-relief of an Amelia Earhart profile. Charter member, Mary E. Von Mach had been given this "lovely" by Amelia Earhart and she has donated it for the Museum's display. Good news also — Mr. Spexrath of Texas is completing a model of Amelia's Vega airplane and it will be painted in her airplane's colors and with her N.C. number on it.

Curator, Page Shamburger, brought her personal file of Powder Puff memorabilia to donate to the Museum — AWTAR programs, 1964 through 1968 and 1971;

time sheets; entry lists; official result sheets; a set of color, and black and white pictures of the 1968 Race, plus charms from the Start and Terminus of that year; and her bracelet with the map charms of the race routes for 1964 through 1968. Bernice Steadman brought a huge scrapbook made up of the many pictures, clippings and records of the 1956 AWTAR Terminus. This was the year the race started in San Carlos, California and ended in Flint, Michigan with Fran Berra winning her third race in four years. Unpacked also, was a sterling silver, engraved "Winner's Tray". This tray had been retired in 1966 and has been donated by Past President, Louise Smith.

The beautiful 1st place Co-pilot's trophy of the 25th anniversary Powder Puff Derby has been donated by the AWTAR Board and was "hand carried" to the Museum by Vice Chairman, **Doris Renninger**. This four foot trophy caused quite a bit of comment aboard the TWA flights to Oklahoma City and the stewardesses were most solicitous that no harm came to it. (It flew 1st class, strapped in, with a pillow tucked under it's head)

With all this material and other Race memorabilia received from AWTAR, there is one thing for sure, if you have had a secret ambition to fly the race and haven't been able to — just stand in the middle of this Powder Puff Derby display and dream a little — you can go home a winner!

The International Sections and Membersat-Large have generously contributed memorabilia concerning women pilots of their countries for the Museum's first International Display. (This is to coincide with the 1972 International Convention in Toronto, Canada, July 12 to 16, 1972, the first to be held outside the United States.

Sheila Scott, record holder, and founder of the British Section of the Ninety-Nines, has placed on loan her "Capsule Wardrobe". If you have wondered how a lady pilot who must, by necessity, travel light, and yet manage to remain impeccably groomed, you can see it in this display. Sheila donated her book "I Must Fly" and replaceable, signed first day covers, and envelopes, stamped and postmarked from the various countries included in her famous round-the-world flights.

Marie Richardson, Australia's Governor for 1969-1971 has added to the Museum's Tape Collection. She has recorded a most interesting tape on the history of women pilots in Australia. To preserve and protect the tape collection, Curator Page Shamburger, has made a master reel of each tape received, and they are copyrighted before the cassette is sent to the Museum.

From the Museum Trust meeting, it was evident that a great deal of in depth, and long range planning has been done by Museum Chairman Bernice Steadman. Much of this will be reported by B at the 1972 Convention and immediately following, in the Ninety-Nine News, for those not able to attend, but for the short range, or present planning, we need your help on the following:

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Flying With Infant Passengers

Following a normal delivery, a woman pilot may fly as soon as she has her obstetrician's permission and when she is able to remain seated comfortably. Should she wish to take her baby along, there are a few precautions to be taken.

Prior to the age of a week, an infant's breathing apparatus is not sufficiently developed to allow the respiratory adjustments which must be made during flight. Beyond the age of a week, a normal infant should experience no difficulty. The very young tolerate altitude better than their parents in most cases. If a portion of the flight is to be made at high altitudes, however, it will be necessary to provide oxygen for the infant as well as the other passengers. If no infant size mask is available, a small funnel or paper cup through which the oxygen tubing has been inserted can be used.

The baby should be provided with a bassinet which can be secured to the seat. Restraints should also fasten the baby in the bassinet. Preferably, the infant should be held during take-offs, landings and during turbulence, so it helps to have a "baby-sitter" along.

An ice chest can be used for carrying supplies of formula and water. A thermos container of warm formula should also be carried for use during flight. During descent, the baby should be awakened and given a bottle to nurse, or made to cry. This helps to equalize the air pressures in the

middle ear. Infants are particularly susceptible to "ear block" probably due to delayed development of the bones of the jaw.

Motion sickness is rarely a problem. Babies enjoy the rocking motion and will probably sleep throughout the flight. Placing the baby in the face-down position will prevent choking if he should "spit up".

Of course, clothing changes and diapers are necessary, particularly if there is a different climate at the destination. You will undoubtedly develop a check list of necessities in time for your future 99 or 49 1/2.

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LETTER FROM AMELIA

Here is a copy of handwritten letter to Louise Thaden from Amelia Earhart.

Dear Louise,

As Vice President of the Ninety Nines, you will succeed to the Presidency if anything happens to me. To make your job easier in case. . . I am listing what you will find in the club files and making a few suggestions for future conduct of its affairs. The old correspondence and records, dating from the organization period, are separated (from the current ones)* and filed alphebetically. There is little of importance in these until they become historic, except the list of charter members. This I have constructed from original and almost illegible lists and had typed as the only authentic roster available. There are claims, you will find, but they are without foundation.

I have kept a number of folders and they are selfexplanatory. In the one marked Official Communications I have filed among other things, the letters I have sent to Governors every month. Under the present system, which appears as good as any, the governors are the backbone of the organization. I hope, therefore, you would keep in close touch with them as only so can the structure grow stronger.

I have thought it advisable to keep copies of the News Letters, as the combination of what they express is the embodiment of any new publication the club develops.

I have added to the subjects to come before the annual meeting that of a discussion of the military phase of flying. It appears that this is of interest to a certain number of girls and that more and more socalled patriotic organizations are springing up fill their needs. As there are so few women pilots I feel it is a shame to have efforts duplicated by overlapping groups. The Ninety Nines can have a Preparedness section (or Patriotic or any other name desired) and wear uniforms and be organized on as strict a basis as compatible with dignity and common sense. This thought is I believe as important one

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for the membership at large to understand. My wish has been and is, that the Ninety Nines may be one of those agencies which will help at least one segment of women to become individuals — industrially, mentally and spiritually.

This they should strive for in spite of failure which might tend to discourage them.

May 20

Dear Louise,

The enclosed official communication is rather rough in appearance but I didn't have time to copy it before I left. I am now just south of Prince Edward Island sitting in the back of a airplane so I can't do much about remedying the defects.

The envelope is postmarked St. Johns East Newfd, May 21, 12:30PM, 1932. In pencil on the back is a "squiggle" as Louise Thaden calls it from Bernt Balchen saying "AE took off 7:12 NFLD O.S. Time."


On August 16th our meeting was held at Shreveport Regional Airport, where the vacation Safety Seminar, which we are




FIRST CANADIAN CHAPTER Shirley K. Allen, Reporter
