Contestants from many states, including Georgia, Alabama, Florida, California, Pennsylvania, and Connecticut, have entered this interesting event in the past. THE MICHIGAN AVIATION **FESTIVAL AND RALLY By Claire Oiala** 

The well-known Michigan Chapters of 99's SMALL Race was replaced this year by the Michigan Aviation Festival and Rally. This break from the tradition evolved over the uncertainty of aviation fuel supplies last winter and the feeling that the 99s should demonstrate, in a positive manner, their concern for the future of General Aviation in a world of shrinking resources and growing restrictions on personal activities.

The theme of this event was to improve pilot skills in operating aircraft in the most fuel efficient manner. The Rally was flown enroute to the event at beautiful Autumncolorful Bellaire, Michigan and judged the pilots ability to fly the rally to predicted flight plan time and fuel consumptions. Scores for the first five places showed considerable skills in this area, perhaps gained from previous races as the first five places were within 2 per cent of a perfect

The non-flying part of the program was a potpori of aviation lore ranging from technical programs on engine, fuels, cruise control, airframes and new aircraft developments to aviation insurance, microwave ILS, hand gliding demonstrations and static displays. Biennial flight reviews were also given to participants.

All attendees agreed that this unique event was interesting, fun, and appropriate to the times. Therefore, it was disappointing that only 26 aircraft entered the Rally versus the 60 plus standbys that have attended previous SMALL races. Those who could not enter the Rally but drove in, helped to swell the ranks and were as enthusiastic as the fly-ins.

Since our event was a timely and unique one to the 99s, it would be interesting to the SMALL RACE Board to know why there was less support then for pure races.

Numerous small roads and trails abound in and around the strip and fall of the year provides a myriad of color. Tieton airstrip on Rimrock Lake just east of White Pass. All of our State airstrips are closed during the winter. Bait and tackle sold at Charter office, you may bring your own or rent for \$2.00 per day for complete set. Bring your own lunch or buy from Cafe. Coffee on board. Warm clothes and rain gear may be needed to protect from wind or rain. No fishing license required. Write Sunrise Charters, P.O. The first woman to be appointed to the California State Aeronautics Board is Madine Carpenter, member of the Orange County Chapter of the 99s. Madine probably came to the favorable attention of California's Governor Ronald Reagan because of her flying her State Senator Dennis E. Carpenter husband to meetings in areas that might otherwise have been inaccessible to him, especially time-wise. Madine has been "in the air" since the 1950's, when she flew as a TWA hostess. She went on to really get involved — accumulating her ratings as Commercial pilot, flight and ground instructor, single & multi engine ratings, with a license to fly as an Instrument pilot. Her interest went to racing and she placed first in both the Vixen Frisk and the Palms to Pines events. She was sponsored twice by Air California in the AWTAR, but flew two other PPDs as well.

Her main goal in being a Commissioner is the "hope of saving airports and saving Los Alamitos for a general aviation airport in particular." Having owned and operated her own flying business, she should know what she's talking about. Her enthusiasm and her contacts with VIPs will help a lot as she develops her place as a Commissioner.

Geri likes racing and has competed in the Angel Derby, the PAR (Pacific Air Race), the Reno Fun Race, and the Mini Derby (staged bythe Golden West Chapter). She has received many high awards, among them a FAA Certificate of Merit for 1971; Monterey Bay 99 of the Year, 1972; and the Monterey Peninsula Airmen Pilot of the Year, 1973.

She is a Private Pilot, SEL, with 500 hours and obviously Geri Halfpenny is still on the way UP.

A new Commissioner recently appointed to the Arkansas Aeronautics Commission for a 5-year term by Governor Dale Bumpers, is personable Marge McLean, member of the Arkansas Chapter of the 99s. She makes it a family affair, for her husband, Bill, serves in the capacity as chairman of the Little Rock Airport Commission, both thus dedicated to aviation service.

# Virginia Proctor

As the first woman to serve on the Arkansas Aeronautics Commission, being appointed by Arkansas Governor Dale Bumpers in 1971, Virginia Proctor asserted herself immediately, she became vice-chairman of the Commission in 1972, and chairman in 1973. She is an active member of the Memphis Chapter 99s, demonstrating her leadership in our organization as chapter secretary, vice-chairman, and chairman; and going ahead to the offices of secretary and treasurer, and now Vice-Governor of the Southeast Section.

In her job as Commissioner she says, "I feel that the main key to the growth of general aviation is in educating the public as to the importance of aviation in the growth and development of communities. We need to make people aware of the potentials, needs, problems, career opportunities, etc., of general aviation. We can do this by speaking to civic clubs, schools, working with Scouts and other youth groups, writing our congressmen and senators about legislation vital to the industry and above all, creating a good image as a safe proficient pilot."

Virginia holds a Commercial license with instructor and instrument ratings. She and her attorney-husband, who is also a municipal Judge of Wynne, Arkansas, own a Cessna 172, and their flying is for pleasure. She has three married sons, and is a grandmother, but as with our 99s, the more she does, the more active she seems to become in aviation. She is personally responsible for many of the innovative programs which have given the Arkansas Aeronautics Commission nationwide attention.

# **Ruth Reinhold**

Although we tried to get a photograph of Ruth, who is a member of the Phoenix Chapter 99s, perhaps we can rely on their accomplished reporter Natasha Swigard, to accept this challenge on our behalf, so that we may run it in a later issue.

Ruth is on her second five-year term as a member of the Arizona Board of Aeronautics. She is probably most widely known as being the pilot for famous Barry Goldwater, especially during his try for the Presidency. As a Commissioner, she has been vice-chairman for a year, and chairman of this Board for a year.

One of her interests is the development of a history of Arizona Aviation from the balloons about 1890 through aviation beginnings to WWII. The first draft of her book is almost completed.

She modestly lists her memberships in addition to the 99s in which she maintains an active role, as the O X 5 Club, the I.O.C., and the American Aviation Historical Society.

In keeping with a new concept by Arizona, Ruth will see her activities on the Board widened to include "building highways along with airports". A person with such a solid aviation background as that of Ruth Reinhold is bound to be a most valued Commissioner.

# Federation Aeronautique Internationale 67th General Conference Sydney, Australia

WOMEN STAR IN F.A.I. AWARDS

History was made when the 67th General Conference of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale was held in Sydney from 27th October to 2nd November, 1974. It was the first such Conference to be held in Australia and was only the second time it has been held in the Southern Hemisphere.

The Conference was organized by the Royal Federation of Aero Clubs of Australia and 350 delegates attended from more than 50 countries.

The Conference was opened at the famous Sydney Opera House by His Excellency the Honourable Sir John Kerr, K.C.M.G., K.St.J., Q.C., Governor General of Australia.

Awards won by women included:-

Lilienthal Medal - For exceptional performance in gliding or eminent services over a long period on behalf of gliding, awarded to Mrs. Ann Welch of the United Kingdom. Ann holds the British National Women's Gold Flight Record of 538 k.m., has been Vice Chairman of the British Gliding Association for 19 years and Chairman of its National Instructors Panel for 22 years. She has been British representative to the International Gliding Committee since 1964 and Vice President since 1970. She undertook the revision of Section 3 of the F.A.I. Sporting Code (Gliders).

F.A.I. Paul Tissander Diplomas were awarded to Madame Lucienne Biancotto, France and Madame Ecaterina Diaconu, Rumania. These awards are made annually to those who while not qualifying for one of the F.A.I. medals, have, nevertheless, during the previous years, served the cause of aviation in general and private and sporting aviation in particular, by their work, initiative and devotion.

The F.A.I. also recognizes group efforts and this year Australia's Royal Flying Doctor Service was one of the two recipients. "99" Robin Miller Dicks and her husband flew from Port Hedland, North West Australia to Sydney to receive this award

A feature of the Conference was the Australian Day when delegates were the guests of the Royal Aero Club of N.S.W. Events included typically Australian activities such as a wood shop, Sheep dog trials, Boomerang throwing, Reptiles display, Sheep shearing, Clay shooting, Bar B.Q. luncheon, Koala bears, Kangaroos, Wombats, a fly-past by F111c R.A.F. planes, Hang gliding display by Bill Moyes, Ten man star parachute jump - Australian Parachute Federation, Tiger Moth formation - R.N.A.C., Gliding - Southern Cross Gliding Club, Cropdusting, Ultra light display, Pitts special

aero display, Nomad - Australian aircraft display.

Two world champion balloonists, Dr. Jan Voesman and his wife Nimi of the Netherlands made a three hour flight in a hydrogen filled balloon which carried 2,000 specially stamped envelopes for philatelists.

# HYPOXIA (Cont.)

Headache and lethargy usually occur after a prolonged period of hypoxia. The headache is most severe in the forehead region, and is probably caused by swelling of the brain tissues as a result of oxygen deficiency. Fortunately, permanent cerebral damage rarely occurs. Nausea, vomiting and severe weakness may also follow hypoxic periods. The best cure for these symtoms is sleep, and if available, 100 per cent oxygen.

You may have heard the term, "time of useful consciousness." This is the of time that an individual can be reasonably expected to remain fully conscious, with enough mental alertness to perform satisfactorily after sudden oxygen deprivation. This is most important in high altitude flying, and is really academic for those who never fly above 10.000 feet. There is much individual variation, of course, but here is a general guide:

At 15,000 to 18,000 feet, without supplemental oxygen, some people may faint, but most just become incompetent in one-half hour or less.

At 20,000 feet consciousness can usually be maintained for 5 to 12 minutes, At 26,000 feet, for 4 to 6 minutes,

At 30,000 feet, for 1 to 2 minutes,

At 38,000 feet for 30 seconds or less, and

Above 50,000 feet a pilot has just 10 to 12 seconds in which to perceive that he has an oxygen deficiency and to take necessary steps to save his life.

In cases of rapid decompression sudden failure of the pressurization system in a pressurized cabin - the time of useful consciousness is even less. If pressurization fails at high altitude for any reason, the pilot and other crew members must use oxygen immediately and descend as quickly as possible to a safer altitude, preferably below 10,000 feet.

Rapid decompression in aircraft is an infrequent occurrence, but all pilots should be able to recognize it. Mechanical failure of the pressurization system or perforation of the cabin walls due to structural failure or other damage can occur in any pressurized aircraft, including airliners.

When a decompression happens, the cabin altitude becomes the same as the ambient altitude. If the aircraft is flying at 35,000 feet, and a hole is produced in the fusilage wall, very quickly (depending upon the relative size of the hole and the cabin) the cabin altitude is also 35,000 feet. Since the outside air is much colder than the cabin air, as the decompression occurs, moisture condenses forming a fog. The cabin becomes as cold as the outside air. Anything in the vicinity of the hole is in danger of being sucked through as the air rushes out. From the rapid decompressions which have occurred in flight, the primary danger comes from the possibility of being sucked through the opening or struck by flying debris.

Apart from the rapid decompression itself, the flight altitude determines the severity of the physiological symptoms particularly hypoxia and sudden gas expansion.

All crew and passengers must immediately use the oxygen equipment provided for such emergencies. Pilot passengers could be a great help to airline cabin crerws in assisting other passengers to cope with a rapid decompression, and possibly save some lives.

Remarks made by Pat McEwen, President of the Ninety-Nines, Inc., November 21, 1974, at the groundbreaking ceremony for the Headquarters Building site of the Ninety-Nines, Inc., Oklahoma City World Airport, Oklahoma:

It is with a heart full of thanksgiving and joy that I attend this groundbreaking ceremony today. This culminates several years effort on the part of many to find a permanent home for the Ninety-Nines. We have found such a home and we will be eternally grateful to the Mayor of Oklahoma City, and the Chamber of Commerce, the Airport Trust, and all the others who have worked so hard to make this day finally happen.

We are doing several things **good** here today! By building a building we are demonstrating faith in the future of our country. We are demonstrating faith in the future of aviation in this great city. We are demonstrating faith in the women pilots of today and of those who will follow in our footsteps. Follow much the same way, we

follow in the footsteps of our first president Amelia Earhart.

It was Amelia Earhart who said of women in general and of the Ninety-Nines in particular: "We must earn true respect and equal rights of men by accepting responsibilities and if we think and respond as capable human beings able to deal with and even enjoy the challenges of life, then we will have much to contribute." She got a particular kick out of women tackling all kinds of problems. This is one of the prime reasons she and the other women pilots in 1929 founded the Ninety-Nines.

They envisioned the Ninety-Nines as providing a close relationship among women pilots with the purpose of uniting them to carry out education, charitable, and scientific activities, especially those related to aviation. From the 99 charter members in 1929 we have grown to almost 5,000 strong in our 45th year. We will continue to grow. With our new home as a focal point, we cannot help but thrive.

I think it is appropriate that our official emblem is a compass rose with the Ninety-Nine intertwined in the middle. We have chosen a site that is centrally located for our home and hopefully the light of our endeavors will emanate to all points of the compass out to infinity.

Amelia Earhart could foresee that aviation would be of growing importance to industry and it is the climax of the pageant of human progress from oxcart to spacecraft. There is no field that has a greater lure for our young people than flying. We are going to provide a place for that youngster to study flying of today and yesterday.

Yes, today we start a very important new adventure. We are starting construction on a home, for the Ninety-Nines, for the next one hundred years. What a thrill it will be for some, as yet unborn, youngsters to come to our "home" and do research. If it were not for the vision and faith and courage of all of you here gathered, that would not be possible.

Nov. 20, 1949 the REDWOOD EMPIRE ins, hostessing the Section meetings, CHAPTER was chartered with seven Sonoma County women pilots, with Anna Brenner as first Chairman, and the only one of the seven currently a member. (Anna was National Historian from 1955-64). The Chapter was sponsored by the Bay Cities Chapter, and the guilding light was Marjorie Fauth, immediate Past Governor.

Hostessed the Spring Section in Santa Rosa in 1956 - see picture - and the Fall Section meeting in Hobergs, 1963 and again, a Spring Section meeting in Santa Rosa, in 1971, jointly with the Bay Cities

Phyllis Cantrell placed 10th in the 1964 AWTAR with Becky Lightfoot as copilot; placed 5th in 1965, with Betty Worstell, co-pilot; and 7th in 1966, with her daughter, Sandy Cantrell, co-pilot. Eight members of the Chapter flew the 1966 AWTAR, and Anita Worel is an AWTAR Timer.

Active in fly-ins, and airmarking, the Chapter also has a"Pilot of the Year" award, won by Anita Worel, 1967; Phyllis Cantrell, 1968, Myrtle Wright, 1969, Nina Rookaird, 1970 and Betty Worstell, 1971.

Recently two 99 members, instructors at the Sonoma Countty Airport gathered in all their women students, and formed the SANTA ROSA CHAPTER.

Jan. 28, SAN JOAQUIN VALLEY CHAPTER was chartered. A large number of women pilots in this area, with Modesto as its center, formed the Chapter with Billie Wyatt, Chairman, Frances Dias (Gustavson), Vice-Chairman, and Hazel Zimmerman as Secretary-Treasurer.

Members over the years were from all parts of this Valley, and into the eastern

serving as Section Officers, assisting with the AWTAR - Timer Fran Gustavson and Chief Inspector Lou Freeman - and having three members, Helen McGee of Sonora, (2nd place), Laverne Gudgel and Dorothy McAllister placed in the top ten of this famous Race.

May 20th, 1951, HUMBOLDT CHAP-TER was formed by seven women pilots, with a prospect of five more members. Elaine Baldwin was the first Chairman, but Humboldt County is a remote, rugged area, and the Chapter was only listed for two years.


# 1952

Late in October, 1951, the Los Angeles Chapter had grown so large, it was split into three chapters. The LONG BEACH CHAPTER dates it's Charter, Feb. 1, 1952, with nine original members, and has grown to almost 100 members.

Two major projects each year provide funding: the Annual Flight Instructor Revalidation Clinic and the Annual Palmsto-Pines Air Race, Santa Monica to Independence, Oregon.

The Chapter has been the AWTAR terminus twice, 1953 and 1967, and has had the Start four times, 1952, 1954, 1955 and 1960; and been hostess to the 1961 Fall Section Meeting.

Members who were AWTAR winners -Fran Bera (McLin) seven times, Claire Walters, Judy Wagner, Iris Critchell, and Margaret Mead, the last named having won twice. Pacific crossings have been made by Clare Walters, Bettty Faux, Betty Miller and Rosalind Morrifield, all in light hills. Active in air-marking, monthly fly-planes. Susan Oliver soloed the Atlantic,



Member Emma Mcguire, in early 1973, received the FAA's Award as the outstanding Flight Instructor of the Santa Monica District.

An annual Achievement Award is given to encourage upgrading of pilot skills; the Chapter conducts FAA General Aviation Safety Seminars; has a monthly fly-in; flown several tons of DRF supplies; is active in aeroscience education, donating several hundred dollars to a high sschool in this program; and many members are teachers of aviation ground school

The SAN FERNANDO VALLEY CHAPTER's Charter is also dated Feb.1, 1952, with fourteen charter members. This active Chapter has members in and around a valley with a very busy airport - Van Nuys. The 1968 AWTAR Start was from

this airport, and two of the members are past winners of the AWTAR, Lauretta Savory Foy, 1949, and Jean Parker Rose, 1950. Lauretta is also Whirlygirl No. 45, and was the only woman on President Vixon's Advisory Committee on Aviation.

Two members with Instructors Ratings have been teaching Girl Wing Scouts to fly girls in the CAP, and daughters of 99s.

As a result of work with the Junior Chamber of Commerce, a beautiful memorial statue of Amelia Earhart stands in North Hollywood Park - a picture of this statue was used on the local telephone book.

### 1954

July 8, SANTA CLARA VALLEY CHAPER was chartered, sponsored by the Bay Cities Chapter. The first Chairman, Pat Gladney, Vice-Chairman, Jackie Petty and Treasurer Marion Barnick are still active in the Chapter. Marion Barnick is currently Governor of the Southwest Section. Pat Thomas Gladney was the 1st winner of the AEMS in 1941.

SCV Chapter is one of the larger Chapters in California, with 72 members, 30 of which own planes and 8 are flying Clubs. Ratings go from ATR to Glider, and an impressive number of members are professional pilots with many thousands of hours.

Hostess of two Spring Section Meetings, one in Salinas in 1955, and one in San Jose in 1970. Sponsor, with Bay cities chapter, of the Monterey Bay and Golden West Chapters.

To promote general aviation in the community, members flew in formation over a new shopping center and had a display in the Mall; participated in Airport Day at San Jose Municipal and Palo Alto Airport; helped in Airport Beautification at Palo Alto and Reid-Hillview airports; and attended city and county meetings to save the airports in the county.

Fund raising for AWTAR, AEMS, CAEA (education) and NIFA - when the National Intercollegiate Flying Association held its contest in San Jose, the members supplied hours of help, donated cash and flew as Judges; 76 members have entered the AWTAR, 2 the All-Woman International Air Race, and Irene Leverton as pilot, with Marion Barnick, co-pilot, placed tenth in the Great Race from London to Victoria, B.C.; hostessed the Terminus of the P.A.R. in 1972; held a cruise and proficiency race in 1968; held five Safety Seminars; was one of the first Chapters to hold APT Clinic and support this program; members fly Search and Rescue with C.A.P.; support the DRF and Flying Samaritans; active ih Oceanic Society Sea Watch and Conservation Patrol; and have two Fly-ins per month.

Member Desiree Stuart-Alexander, a geologist with a Ph.D. from Stanford, is currently mapping the moon, and studying rocks gathered on the last two moon walks.

Member Herma Hill Kay, California Berkeley Law School Professor, was one of ten women recommended for consideration for an appointment to the

Supreme Court.

99 News Editor Mardo Crane, author of two novels, and Assistant News Editor Betty Hicks, author of "Ground School Workbook" and a WACOA member, are SCV members.

### 1958

April 7. SAN GABRIEL CHAPTER was formed, an off-shoot of San Fernando Valley Chaptter. Dorothy Dancer was the first Chairman, and is still listed in the Roster. Many of the members entered the AWTAR over the years; in 1961 reported 88.1 hrs per member (with no instructors in the Chapter), flights N-S included Alaska to Panama, and E-W across the U.S. and Canada; fund raising was accomplished with Scavenger Hunts; Hostess of the 1962 All Woman Tour from Brackett Field, the Spring Section Meeting in 1963 when they took 2nd place in non-professional flying time; held a Weather Seminar in 1964; and 2 cents per lb. air-lifts in 1965 and 1966. Sponsored Wing Scouts, one of whom became a 99; supported C.A.P., andd AOPA Plantation Parties. Ginny Wegener, the Chairman of the new Santa Rosa Chapter, was instructing at her own school for some time in this area, before her move to northern California, and Norma Wilcox who owns her flying school in Tucson at this time, was a long-time member of the San Gabriel Chapter

### 1960

Oct. 13, SANTA BARBARA CHAPTER was formed, with 13 members. Vice-Governor Geri Hill was present at the January 28, 1961 dinner, together with 3 other Bay Cities Chapter members, to see the Charter presented. Two Charter members, Joan Steinberger and Della Abernathy are still active members, and the total membership is now 22.

The AWTAR had 11 members participate, and Margaret Mead was a Santa Barbara member when she won in 1968 and 1970. In the 1969 AWTAR Joan Steinberger added 20 minutes to her time in the race by staying aloft to help a contestant orient her position and get down safely. For this the other contestants awared Joan the "Good Sportsman Award", and FAA DOT Award for Distinguished Service was presented by FAA Administrator John H. Shaffer. Look for this episode in Random-House's soon to be published "GREAT FLYING EXPERIENCES".

The main activity of the Chapter is DRF, of which Joan is International Chairman, and the Headquarters of DRF are in Santa Barbara. Other activities are 1 cent lb. airlifts; airmarking; held an Air Show, and was hostess to the 1963 Fall Section Meeting at Alisal Ranch, Santa Ynez.

In 1967 the members performed while then-99's Dr. Barbara L. Drinkwater and Maurine Leonard conducted a study entitled "Speed and Accuracy in Decision Responses of Men and Women Pilots",

published in the Department of Physical Education, UC Santa Barbara.

### 1961

Sept. 1, EL CAJON VALLEY CHAPTER was Chartered, with 11 members being transferred from the San Diego Chapter. Original officers were Dottie Sanders, Chairman, Isabelle McCrae (Hale). Vice-Chairman, Boo Christensen, Secretary and Doris Ritchey, Treasurer. All are still active members of the Chapter.

Activities include the Start of the 1965 PPD, and assists with others; Co-Chairmanships with San Diego Chapter on the P.A. Races; originating the first Mechanic Seminar on the west coast in conjunction with FAA; participating in the FAA Accident Prevention program, which tapped two members as counsellors; as members of the El Cajon Valley Chamber of Commerce Aviation Committee, aid is given 2cents lb. airlifts and aircades; support of AWTAR, AEMS, DRF, Flying Samaritans, Coast Guard Auxiliary, C.A.P., Sheriff Aero Squadron; aid to AOPA Pilot Clinics, NPA; and sat in on the San Diego County Trophy two consecutive

The Chapter sponsored five 99s from India with memberships; members have been officers at Section level, and held International Chairmanships; mementos have been donated to the San Diego Aerospace Museum; and numerous trophys won by various racers are displayed in the Administration Building, Gillespie Field.

### 1962

June 15, 1962 was the Charter date of the ORANGE COUNTY CHAPTER, though the first meedting was held on May 24th, and the Charter presented on September 14th, by Governor Geri Hill, who installed the officers. Fifteen women composed the initial membership, with 69 listed in the current Roster.

Two worthy causes are supported yearly: flying donated supplies for La Liga (an organization formed by doctors at White Memorial Hospital) into remote areas of Mexico; and ferrying supplies for the DBF

Two Section Meetings were held by the Chapter, and a very high percentage of members are represented at other Section Meetings; a Chapter member has been on the County Airport Advisory Council; held 1 cent lb. airlifts (most memorable was one put on at the request of the county in conjunction with Orange County Airport Dedication Day); are active in aero education, Girl Scouting - to enable them to earn the Aviation Badge, and hopefully become pilots and 99s; supply speakers for service clubs and civic organizations; stress pilot awareness, APT rides and upgrading to advanced ratings; and support the AWTAR and AEMS.

Member Mara Culp, winner of the 1969 AWTAR, is Lear Jet rated, and flies full time throught North and South America and Europe.

# Edna Gardner Whyte

EDNA GARDNER WHYTE by Auleen K. Hall

Edna Gardner Whyte, past International President (1955-1957) started her flying career and contributions to aviation long before her tenure of office. Twenty years later, at the age of 72, she is still extremely active.

Orphaned early in life, she lived with and aunt and uncle. She graduated from nursing school as a Registered Nurse in 1924. While on duty as an RN, she had a young Naval flier in her ward. After conversing with the young man, she became intensely interested in flying, started flying in 1926 and made her first solo in 1927 at Renton Field in the State of Washington.

Edna received her Commission in the U.S. Navy Nurse Corps in 1929 and served through 1935. Since 1930 Edna has trained approximately 3800 students (from 11 to 66). Because of the need in their work, she has had 3 missionaries, living in her home. while she taught them to fly. She owned and operated the New Orleans Air College at Shusham Airport from 1935-1941. She has instructed USAF and USN pilots at Meacham Field, Fort Worth. After her retirement from military service, she and her husband were fixed-base operators in Fort Worth, Tx., Aberdeen, Miss., and Flushing, Mich. She was the first woman to receive the Department of Commerce Instructor Rating in Washington, D.C. the week they were issued. Today her license

is endorsed for SMEL, SMES, Rotorcraft and Glider, plus CFI, CFII, and Ground Instructor Link Trainer.

Edna now owns and operates her airport, Aero Valley Estates Airport, in Roanoke, Texas. After 48 years of selling and promoting aviation, and an accumulation of 21,480 hours, she has no thought of retiring. She flies three to seven hours a day. She recently said, "I love every minute of it and take pride and pleasure in every student. I have given over 200 BFRs for the FAA. I want to be sure they are very safe when I sign them off."

She has always had a keen interest in competitive flying, skywriting, and aerobatics and has won 117 trophies. Her first trophy was captured in a 1927 Little OX5 Race. Edna has been racing 46 years (she entered 2 air races in 1974). She has flown the Powder Puff Derby 6 times and the International Angel Derby 22 times (and won 4 times). In addition to her racing and instructing, for 13 years, she was a "flying saleswoman" for an aircraft cylinders company.

In the mid 30s, Edna was one of three women fliers to gain recognition in "American Women" and "Who's Who Reference Book of Outstanding Women in America" - the other two were Amelia Earhart and Helen Richey. In 1967 she won Woman of the Year - Women's National Aeronautic Assn.; Woman Pilot Contributing Most to Aviation - OX5 Club of America and Best Sportsmanship Pylon Racing - Cleveland National Air Races. On October 12, 1974, Edna was selected as a member of OX5 Aviation Pioneer Hall of Fame by the OX5 Club of America.

Edna willingly and enthusiastically gives her time and talents speaking in various clubs and organizations, encouraging interest in women's participation in aviation. Asked her hobbies, she replies, "teaching people to fly safe and well, nursing people and animals back to good health, and helping people obtain pilot licenses who cannot afford to fly."

KOOTENAI- (Koot nee): Coeur D' Alene

is the county seat of Kootenai country. The Kootenai Indians were two small tribes in the area, proficient in use of bark canoes and dugouts.

PEND OREILLE LAKE — (Pond er ray): The name comes from an Indian tribe called Pend Oreilles by early French trappers. These Indians wore pendant ornaments as earings.

MOSCOW— (Moss co): It's a faux pas to say it like the one in Russia. Moscow has several distinctions...Appaloosa horse registry center, field pea capitol of the nation, and home of the University of Idaho.

BOISE: You can sometimes tell a native from one who is new by the way one pronounces our state capitol. We usually say Boy-see rather than Boy-zee.

SPOKANE— (Spo can): Just across the border into Washington, Spokane is our nearby "big" city (200,000 population).

Spokane hosted Expo '74 this summer and those of you who come to Roundup '75 by airlines will get a good view of Spokane as you come in to Spokane International Airport.

For you trivia experts...While you hear a lot about Idaho potatoes, we're nicknamed the "Gem" state; our state flower is Syringa; the mountain bluebird is our state bird. Nitty-gritty details? We have no poison snakes or poison ivy in Northern Idaho!

Don't worry if you call us the Potato State and say Pend Oreille the way it looks. We'll welcome you with open arms and a special kind of friendliness. The name Idaho probably comes from a Shoshoni Indian expression, "Ee-Dahhow," which means sun coming down from mountain tops. # HOTLINE U.S. REPORT

The General Assembly of the United Nations, by their resolution 3010, proclaimed 1975 International Women's Year calling for its celebration by intensified action to meet the needs, develop the capabilities, and utilize the skills of women.

The President of the United States has issued a proclamation calling upon Congress, federal officials, state and local government, religious and educational institutions, and all other groups to honor women for their outstanding contribution to the economic, social, political and cultural life of our country.

We have an opportunity to join in this national and international project which would be a great way for the 99s to really get on the map if every member and every chapter will become involved in their community. I share with you the fact sheet prepared by Fay Gillis Wells on the 99s participation in IWY.

# INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S YEAR 1975 FROM A to Z

WHO: The international organization of women pilots, the Ninety-Nines, Inc. and the international organization of executive women, Zonta International. WHAT: Will launch their joint participation

in International Women's Year, 1975. WHEN: January 11, 1975. (In a letter to all IWYers, the Director of the United States Center for International Women's Year, Ruth Bacon, wrote: "We would like the YEAR to begin with a real salute and to that end, we have selected January 11—the day Amelia Earhart left Hawaii on her record-breaking flight to San Francisco. This seems fitting for both her deed and her name represent courage, vision, perserverance, and many other qualities which IWY exemplifies, as well as dedication to achievement in a nonconventional occupation.)

WHERE: In a series of national and territorial celebrations honoring women in aviation and the aeronautical and aerospace sciences. (The celebration in Washington will be held at the Washington Hilton Hotel.)

WHY: To cooperate in a year-long salute to International Women's Year, 1975, as outlined by the United States Center for IWY in its alphabetical calendar. Each month a different facet of women's activities will be highlighted, beginning in January with women in aviation and the aeronautical and aerospace sciences; February, women in business; March, women in communications; etc. (The United Nations

already has proclaimed a tribute to women in all the Arts in September). In 1938, Zonta International proclaimed January Amelia Earhart month for its members, and January 11, as AE Day. For over thirty-five years the Zontians and the Ninety-Nines have joined to salute the winners of their Amelia Earhart Scholarships, in memory of the noted woman flyer who was a member of both clubs.

HOW: By joining in meetings, displays and celebrations to highlight all facets of women's contributions to world aviation and the aeronautical and aerospace sciences. Especially by a series of inter-related events on Launch Day, January 11, 1975—the 40th anniversary date of Amelia Earhart's record-breaking solo flight from Honolulu to San Francisco, the first flight linking Hawaii to the Mainland and to our Nation's capital, Washington—for official recognition of International Women's Year.

What we want to emphasize is the continuity of women in aviation and their constructive contributions to the industry. Purdue University is an example. Amelia Earhart set up the women's aviation program there with a special workshop labeled "Tinkering for Girls Only", so they could learn mechanics. One of this year's Zontian AE Fellowship winners is a 1973 graduate of Purdue where she got her BS degree in Aeronautical engineering and will use her scholarship to get her masters in the special problems of mission planning space vehicles, autopilots for landings and ultimately, complete automated flight.

AE opened up the Pacific on her flight from Honolulu to the Mainland; then Betty Miller conquered the whole ocean when she made her record-breaking solo flight to Australia. Nancy Bird's ambulance service in Australia and Jerrie Cobb's mercy flights in the Amazon Basin. The stories are endless; but we must start thinking fast, for the time is short.

# DONNA TRACY MYERS By Mary Neil Colorado Chapter Reporter

On November 9, 1974, Donna Tracy Myers, past president of the Ninety-Nines was inducted into the Colorado Aviation Hall of Fame by the Colorado Aviation Historical Society. The annual banquet was held in Denver's Brown Palace Hotel ballroom which was filled with hundreds of those interested in Colorado Aviation from both yesterday and today.

Donna was honored as Colorado's first licensed woman pilot. She started her pilot training in 1935 and received her private license in 1937 while working as secretary to Ray Wilson. He ran a flying school at that time which later developed into Monarch Aviation and still later became Frontier Airlines. As Ray's secretary, Donna would trade work time for flying time in an old Curtiss Fledgeling. In 1939 she married John Myers who was then a Forest Service photographer and later became one of Monarch's first pilots. He retired recently after 28 years with Monarch and Frontier where he served in many capacities including Director of Flight Operations.

Donna has been very active in many areas of aviation in Colorado including serving on the Board of Directors of Monarch Aviation and Frontier Airlines until her resignation in 1951; founding the

Colorado Chapter of the Ninety-Nines in 1941 and serving as national secretary of the Colorado Aviation Historical Society and playing an active role in the establishment of their museum. This museum has already designated a corner which will be devoted exclusively to Women in Aviation.

# NINETY-NINE MUSEUM REPORT

The International Women's Air and Space Museum of the Ninety-Nines-Who is it?-Where is it? It is you and me, and every pilot who is interested and involved in collecting and preserving aviation memorabilia, pertaining to women in aviation. To date, the Museum building is a dream for the future, but the location is a reality. That is Dayton, Ohio-home of the Wright Brothers, the Air Force Museum and the National Aviation Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame is responsible for the idea of a Museum complex, of which one day, the Ninety-Nines' Museum Trust with a humidity controlled room in the Terminal Building at Cox Municipal Airport. Doris Scott, Ninety-Nine, and member of Dayton's Aviation Council, is having shelving installed in the room to house the material that has been collected.

Former International Secretary, Joan Hrubec, has been appointed ARCHIVIST, with Genevieve Wiskman, an Archivist from Michigan to assist her. Since this is a very technical job, Joan plans to attend a school which has courses in this type of work.

Curator, Page Shamburger, continues to receive artifacts for the Museum, Nancy Bird Walton, of Australia, has sent her movies of early flyers and other memorabilia. Jacqueline Scott. newly elected Museum Trustee from Washington, D.C., is collecting news reels of women in aviation. Charter member, Viola Gentry, like Ruth Nichols, saved much of her early flying momentos and has given the Museum many clippings, autographed pictures and her early licenses. Betty Miller, from Hawaii, has donated her complete uniform, worn as a member of the United States Women's Helicopter Team, at the first World Helicopter Championship competition last year in England. It's all red, white and blue with our American flag insignia.

Museum Trust's Treasurer, Grace Harris, gave a comprehensive Treasurer's report at the 1974 International Convention. She also stated that the members who have pledged to the Museum continue their yearly payments. This financial and moral support is greatly appreciated. Remember, all contributions are tax exempt under the Museum Trust 501 C-3 number.

For each Section and Chapter Museum Chairman, please let's start a program of AWARENESS. For instance, if you have a Charter Member, or an early Ninety-Nine member, make her aware that there will be

a home for her aviation memorabilia. Impress upon each member to donate what they have now, or put it in their Will but don't let this aviation heritage be lost. Talk to her on a tape recorder. Ask about her early flying, the planes she flew, records broken (or struts), other women pilots she flew with, her memories of the Ninety-Nines, when and how she joined. Ninety-Nine Past Presidents should be taped, their activities and memories, as our Presidents, recorded. These tapes should be sent to Curator, Page Shamburger, in Aberdeen, North Carolina.

For each chapter member, make her AWARE that the Museum Trust has requested her complete aviation biography—as detailed as she wishes. You, as Chapter Museum Chairman, should collect these, keep a copy for your Chapter's History files, and send the original to Charter Member, Blanche Noyes in Washington, D.C. She is compiling an Aviation Biographical Notebook.

Whatever we do, time is running out—we must all campaign for the preservation of early aviation material and as Museum Trust's Chairman, Bernice Steadman said in her annual report, "As you get interested in our history, you will gain enthusiasm for the preservation of our heritage and the Museum project will continue to blossom".
