- Diane Earhart, Greater St. Louis Chapter



She is now one of fewer than 400 17-year-old pilots in the United States, (not all of whom earned their certificate on their birthday). Mia proudly holds her Temporary Airmen Certificate almost exactly as her flight instructor, Diane Earhart (bottom photo), held her own Temporary Airmen Certificate on her own 17th birthday, February 24, 1974. Diane quipped, "The Temporary Airmen Certificate looks exactly the same as it did nearly 50 years ago except mine was written on a typewriter with carbon copies, and Mia's was computer generated!"





Following her successful check ride, Diane wore an embroidered, appliqued skirt and top outfit she made herself. For her check ride, Mia wore a Rosie the Riveter t-shirt that she also wore on her first solo flight less than six months before. "This shirt belonged to my grandma, so this is a way to include her," noted Mia. Diane pointed out the obvious, "You will have to wear that good luck t-shirt from now on for every check ride for the rest of your life!"

The pair plans on doing some animal rescue flights to start building Mia's cross-country requirement for her Instrument Rating.

# **Mentors and Motivators**

s we move along our career paths, we are confronted by challenges and obstacles that threaten our greatest dreams. It's easy to get so discouraged that we begin looking for the path of least resistance, and even settle for something less than what we truly want.

When this happens to me, I stop and look around at the people who are where I want to be. I don't have to know them to be inspired by their stories. How did they overcome the obstacles in their way to achieve their dreams? My friend Kerri reminded me that to a young Girl Scout, a 17-year-old working on her Private Pilot Certificate is much cooler and more inspiring than a retired airline Captain. The 17-year-old is more relatable, reachable and is still navigating her way to her goals.

I look at The 99s Professional Pilot Leadership Initiative (PPLI) program and marvel at its structure to systematically get pilots on their career path with focused guidance. A formal mentorship is formed and you have the guidance you need to stay on track to achieve your goals. You also mentor someone coming up behind you. In addition to formal mentorship programs, we all have informal mentors who guide us on our journeys. Sometimes, they have insight to help us make informed choices. Military or civilian? A regional or a national airline? This major airline or that one? Corporate or private? Floatplane or Tailwheel endorsement?

And then there are motivators that give us that kick in the pants we need to keep on going. They don't even have to be pilots to hold us accountable. They'll ask things like, "Have you scheduled your written exam yet?" or, "When are you flying next?"

Oftentimes, I watch running videos and can truly be inspired by the discipline it takes to excel in the sport. How can I use that inspiration in my aviation career? I can certainly transfer the discipline aspect to my study habits, and the commitment it takes to do well. The athletes manage their food intake and sleep schedules to maximize their efficiency. That certainly applies to flying. I know that I feel much better when I do the same, and my performance as a pilot is better.

I challenge you to write down the names of five people who are mentors and motivators to you. Have you touched base with them? It certainly doesn't have to be in person. Signing up for online presentations can be inspiring and motivating if you are unable to attend in person. One of my favorite presentations is Social Flight Live with Jeff Simon on Tuesday evenings. It started during COVID when no one was out flying but became so popular that it continues today. The guests are accomplished pilots and builders and I'm inspired by their stories.

We don't have to look very far to see amazing women pilots that surround us. Our own chapters are filled with women making their dreams come true. Look for mentors and motivators, and know that, whether you realize it or not, you are probably one too.

# How do I know what's required for my qualifications if I'm adding a rating to an existing pilot certificate?

# Do I still have to cover everything in the Airmen Certification Standards (ACS)?

Most pilots that are planning to fly for a career will at some point add a category or class rating to an existing certificate. The great thing is you don't have to cover everything in the Airmen Certification Standards (ACS) and often you can get credit for existing time and qualifications. This information can be found under Title 14 in the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 61.63 and in the ACS.

The first important question to ask is: Are you adding a category or a class to your certificate? In CFR Title 14 Part 61.50(b) it defines the difference. A few examples of an aircraft category are airplane, rotorcraft, or glider. In contrast, a couple examples of a class of airplane would be single-engine land or multi-engine land. Once you determine if you are adding a category or a class to your certificate then we refer to CFR Title 14 Part 61.63.

CFR Title 14 Part 61.63 gives us the regulations on adding aircraft ratings and what's required. For example, if an applicant holds a Commercial Pilot Certificate with an Airplane Single-engine Land Rating and wanted to add an Airplane Multi-engine Land Rating, it would be a class change. Therefore, the applicant would need to have a logbook endorsement or training record that meets the aeronautical knowledge areas and proficiently pass the test. There is no minimum specified training time required and no need to take any additional knowledge tests. Often applicants will have flown between 8-15 hours and then take the practical test. The endorsements are also complicated for added categories so ask a DPE if you or your CFI are unsure.

In comparison, if an applicant holds a Commercial Pilot Certificate with a Rotorcraft Rating (often military helicopter pilots transitioning to civilian) and decide they want to go fly for the airlines, they will need to add Airplane to their Commercial Pilot Certificate. This is a category change. Again, looking at CFR Title 14 Part 61.63, the applicant would have to meet all the aeronautical experience requirements, have a logbook or training record on the aeronautical knowledge areas from an authorized instructor, and be proficient. They wouldn't need to take an aeronautical knowledge test. The applicant will get credit for some of their rotorcraft flight time; however, they would have to look at CFR Title 14 Part 61.129 and determine what they will get credit for. At a minimum, an applicant will need 50 hours in airplanes. I would recommend consulting a flight instructor and doing a logbook audit to determine your eligibility.

For the practical test, the back of the ACS has tables that the examiner will use to determine the minimum required areas. The top of the page lists what is being added to the certificate. In the table itself, you find your rating that is held and then it will list the required areas of operation. It's important to note that your examiner could evaluate you on other areas in the ACS even though it's not in the table. It's always advantageous to be prepared.

Whether adding category or class, make sure to investigate the requirements before you get started. Sometimes it can be complicated, so make sure to do your homework. If in doubt, ask an examiner or a CFI for help! Good luck to everyone getting close to their practical tests! If you have any questions email me at askadpe99@gmail.com

## INTERNATIONAL ELECTION PROCEDURES

Voting will commence on March 15, 2024, at 00:00 GMT and end on May 1, 2024, at 00:00 GMT.

- The official ballot will be delivered in one of two forms: electronic or paper. If you chose electronic voting, you will receive an electronic official ballot at the email address on file with The Ninety-Nines. If you did not opt in for electronic voting, you will receive an official paper ballot at the mailing address on file with The Ninety-Nines.
- PLEASE READ THE BALLOT CLOSELY AS SOME SECTIONS MAY BE RUNNING THEIR SECTION ELECTIONS AT THE SAME TIME.
- Delivery of paper ballots to your address may take several
  weeks depending on your location. If you do not receive a
  ballot (either via email or via regular mail) please contact
  Laura Ohrenberg at HQ: hqmanager@ninety-nines.org.
  Paper ballots must be mailed back and postmarked no later
  than May 1, 2024.
- The slate of candidates is prepared by the Nominating Committee in accordance with the Bylaws and Standing Rules. Candidates for each position are listed in the order received by the Nominating Committee per the Standing Rules requirement.

- You may vote for up to the maximum number of candidates for each position by: choosing from the nominated candidates, writing in the name of a candidate, or by indicating that you are abstaining from voting for any position. Ballot instructions will also clarify the criteria for spoiled ballots.
- Ballots are prepared in accordance with industry standard procedures for secret ballots and are distributed using current membership records maintained by The Ninety-Nines. No unique voting numbers list is kept.
- All ballots (both electronic and paper) are retained until after the next Annual Meeting.

# She's Been Made for Something Really Special In Fact, Many Things!

ne of the things I watch for is ripples and patterns on the water to know where the wind is coming from and how to set up my approach," said bush pilot Liz Davidson as we neared Igiugig located on the south bank of the mouth of the Kvichak River and Lake Iliamna in remote southwestern Alaska. Although very familiar with the small gravel strip that services this native village with a population of approximately 70 (that consists mainly of Yup'ik Eskimos, Dena'ina, Aleuts, and Athabascan Indians) Liz was carefully scanning the water, trees, and the sky to make a safe and predictable landing in the wilds of The Last Frontier.

The Beechcraft Bonanza rolled to a stop and Liz off-loaded her passenger and a cache of eagerly awaited goods and gear to a small contingent of locals that she knows as friends (as she is their taxi in the wilderness). I was thrilled when we unburdened the rear seat area of the table saw, pizzas, baby diapers, and some of the other cargo that was strapped in the back of N777AK. I must admit as a pilot who has flown less than 300 hours and took my check ride having to do a weight and balance to accommodate my DPE's small cooler that was perched in the rear seat (filled with ice and a small portable fan on a hot Texas day), I was thrilled when we shed the table saw! When the trailer pulled by a fourwheeler pulled up planeside at Lake Clark Air in Port Alsworth, Alaska, before our flight, my heart clenched when I saw the amount of gear that would soon be swallowed up inside the Beech A36. As Liz signed off, I stopped myself from asking her about the aircraft's serviceable load - after all, this 36-year-old experienced pilot with more than 5,000 hours knew what she was doing and I was here to learn.

It was the second of six stops that Liz and I would make during the day that we spent together flying 260 nautical miles for Lake Clark Air. For Liz, it was just another day on the job; for me, it was pure joy to fly with one of my heroes - Alaska Chapter member I've followed for the past few years on Facebook and have watched as her life has unfolded as an aviator, wife, mother, and author (and who is also in the middle of building a home in Port Alsworth that is situated in Lake Clark National Park, one of the most remote parks in the country). Liz's stunning photos and occasional tales of life in "The Big Wild" compelled me to visit her and learn more about her story - and so, I did.

Liz grew up in the Pacific Northwest, in Oregon. What first lit her fire to become a pilot was traveling by airplane to visit family in Illinois. "When I was little, I got to sit in the cockpit a number of times and my favorite part of visiting family was the airplane ride and being in an airport," she remembers. "That was my main fun!" At the time, Liz didn't know that anyone in her family was in the aviation business, but later found out that her grandfather and his brother both flew airplanes.

"As a teenager, I realized I had to give up my childhood dreams about becoming a dolphin trainer," she explained with a laugh, "but I thought a lot about my family trips, airports, and travel and thought that being a pilot could be a really fun thing. When I was 11, I started mission trips, and when I was 15 I had been thinking of a career as a pilot and that's when the idea of mission work and aviation came together. As I spent time with mission organizations and did some trips, I started looking at mission and aviation work more seriously. I then met a pilot who became a fabulous mentor and talked about how to do both. After high school, I went to Letourneau University, in east Texas, and realized I didn't like heat and humidity or big bugs, although I spent a semester in Kenya and loved it there. I realized I needed to go farther north and west to escape the heat, so one summer before graduating from college, I traveled to Port Alsworth for a weekend with an alumnus who lived there." Little did she know then that it would become her home!

Liz earned her Private Pilot Certificate during her first year in college and her Instrument and Commercial Ratings and Airframe and Powerplant (A&P) certification followed. "After college, I went back to Port Alsworth and worked for Lake Clark Air on the ramp loading bags and checking in passengers for one summer and then got into the hangar for five years and I got my IA during that time."

Liz met her husband, Eric, when she was working full time in the hangar and he was working as a cook for Samaritan's Purse (that has an outpost in Port Alsworth) after his education in culinary school. "He then decided to work for the winter doing construction projects, then went to New Jersey to work for a humanitarian disaster team and came back — and the rest is history. We were married in 2014 and I bought a Cessna 205 to build hours toward Part 135 minimums. Eric decided to get an A&P certificate and we worked together in the hangar; but when I became pregnant with Theo, I decided to move to the flight line because of chemicals in the hangar. At that point, I'd been at the company for six years and started flying a Cessna 207 before getting into Bonanzas and a Navajo."

I asked Liz, "What's it like to be a bush pilot in the wild?" She responded, "Some days it's beautiful and some days it's not. It doesn't matter in general if there's weather, because of my familiarity with the terrain and weather patterns. We maintain legal minimums; however, that leaves a lot of flyable days that aren't beautiful. As for being a female bush pilot, most of my passengers are comfortable with me and most passengers say I make it look easy. So much is ingrained in me to be instinctual because of my mechanical experience. How do I do it all? Well, I don't do it all at the same time. I've been flying since 2006, so 18 years. As for sexism in general, I realize it's not a reflection of me but of the person, and if a guest/passenger might be difficult, I try to find common ground. I'll share some things about me and also let people know that the owner of the lodge on Port Alsworth is fully confident with putting his children in an airplane with me. Sometimes I even have riders that have their own airplanes but aren't comfortable flying for particular reasons, such as weather, and they fly with me. I did have one time when a comment was made by a couple of customers saying it was a woman flying the airplane. I just simply said 'I operate the airplane with my hands and feet' and often use humor to command respect."

"My flight area is typically from Anchorage down the Alaskan peninsula to the first island of the Aleutian chain and shuttling people from villages to Port Alsworth and back and forth from Anchorage in the summer, carrying loads and meeting needs. It's not unusual to fly to seven locations a day, but I have also flown up to 21 and landed on gravel strips as well as paved runways. People are the best part of the work, especially the regulars from the native villages and even some of the lodge guests. I love to show and point out the beautiful places and take my friends' kids to different sports events from the island. At Lake Clark, on Port Alsworth, there are four regular line pilots, while there are more at the Anchorage base. I'm the only female."

"The best and the worst?," I asked Liz. "Best is the passengers and the people I get to see as well as the beauty. It's so amazing that I get to do this and the bottom line is, I'm paid too much – yet some days when there are crosswinds and turbulence, I think I'm not paid enough! The hardest part is rough air and turbulence and strong winds and trying to hold airspeed when the airplane is shaking violently."

Rounding out the picture of flying with Liz was meeting her boys, Theo (7), Jasper (5), and her husband Eric, who works in the hangar, and hearing about the new house she and Eric are building. "The boys love airplanes and help pre-flight – they are pretty well doomed to the business. We are hoping to have them capable to get their Commercial Ratings at 18 and A&Ps following, but they are not required to be in the industry."

In her spare time, Liz has written two books. "They came from reading to my own children and the vast difference in the quality of books and really not finding many about aviation that are accurate for children. *Kaydee's Quest*, about a float plane that takes people to see the beauty of Alaska, was my first idea (although it was published second). I thought a lot about that and my writing when I'm flying. *Cleared for Bedtime* evolved when I was flying and going around the airport at night and saying good night. This book is a great way for children who have a family member who is a pilot and others in the aviation business to stay connected when they're away. I plan to continue to write for my kid's reading level and to target books where I can use themes about morals and focus on how we're all made for really special things. I'm particularly interested in biblical morals. That's what we're made for!" Just like Liz Davidson, who was made for really special things!

# CARLA LADNER: FLYING WITH THE THUNDERBIRDS

Carla Ladner (a retired mathematics, computer science, and aeronautics teacher) was awarded a ride with the United States Air Force Thunderbirds. This led to her pursuit of a Private Pilot Certificate, as she believed this was the best way to fully immerse herself in a curriculum she loved. Through earning her Private Pilot Certificate, Carla has been able to understand more fully her daughter Lauren's profession in Naval Aviation. The day before her check ride, Carla learned that she had breast cancer. Despite this bad news, she passed her check ride and later beat cancer! One of Carla's students, Emma Burgess, reached out to the Thunderbirds on Instagram in 2022 stating, "Mrs. Ladner is my absolute role model. She started us with \$20 model rockets that she purchased with her own money and the program has grown into what it is today with more advanced model rockets, drones, and five flight simulators. Eighteen students have become certificated drone pilots, and 11 students have either completed or begun work on their Private Pilot Certificate." Emma remains so appreciative of taking Carla's class and is now a private pilot and attending Louisiana Tech University pursuing a degree in aviation.

Carla's ride was in conjunction with the practice show for "Wings Over Houston" on October 13, 2023. During the ride she was welcomed into the 9G club, was able to log 15 minutes of actual flight time in the F-16, and was one of the only civilian guests to ever fly in the delta formation with the Thunderbirds! The Thunderbirds pilot was Major Jeff "Simmer" Downie.

Invited guests included Emma Burgess; Carla's family, friends, and former colleagues; and Dr. Sandra Leder and Cathie Cox, members of her Lake Charles Chapter.

# 99S ACCOMPLISH THEIR MISSIONS

Two active Canadian members, volunteers, and scholarship recipients of The 99s met for the first time on a vision trip to Uganda last year which offered an opportunity to experience their mutual aviation dream careers halfway across the world. This is the story of **Deborah Edwards**, of the Canadian Rockies Chapter of The 99s, who I'm proud to now call a lifelong friend.

The trip to Uganda consisted of three pilots, an Aviation Maintenance Engineer (AME) and his wife, and a senior pilot and recruitment manager for Mission Aviation Fellowship of Canada (MAF), who served 10 years in Uganda. Together we ventured off on a trip of a lifetime to get a taste of what it looks like to serve as a missionary pilot in Uganda with MAF.

Deb and I were excited to discover upon landing in Entebbe that we're both members of The 99s. It was such an incredible experience to get to know her on this trip as we took steps to pursue our aviation dreams.

We visited MAF Uganda headquarters, traveled several hours to isolated villages by very treacherous roads, and later got to experience flying all over Uganda visiting some of the villages MAF serves with MAF pilots. During this time, we were also asked to share our testimonies (this is what drew us closer). Through this experience, I learned that, from a young age, Deb had a firm understanding that the world is a broken place and had a burning desire to do something about it! Deb always dreamed of flying, and was ecstatic to discover that Mission Aviation Fellowship uses flying to bring humanitarian aid and the hope of God's word to people living in isolated locations. Thus her dream was born, and she had a streamlined vision of where it would lead.

Deb began flying as soon as she received a scholarship upon graduating high school. She has always been goal-oriented and a hard worker – often working three jobs at a time to fund her training. Deb is grateful to have been awarded scholarships from various organizations; notably The 99s Fly Now Award in 2018 (which helped her complete her Private Pilot License) as well as the Amelia Earhart Memorial scholarship in 2022 (which covered her IFR training, one of the last requirements she needed to get hired with MAF). Without these generous scholarships, it would have been much harder to complete her training that has led her to the position she's in now.

Though she's still young, Deb has accomplished much through hard work and determination and has inspired many along the way. Some of her experience includes a 50-hour float, bush, and mountain course; and two years of flying charters, fire patrols, surveys, and instructing — all while maintaining her role as Chapter Secretary and, eventually, Chapter Chair of the Canadian Rockies Chapter. Deb is proud to say, "It was a privilege to give back to an organization that had done so much for me."

Once Deb had the experience requirements for MAF, she started the lengthy application process. When I met Deb on the trip, she'd just officially been hired by MAF. "The trip to Uganda helped open my eyes to the need for aid and hope globally, fueling my passion to serve overseas," said Deb.

Upon returning from Uganda, Deb was asked to instruct at Prairie Aviation Training Centre – a renowned flight school which is a part of Prairie College in Three Hills, Alberta, Canada, and partnered with MAF. Allowing her to mentor students, this serves her purpose of using flying to help others, which she hopes to continue, whether that be overseas or in Canada flying medevacs.

So where has this all led? Today it is with great joy, inspiration, and excitement I share that Deb recently received her assignment with MAF in Ecuador! There she'll be flying with MAF to support isolated jungle communities. The program works closely with Compassion International and the local government to serve people. "To these isolated communities, our flights mean life or death for a patient in need of medical care. They also mean that doctors, pastors, and teachers can reach these communities." Deb commented, "I'm currently in the process of fundraising and training towards this upcoming four-year term in Ecuador. I'm very much looking forward to reaching my support-raising goal so that I can get to the field!"

While many scholarships are awarded annually through The 99s, it's not as often that we hear follow-up stories about how they led members to their chosen careers or, rarer yet, introduced 99s to each other in a third-world country while pursuing such a unique career as a missionary pilot! It's an honor to support Deb in her mission as a friend, as a fellow aspiring missionary pilot, and of course as a 99s sister!

## BY HELICOPTER TO ENGLAND

A long-planned excursion, in the true sense of the word, finally took place in May 2023. Together with our friends of the German Historic Flight e.V. (German historic aircraft flying club), we visited the southern English island Isle of Wight.

Early in the morning, we departed with the black R66 helicopter from Reichelsheim Airport (EDFB). The first landing took place at Aachen Merzbruck Airport (EDKA). We refueled the helicopter, filed the flight plan, accomplished all the formalities and then we took off headed to Calais Marck Airport (LFAC).

We had fantastic weather for flying. Whoever has had the opportunity to fly in Belgium knows how difficult it is to circumnavigate all the restricted and danger areas. Finally, we reached Calais, France, at the coastline of the North Sea. Unfortunately, on this day refueling could only be possible with a carnet of Total, so we had to jump over to Le Touquet Cote D'Opale Airport (LFAT), our common meeting airport with all the other flight crews. It's a highly frequented airfield, very friendly and helpful staff, but you must be aware that between 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. only French-speaking pilots are allowed to land. All other times, CTR is active and an English-speaking controller is on duty. Important to know!

After refueling, the most beautiful flight leg began that day: one hour across the British Channel, along the steep coast of southern England with a direct course to the Isle of Wight. It was an incredible experience in bright sunshine. The approach to the Sandown Isle of Wight Airport's (EGHN) runway 23 was uncomplicated. Dan, the airport owner, welcomed us kindly on the radio. Fifteen minutes later we ordered a wood-fired pizza in his restaurant. That was very picturesque!

During the following two days, we discovered the island with a rental car and local buses. Very British! Very nice!

For the return flight, we chose the route over the cliffs to Lydd Airport (EGMD), an airfield located a few miles west of Dover, England. Here the fuel tank truck came to the helicopter, which was very practical. We were also able to do the departure formalities quickly.

This time we flew from Lydd Airport over the British Channel directly to Aachen, Germany (flight time 2.22 hours). Three friendly border police officers were already waiting for us there. We refueled and flew the last flight leg to Reichelsheim, Germany.

As for the last few days, the weather was perfect, and "seeing from pole to pole," as we say in aviation.

Le Touquet and the Isle of Wight should definitely be visited. A must for all pilots and friends.

# NINETY-NINES MUSEUM OF WOMEN PILOTS EXPANDS FOR ITS SILVER ANNIVERSARY

The Ninety-Nines Museum of Women Pilots is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year by expanding its exhibit and secured storage space at its facility on Will Rogers World Airport (KOKC) in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Since opening in July 1999, the Museum has oag over 3,000 square feet of gallery and workspace.


