Friday is the day to see Victoria, B.C.'s capital city and noted for its "Olde English Charm" For this optional tour we have



VANCOUVER AT-A-GLANCE

SEEING THE CITY:

Grouse Mountain, rising 3.974 feet in North Vancouver, commands a spectacular view of the city and the surrounding coastal area. You can reach the top of the mountain and enjoy panoramic views along the way on the Grouse Mountain Skyride, an aerial tramway that runs from the parking lot to the summit. Open daily. Admission charge. At the top of Capilano Rd. in North Vancouver (986-6262)

Some 500 feet above the harbor, the Harbour Centre Observation Deck opens up a panoramic view of waterfront activities. You can spend an hour or two watching the ships go by -oceangoing cruise ships, freighters, sailboats, yachts, seaplanes, and even rowing teams in training. Powerful telescopes are on hand for a closer look; staff

members answer questions and point out special sights. Cocktails and snacks are available in the SkyNook Lounge. After you've seen the city, take a half hour to view Vancouver, a marvelous panoramic film shown on a huge screen by a number of computer-directed projectors that produce stunning effects. Open daily. Small admission charge 555 W Hastings St. (689-7304).

And as if to emphasize what a beautiful town this really is, the drive from the airport along tree-lined Cambie Street, with the North Shore mountains in the background, is a perfect joy.

SPECIAL PLACES:

Walking is the best way to get a feel for certain downtown sections. including Gastown, Chinatown, and Stanley Park.

DOWNTOWN

Chinatown — The second largest Chinese quarter in North America (only San Francisco's is larger or more energetic) encompasses a fair-sized piece of downtown. This area has been the nucleus of the Chinese community for almost a century, first as a self-imposed ghetto in which the Chinese protected themselves from discrimination and physical abuse, today as a vibrant commercial community. Restaurants offer authentic Cantonese, Mandarin, and Shanghai cooking as well as Chinese-Canadian, which is virtually indistinguishable from Chinese-American. The stores range from large import emporiums to holes in the wall, with Mah-Jongg sets, jade and ivory carvings, dried lychee nuts, and dozens of items you never thought you wanted until you saw them.

There are also jade figurines of Kuan Yin, the goddess of mercy, or soapstone Foo dogs to guard your temple.

Stanley Park ---

Surrounded by the sea on three sides, this city park is one of the most beautiful in the world. The 1,000 acres are bespeckled with tall evergreens, gardens, lakes, lagoons, 50 miles of trails, tennis courts, a miniature golf course. bowling greens, restaurants, coffee shops, snack bars, a zoo, and the Vancouver Aquarium (see below). Residents use the park for hiking, jogging, biking, concerts, picnicking, and simple relaxing. The Seawall flanks the water for 7 miles and makes a lovely walk. Open daily. Free. At the foot of W. Georgia St.

Vancouver Aquarium

- With 9,000 marine inhabitants, this is Canada's largest and best aguarium. The highlights of the collection are the Beluga whales, killer whales, a dolphin, and the gallery of tropical fish. The British Columbia Hall of Fish displays local sealife. There are killer whale and dolphin shows. The gift shop carries a good selection of local crafts. Open daily. Admission charge. In Stanley Park (682-1118)

As a member of the 99s, International Women Pilots, I feel all members should attend at least one convention. At the convention the annual international business is held.
