INTERNATIONAL ELECTION POLICY FOR CANDIDATES

YOU MAY:

1. Place one advertisement in THE 99 NEWS. Guidelines are available from the Nominating Committee.

2. Send, or cause to have sent, one mailing (letter, photograph or flyer) to all or part of the membership at your own expense. It may be made with other

candidates if you wish.

3. Make a two minute speech at the pre-business meeting communication session held at the time of the International Convention, as duly notified by the Chairman of the International Nominating Committee.

YOU MAY NOT DO THE FOLLOWING:

1. Hand out, or cause to be handed out, campaign flyers anywhere.

2. Hand out, or cause to be handed out, campaign souvenirs anywhere.

3. Place, or cause to be placed, campaign posters anywhere.

4. Continue to run any commercial advertisements in THE 99 NEWS during the campaign period. The period extends from close of intent to seek election deadline to election ballot deadline.

It is the intent of this policy to minimize

campaign expenses and unprofessional conduct, and to ensure fairness to all candidates.

The election results for a candidate not complying with this policy may be considered void.

Many candidates will be attending Section meetings and other Section and chapter functions. I urge you to make an effort to get to know the candidates, their qualifications and backgrounds.

Running for international office is not an easy thing to do. A candidate places herself and reputation under the scrutiny of the members and must be strong enough to either do the job or to accept defeat. They place themselves at great personal risk and should be treated with the utmost respect.

SEATTLE, WA - Two 99s were aboard Friendship One as it circled the globe in an absolute world record-setting time of 36 hours, 54 minutes, and 15 seconds. The United Airlines Boeing 747SP left Boeing Field January 28, with Margaret Mead and Fran Bera to help claim victory for the world's highest cocktail party.

The flight was made for a worthy cause though, raising \$500,000 for children's charities worldwide. Each passenger paid \$5000 for the privilege of being aboard. That money was then donated to the charities. United Airlines donated the aircraft, while ground and flight crews donated their time and expertise.

Fran Bera is a record-setter herself. She stil holds the all-time record of seven Powder Puff Derby wins and the world altitude for Class C-1-d. She has flown the Great Race from London to Victoria, B.C, Canada, the Reno Air Races and many, many others.

Margaret Mead is also a racer. She won the Powder Puff Derby twice, and has participated in the Great Race as well as others. In addition to those credits, Margaret is the top salesperson for Learjet.

TAX TIME: reminders on 99s deductions

It is once again tax season, everyone's favorite time of year, and so it is appropriate to mention some general guidelines on charitable deductions, for which your contributions to The Ninety -Nines, Inc. are qualified.

For the information of your accountants, the organization within the United States is a tax - exempt charitable organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Rvevenue Code. Both the international corporation, and each of the Sections except New England are listed individually in the so - called "blue book" published by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), which lists all exempt organizations.

All contributions made, therefore, to international, section or your chapter (except as noted above) are deductible as charitable contributions. They are not required to be itemized, but are simply listed along with other charitable contributions. Those donations include the following: dues (at allevels); assessments; contributions to special 99s projects such as the 99s Scholarship Fund, Forest of Friendship, National Intercollegiate Flying Assn. (NIFA), and others; out - of - pocket expenses for attending business meetings of your chapter, and for delegates attending conventions, including Section meetings, (registration, transportation, meals), etc.

When deducting the cost of attending meetings and conventions, those costs must be reasonable. One could not expect, for example, to deduct the cost of \$50 for a dinner. As with any other contributions, it is important you keep receipts for claimed deductions. Also, under the 1987 Tax Reform Act, only those who itemize deductions can claim these charitable contributions.

In addition, the IRS is beginning to take an ever - closer look at those attending conventions, to determine if they are bonafide delegates attending to the organization's business, or merely members taking advantage of a change for a nice vacation. As a result, it is becoming increasingly important that you document your organizational activities at conventions in your chapter minutes. For example, if you are one of several delegates from your chapter to international convention, each delegate should be specifically designated in your minutes to attend and report back on certain educational and safety programs at 4 convention, as well as the general

business meeting and pre - business meeting.

Since the general schedule is published well in advance of convention, and there are usually conflicts in the programs being presented so that a single person could not possibly attend everything, designating certain delegates to attend certain programs should not be too hard to do. Section meetings, since they are shorter, are not likely to be such a target, but to the extent that there are special programs and seminars, chapters should make an

effort to specifically designate delegates to attend those also.

If you have specific questions related to your chapter's handling of these tax related matters, please write to me at my office address listed in the membership directory. Please note, however, that I have not discussed business - related deductions, which apply to those members who are in an aviation - related business; that is a totally different area which should be discussed with your accountant.

Mystery, sadness surround death of Ruhnke; cause still unknown

WASHINGTON. DC - Investigation continues surrounding the death of well known 99 member and Washington - area flight instructor Gerda Irene Ruhnke, 48. She was killed while giving a first lesson to a 30 year old male, a gunstore owner under FBI investigation at the time.

The mishap occurred November 7, a clear day, at 11:30 am. Killed with Gerda was Rene Carlos Vos of Arlington, Virginia.

Vos was granted immunity last year to testify before a federal grand jury investigating possible illegalities in an arms sale.

NTSB investigators reported that circumstances behind the crash are unusual. Ruhnke was a well known and highly qualified flight instructor with many hours in the particular trainer.

According to a story in the January 8, 1988 Washington Post, the Cessna 152 the pair flew appears to have flown into the ground at high speed -- in fact developing power -- and apparently under full control, when it smashed into the driveway of a house near Dulles Airport. NTSB representatives report finding no signs of mechanical or structural failure.

The story said investigators have determined the airplane was not in a spin when it crashed. They also said the plane

was travelling at higher speed than expected in a stall - spin accident.

Investigators have looked without success for possibilities of sabotage. Autopsies of Vos and Ruhnke were incomplete because their bodies were badly burned.

Federal investigators, according to the



Tony published the *Cross Country News* over 35 years. She started her aviation career in 1940 when George Haddaway hired her at *Flight Magazine*, of which he was publisher. "In less than a year she was sending in original news right out of aviation's grass roots."

Tony was licensed in 1941 and served as aviation editor of *The Valley Times* in North Hollywood, California. She later returned to Texas to a staff post at *Cross Country News*, buying the publication in 1952. Tony developed a unique publication, with "blackout" cartoons and double - entendre captions, limericks scattered throughout.

In 1963, with 17 hours of instruction, Tony earned a helicopter rating, becoming only the 67th woman in the free world to be helicopter qualified. She was the fourth in Fort Worth.

Tony is survived by a brother, Mike Edgett of Penn Valley, California.

MARGARET VAN CLEVE STANDISH

story, say a murder - suicide by Vos is the most plausible theory.

Gerda was co-owner of Dulles Air Service, Inc., her own flight school. In its two years, eight months of operation she had accumulated nearly 1,000 instruction hours, had nine students earn licenses, and two ready for checkrides. She often spent as much as 60 hours a month instructing.

Gerda's total flight hours exceeded 2,600 and included flights to Alaska, the Bahamas, Mexico, Vancouver and all parts of the United States.

Born in Uruguay October 4, 1939, Gerda earned a pilot's license in that country in 1958, barely 19 years old. After marrying Lothar Ruhnke, she moved to the United States and became a citizen. Her family, which grew to include a son and daughter, lived in several areas of the country, finally moving to the Washington, DC area in 1976. In March, 1977 Gerda began flying lessons to earn a domestic license. She received her private on January 12, 1978, and subsequently her instrument, commercial and instructor ratings.

In her memory, the Washington, DC chapter has established the Gerda Ruhnke Flight Instructor Memorial Scholarship. It will be awarded at the 99s International Convention each summer to a female pilot desirous of this rewarding and essential occupation. A \$15,000 fund is being collected to permanently finance the award.





FORT WORTH, TX— The National Transportation Safety Board is searching for a Transportation Safety Specialist for its Fort Worth office.
