#### "NATIONAL GENERAL **AVIATION WEEK FOR 1975?"** BY: MARILYN HIBNER

In the July/August issue of "Ninety-Nine News," the Long Island Chapter's column included a photo of a proclamation signing for the first "General Aviation Week" for Long Island, and gave a brief mention of it in the chapter column. This article is not for the purpose of further coverage of that event, but rather to "plant a seed" in the minds of Ninety-Nines throughout the

country -- and for members of our organization in other countries. It is my strong belief that "general aviation" needs frequent and increasing favorable exposure to the public if it is to enjoy a healthy climate in which it can survive and continue to grow. For the large majority of our population, "general aviation" is a puzzling term; they deal in the more frequent and familiar -- "planes, airlines, jets." In founding this first local "General Aviation Week," I became aware that the problem of an uninformed public and the corrective measures required can only be

attended to by those persons, organizations and companies who wish to preserve and improve the future of general aviation and reap its many benefits and pleasures. We cannot exist indefinitely under the presumption that the public will seek and strive to inform themselves by trips to the local airport and home-study courses on the subject of general aviation. Educating the public should be the endeavor of aircraft manufacturers, FBOs, local general aviation airports, and general aviation organizations -- such as the Ninety-Nines.

The time to consider your chapter's or section's involvement in such a project is NOW! Whether you would like to get a local "general aviation week" proclaimed in your area or state, or would like to strive for a "National General Aviation Week." such a project requires the good part of a year to successfully plan and produce for the public's enjoyment and interest. I am not suggesting this as an official Ninety-Nines project, but rather an aviation education project in which you could participate (or initiate), that should be of great interest and concern to general aviation pilots and to members of general aviation organizations, such as ours. Chapters and/or sections have the necessary womanpower and background to be the initiators of such a project in their locale, and further have the advantage of a country-wide organizational network with which a "National General Aviation Week" could be achieved.

Along with Long Island's recognition of "General Aviation Week" this past June 23 - 30, 1974 (the last week in June), other chapters in New York State joined in with activities in their local areas of the state. In addition to Ninety-Nines support, various other organizations and companies to join in were: CAP, FAA, FBOs, New York State Council of Aviation Organizations. and Aviation Council of Long Island. The educational promotion consisted of: static displays by the mentioned entities at shopping centers; activities at airports; safety programs open to the public as well' as general aviation pilots; raffles by organizations for flights in general aviation aircraft; and anything else that would give the public insight and education on the topic of general aviation. One organization offered an essay contest to high school students with four prizes of flight instruction through solo donated by FBOs. ATC simulators were set up for the public's participation. The ideas for promoting general aviation are endless! Balloon ascensions, antique and experimental aircraft displays, penny-a-pound programs, tours of radar control facilities, etc., etc. California read a news release of the Long Island efforts and has proceeded to plan their own "General Aviation Week."

If the idea sounds good to you, join in. Long Island, and hopefully New York State, will strive for a proclamation of General Aviation Week the last week in June, 1975; and we'd be happy to see it become contagious in other areas. Start your planning NOW to promote general aviation in June, 1975!

Betty Huyler Gillies (License 6525), fifth President of the Ninety-Nines, had served prior as Vice-Pres. to Daisy Kirkpatrick (33883). Betty was Commander in the WAFS and WASP '42-44, was AWTAR Director '53-61 and presently, a very active 99 lives at Rancho Santa Fe, Calif.



Jean LaRene (Foote) had a long tenure as first Governor of the South Central Section. Jean worked for Command-Aire, American Eagle, Dallas Aviation School and Foote Aviation: entered the '30-31-32 Derbies and made numerous endurance flights.



Margaret Perry (Cooper Manser) and the Tulsa-built Spartan J-6-5 she entered in the '29 Derby; operated the Culver City, Calif. Airport.Margaret was the first Southwest Governor and second Ninety-Nines' President. Was elected NY-NJ Governor in 1936 and was one of the first two Permanent Trustees of the Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Fund; Alma Harwood, Rye, New York, was the other.

Dorthea (Dot) Leh, first Middle East Governor, with the OX-5 Travel Air, was elected to the post for three terms. She was a real leader of the Ninety-Nines in that Section and "there was a mighty fine gal", to quote Louise Thaden.

Mary Sansom, first Northeast (New England) Section Governor, and Edith Descomb (18157) were both well-known Hartford, Conn. pilots, noted for racing and aerobatics. Mary also managed Interstate Airways in 1930 at Hartford.

Edna Whyte (20000), Charter Whirly-Girl No. 10, needs no introduction -- Fourteenth Ninety-Nines Pres., noted instructor and racing pilot who now operates her own airport at Roanoke, Texas.

...Teddy Kenyon (9949), Whirly-Girl No. 28, and Myrtle Brown (7701), are 99s charter members. Teddy lives at Old Lyme, Conn. Myrtle was a sister-in-law of Guiseppe Bellanca.

...Annette Gipson (14652) sponsored her annual air races '32-34 and helped to stimulate racing. She entered lots of competition herself; among others, the '34 National Meet at Vandalia, Ohio and the '36 Ruth Chatterton Derby from Cleveland to San Diego.



Lauretta Schimmoler, circa 1930, at Sycamore, Ohio with training plane. First North Central Governor and Second Sec.-Treas. of the 99s; managed Muni Airport, Bucyrus, Ohio '32-33, served in the WAC during WWII. Lauretta founded the Aerial Nurse Corps, forerunner to the Flight Nurse. She organized and was the first and seventeenth Commander of the Amelia Earhart American Legion Post at Glendale, and now lives at Glendale, Calif.







Edith Foltz (Stearns), by the Alexander Eaglerock she flew in the first '29 Women's Air Derby, pioneer Northwest pilot, first Governor of the Northwest Section, served in the Air Transport Auxiliary in England during WWII and entered the '52-53 AWTAR with Pauline Glasson of Corpus Christi.

Marjorie May Lesser (Van Antwerp), first Governor of NY NJ Section, must have had a good sense of humor for on the back of her photo, sent by her son, she had written, "covered wagon days"!

(Editor's Note: Some time ago, when Virginia Thompson was Historian, we started a BIG project to record the histories of ALL State chapters in the various sections. At first we expected this would run in the 99 NEWS for some five years. However, we waited for these histories to come in so that we might run them in order of their founding. We waited in vain, and many chapters have not yet responded. When we went to six magazine issues our project was held over due to lack of space. Now that we are again going to ten issue per year, we decided to start publishing those we had.. First to arrive was the history of the California Chapters compiled by Ruth Rueckert, Bay Cities Chapter. Since this was done by Ruth, new chapters have developed, which we will cover in the future. Meantime, Ruth and those who cooperated with her to get it all together', are to be congratulated on a job well done.)

A History of The California Chapters, Southwest Section, The Ninety-Nines, Inc.

1929

In the beginning there was the Southwestern Section: California, Nevada, Utah and Arizona, 467,933 square miles. California's 158,297 square miles had twelve Charter members; (Nevada, one; Utah and Arizona, none).

1974

Forty-five years later, the State of California has over 800 Ninety-Nines, in 27 Chapters.

About one-fourth the total membership in the Ninety-Nines, Inc., reside in California. To mention each member by name, with her accomplishments, would be an impossible task.

The All-Woman Transcontinental Air Race, Inc., - The Powder Puff Derby (PPD) - is theoretically transcontinental, and California has had the Start and or the Finish of all the 26 PPDs, with the exception of three.

The Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Fund (AEMS), established in 1940-41, honors our first President, who lived in and learned to fly in southern California. Therefore each Chapter takes pride in raising funds for this Scholarship.

After the "black-out" of the West Coast during World War Two, the State was badly in need of air-marking. Today, as you

transverse the State, the air-marks noted are, in the majority, done by members of the California Chapters.

The Wings for Drug Relief Fund (DRF), with headquarters in Santa Barbara, was brought to the attention of the national membership by Betty Ardell Hinn of the Monterey Bay Chapter.

The above are four of the major actilvities of the California members, active in every phase of aviation; members with ratings from Private to ATR and careers from homemaker to professorship.

1932

In order for members to work more closely to further aviation, Margaret Perry Cooper (Manser) organized the Bay Cities Chapter in Northern California, and the Los Angeles Chapter in Southern California. Both Chapters have celebrated its 41st. Anniversary.

The BAY CITIES CHAPTER was chartered March 2, 1932, with nine members. Three, Lillian Anderson, Phyllis Penfield (a Charter member of the 99s) and Ruth Rueckert are still listed in the Roster. Our "territory" was northern California, northern Nevada and the state of Utah. To interest women pilots in this area, "Winging Parties" were held, and over the

41 years, some 250 members were recruited, and the Chapter sponsored, or gave members to, eleven of the now existing Chapters in California. Five members were Section Governor; two became International President; two, International Treasurer and A.E. Trustees; and in the Smithsonian Air Museum are 25 books, covering the first 25 years of the 99s, compiled by Ruth Ruecker, International Historian, 1949-55.

The Chapter was hostess to the AWTAR (PPD) three times, with contestants entered many times: Jan and Marion Dietrich placed second; Geri Hill, tenth. Helen Kelton (an AEMS winner) and

Margaret Gerhardt are Timer Judges of the PPD. Jan Dietrich as an ATR rating, and been Chief Pilot of a Jet Star. Jean Tinsley is our only Whirly-Girl.

The Chapter was hostess to the Section Meeting four times, and other activities include air-marking 2 cent per lb. airlifts, airport show, Wing Scout troop sponsors, and provided speakers for service groups, radio and television; two members are Ex-WASPS.

On the 41st Anniversary there were 34 members, but once again the Bay Cities Chapter is sponsoring another Chapter - Marin County - and will transfer some members to it.

The LOS ANGELES CHAPTER also formed in 1932, covered southern California, southern Nevada and Arizona. Many of the Charter Ninety-Nines lived in southern California, three of whom are still active pilots: Melba Gorby Beard, Achsa Peacock Holfelder and Betty Huyler (N.Y.) Gillies. Also in this year, record flights were made in California by Bobbie Trout, Louise McPhetridge (Thaden) and Amelia Farhart

In 1937 member Lauretta Schimmoler launched the Aerial Nurse Corps of America and Viola Neill outfitted a Stinson Reliant for a flying ambulance service. May 9, 1930 Margaret Perry was the first woman in the U.S. to own and operate a flying field - Culver City Airport. In 1939 Pinkie Brier became owner and operator of Tri-Cities Airport, in San Bernardino.

Four members were President, 13, Governor. The FIRST AWTAR, 1946, Palm Springs to Tampa, Forida, was won by Carolyn West (then Chairman) and

Beatrice Medes (vice-chairman of the Chapter). Mardo Crane, founder of the AWTAR, was Los Angeles Chapter Chairman in 1947-49. Early National 99 Conventions were held in Los Angeles, and the Chapter has been hostess to several Section Meeting.

In 1951 the Chapter split into three: Los Angeles, Long Beach and San Fernando Valley.

It was the sponsor of French pilot Jacqueline Auriol, as a member-at-large. During the war years, many members were Women Airforce Service Pilots (WASPs).

Activites include air-marking, 2 cents per lb. airlifts, high-altitude indoctrination courses, and ferrying drugs for DRF. The Chapter supports the National Arthritic Foundation and the Exceptional Children's Opportunity Fund, and fly with the Valley Airmen's Association in cooperation with the Calexico Orthopedic Clinic, flying crippled children to and from Los Angeles Hospital, and taking supplies to Calexico. Many members fly the PPD, and the Chapter won the Section Trophy for highest professional flying time, as well as for the non-professioonal.

Los Angeles Chapter has been the sponsor of, or given members to, ten or more Chapters in the Southwest Section. At the 40th Anniversary Party, Esther Johnson, first Chairman was present; Melba Beard, the speaker.

#### 1946

As always, the driving distances influenced the formation of new Chapters, and thus the SAN DIEGO CHAPTER was chartered Sept. 14, 1946. Jessie Ostrander, Evelyn Briggs and former National President Betty Gillies were the guiding lights, with eleven charter members. The foregoing three, plus Betty Lambert are still listed in the Roster.

The next three years found the Chapter members active in fly-ins, air-marking, and winning a contest for increasing the membership 83 per cent. Hostess of the Third AWTAR in 1949 - and the 1950, 1958. 1961, 1965, and 1969 (the last two assisted by other near-by-Chapters)- many members have flown the Race, and Placing among the first ten.. In 1972 Marion Banks won First Place, with Dottie Sanders (El Cajon Chapter) co-pilot. Two 99 Conventions, and several Section Meetings have been held in San Diego. From 1964 to date, the Pacific Air Race, (P.A.R.) has been sponsored; as were two Chapters, Phoeniz (Ariz.) and Palomar. The first Girl Scout Wing Troop in the County was sponsored, and yet another. Scholarships to C.A.P. cadets were given. The members are active in the Flying Samaritans, the Coast Guard Auxilliary, and are assistants with the San Diego Aero-Space Museum. Three members - Betty Gillies, Theresa Vasques and Marion Banks were on the Women's Advisory Committee on Aviation.

The White Knuckles Association for reluctant passengers originated in the San Diego Chapter, which has resulted in the Pinch-Hitters Courses for non-pilots, a regular event at AOPA meetings.

#### 1947

In Bakersfield there were two National Charter Members, Eva Mae Lange and Achsa Peacock (Holdfelder). The city being "midway" between northern and southern California, it was a popular meeting place of Southwest Section members. Several air shows were held, with 99s competing - one in particular was on May 7th, 1933 The American Legion Air Races at Kern County Airport. On October 5th, 1947 the BAKERSFIELD CHAPTER was chartered and the Spring Section Meeting was held there in 1948.

Officers were elected for the 1948-49 year, but the Chapter became inactive in Sept. 1949. Re-activated in late 1953, it immediately was hostess to the Fall Section Meeting. It has been an active Chapter ever since, hostessing the AWTAR Start in 1963 with a team from the Chapter competing - not the first team to do so.

After tunds were raised by a 1 cent per lb. airlift, a bus for the Mexican school children of Santa Maria, Baja, was purchased, and driven down by Chapter members to Santa Maria for presentation.

Assistance to air races, particularly the Hayward-Las Vegas Race, is a yearly project, with members flying as contestants. Air-marking all of Kern County's airports has been achieved; relaying DRF supplies; sponsoring FAA seminars and assisting with Kern County Airport Flight Service Clinics, are some of the activities of this Chapter.

Being centrally located, the Chapter has been hostess to many of the Spring and Fall Section Meetings, one in 1962 in conjunction with the Greater Bakersfield Chamber of Commerce "Aviation weekend", with the Blue Angels performing.

Nov. 16, 1947 the SACRAMENTO VALLEY CHAPTER was Chartered with seven members. Only Coral Bloom one of the seven, is still active in the Chapter, and has been flying for 30 years, holds instrument, multi-engined and flight instructor ratings. A teacher in the Aero education program of a Junior College in Concord, her former students now fly all over the world.

At present with over fifty members, the Chaoter is active with assists to AOPA Safety Flight Clinics; supervises the yearly Palms-to-Pines Air Race RON at Red Bluff; and twice hostess to the Section Meetings, 1960 and 1968.

Geraldine Mickelsen was a member of Sacramento Valley Chapter when she was elected to the office of International President, serving 1953-55.

The center of this Chapter is the State Capitol, and members are alert to aviation legislation being put forward - working for, and against such legislation.

On Nov. 17, 1972, the 25th Anniversary was celebrated with a dinner party, which drew 99s from all points, including International President Susie Sewell, of Oklahoma City; two past-Presidents, Broneta Evans, Mangum, Oklahoma, and Gerry Mickelsen; and Governor of the Southwest Section, Mary Vial, Phoenix,

#### 1949

Nov. 1st., COACHELLA VALLEY CHAPTER was chartered with five members, including the famous Jacqueline Cochran (President 1941-43). In 1950 a membership drive added many members, including Zaddie Bunker, who was the "Official Greeter" at the 1954 Fall Section Meeting at Desert Air Hotel near Palm Springs. Eleanor Wagner, who was the first elected Chairman of the Chapter and Treasurer of the Southwest Section in 1955-56 found her Chapter inactive from 1957 to July 15th, 1961, when it was reactivated.

Public relations improved with the over-70 year-old Zaddie Bunker's travels, and the Chapter hostessing fly-ins to the area. A team entered the AWTAR in 1963; hostessed AWTAR stops at Palm Springs in 1953 and 1967 and timed at Fresno in 1970; held a mass fly-in to March AFB in 1964; won the Section Trophy for airmarking; members Fay Douthitt and Phyllis Wescott won the Fallon Fun Race in 1965; also in 1965 had a booth at the International Aero Classics in Palm

Springs, displaying 99 memorabillia. In April 1970 the Chapter honored Cliff Henderson, founder of Palm Desert - and the Promotor of the 1930's Cleveland Air Races - with a "Den-Daddy" designation; and aided the Angelus Antiquers with their fly-in to Palm Desert.

This month instead of writing about an interesting flying activity, (and there have been many, Puerto Rico, your own Fall Sectional, mine which was one of the best ever at Marion, Illinois, etc.) I would like to speak to each and every Flying Activity Chairman. If your Chapter doesn't have one urge your Chairman to appoint one, or better yet, volunteer to serve as the FA Chairman for your Chapter. I hope every Chapter Chairman will send the name of their FA Chairman to the Section FA Chairman, If you don't know your Section FA Chairman please send the name to me and I will see that she gets it. (My address is in the Roster). In turn, will each Governor send me the name of her Section FA Chairman, or have the Section Secretary send the name to me?

I have found that my greatest need is communication. My greatest wish is that I

could make our members more aware of the importance of Flying Activities. I feel most officers tend to feel this is just a fun thing and really doesn't matter too much whether or not is is followed up.

Actually, 9 out of 10 girls who join the 99s do so because they want more opportunities to fly. Many drop away and don't show up at meetings because they find they are just in another group such as PTA, Sorority, etc. If there is some PLANNED Flying Activites these girls will be happy to join in. As a result they will come to know the other members and soon become active in many other projects in which we are involved.

Also, the Flying Activity Chairman should feel responsible to keep up with Aviation Legislation, Safety, Air Education and Membership.

Some small Chapters don't bother with a Flying Activity Chairman because they feel they live so far apart they all fly to the meetings and this is their Flying Activites.

You find that these small Chapters also do not have a Legislation Chairman, Air Education Chairman, etc. These could all be combined under the duties of the Flying Activity Chairman.

We are a flying organization so every activity we participate in concerns the Flying Activity Chairman. A Flying Activity Chairman should work as a liaison officer for all Committee Chairmen in the Chapter. She should be enthusiastic, provide information, consider Flying Activities as an important part of the 99s. It can offer friendship and a means of getting acquainted for the new 99. 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#### Crash Program For Safety By Marilyn Hibner, Chairman

ATTENTION: Section Governors, Chapter Chairmen, General Membership

The May-June 99 NEWS had, a re-print of a speech given by Pat McEwen, I strongly urge you to read it now; for it presents a set of fact that well illustrate the recent status of safety education programs for pilots. It is not an optimistic situation. We should all feel great admiration for Pat's firm and outspoken comments aided at generating a healthier climate and enthusiastic action for safety education programs for pilots. As interantional President, Pat McEwen has ACTED by designating a new Internation Committee - Safety Education. The 99s as a pilots' organization have the ability and motivation to inspire, form and operate a multitude of safety-oriented programs for attendance and participation by pilots, and the non-flying public. This program will depend greatly on our membership's ATTITUDE, ENTHUSIASM AND ACTION. Our newly-formed committee urgently needs input from all of you. A brief description of the committee's areas of function thus far includes:

SAFETY EDUCATION OF MEMBERS: We are asking that each Chapter schedule 2 meeting-functions per year devoted to safety education of member (exclusive of A.P.T.); that each Section plan a Safety theme for one of their meetings each year; that there be one program planned for the Annual International Convention each year devoted to safety education. There will be a column in 99 NEWS by this committee; 99 statistics will be developed and maintained regarding our membership safety records to compare with the national trend; and the establishment of a printed "Pilot Safety Maintenance Program" will occur for distribution. SAFETY EDUCATION OF OTHER PILOTS: We will expect each chapter to sponsor, at least once a year, a program such as an FAA Safety Clinic and FAA Safety Check-Ride Clinic; FAA CFI Re-Validation Clinic, or other similar type of program available to the pilot population of your locale.

SAFETY EDUCATION OF NON-FLYING PUBLIC: Each section is to have a Speaker's Bureau formed of members from each of its chapters so that all geographic areas of the section are represented on the Speaker's bureau. The Bureau will endeavor to arrange speaking engagemnts throughout the section's geographical area, for the purpose of educating the public on aviation, its safety aspects, its vast range of service in the field of transportation, and, of course, the background of the Ninety-Nines and its role in aviation today. In addition, each section is to promote and assist in organizing a "General Aviation Week" celebration with displays for the last week in June each year, with emphasis on sarety, aviation programs, etc. On the chapter level, chapters will be asked to offer, at least once a year, one of the following to promote safety education of the public: penny-a-pound, S.A.F.E. seminar,

A.W.A.R.E. seminar, or to chieve a printed feature article in a newspaper geared to educating the public on aviation and its superior safety aspects in the field of transportation.

As an incentive for participation by all member, the afore-mentiond programs-projects will all be re-stated in the next 99 NEWS issue and will have assigned to them various "points" that can be earned by the chapter-section for their accomplishments in the work of this committee. At the next International Convention, a presentation will be made to that chapter-section which acquires the greates number of points as result of their endeavors in the field of safety education in the name of the Ninety-Nines. We need to ACT in the following ways:

SECTION GOVERNORS: Select-appoint a Speaker's Bureau with a chairman. Appoint a Section Safety Education Chairman and submit her name to the International Safety Education Chairman within one month. Review all areas of Safety Education listed herein for other action on your part. You Governors will be the members of the International Committee for Safety Education.

CHAPTER CHAIRMEN: Appoint a Chapter Safety Education Chairman and submit her name to your Section Governor. The Chapter Safety Education Chairman will work with the Section's Safety Education Chairman, and will also be responsible for encouraging her chapter's participation in the program-project, herein mentioned.

The International Committee for Safety Education will endeavor to work closely with representatives fo the FAA and GAMA so it is vital that we generate visible proof of safety education in action as quickly as possible. Mailings will go out periodically from this committee to the various organizational levels, asking for responses, advising you of new suggested programs-ideas, advising you of SOP's and data in existence on various-programs projects and aking for reports on your accomplishments and points claimed for same.

SAVING LIVES-ENRICHING LIVES-SAFETY EDUCATION NEEDS THE SUPPORT OF ALL OF YOU.
